ITEMS OF NOTE from the Parish Council February Meeting -

LYMPSTONE PARISH PLAN

Lympstone Parish Plan is now just over one year old. Its sets out what the Parish is about and some aspirations for the not too distant future. You can read it on the website.

The Steering Group have just reviewed the aims of the plan and have put forward some recommendations for work in the next twelve months. All of these have been accepted by the Parish Council and will be taken forward after the elections. These include:

Keeping up pressure to have works to prevent flooding in the lower part of the village.

Asking EDDC to make sure that the Parish is consulted on planning applications for development of land adjoining the Parish

Carrying out local works to help tourism related business in the Village. Continued support for the School, Village Hall and Youth Club.

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COPING WITH THE SEVERE WEATHER

At the Parish Council meeting, Don Mildenhall of the Lympstone History Society showed a DVD of how the Parish coped with the last bout of severe weather, many years ago. This showed that local self help was the only answer as there was no help from the County or District Council.

This is the lesson that we have learnt from the severe weather in December 2010 and so in some ways it is uncomfortable to know that little has changed in 30 years except the level of Council Tax. The Parish Council is preparing for this by looking into ways of organising help by local people. If you have ideas or feel that you can help, please let David Atkins or David Young know what you can do.

IT'S ELECTION TIME

Elections for new Councillors for East Devon and Lympstone Parish Council will be held on 5th May 2011. This an opportunity for be prospective candidates to put their names forward. The Parish Council has co-opted two Councillors recently, Di Beatty and David Young so that they will get a taste of Parish Council life before the elections. On 28th March 2011, there will be the Annual Village Meeting. This will be open evening when the work of a Councillor

will be explained to anyone who thinks they might be interested. There is no committment at this stage but it might help you to make up your mind.

This Village Meeting will start with the Chairman of the Devon Association of Local Councils presenting David Atkins with a Long Service award to congratulate him for 42 years service on the Parish Council. David also has extensive service on the District Council, so this shows that getting elected is not a bad thing to do.

LYMPSTONE ALLOTMENTS

The allotments are managed by the Heathfield Allotment Trust. Over the last two years the Trust has been reenergised and management has been tightened up. This has brought the waiting list down from 26 to 8 and so this is welcome news.

There will be an Open Annual Meeting in September when progress and any other changes will be presented to anyone who is interested.

POSTING NOTICES AROUND THE VILLAGE

It is a Village custom for Village organisations to post notices about their activity on the telegraph poles and lamp columns around the village.

This activity is regarded as 'Fly-Posting' and is illegal. The enforcing authority has not taken any action

provided that the activity is used moderately by local groups. However, this situation is now being abused. Groups and businesses from outside the Parish post their notices here, notices have doubled in size up to A3 size and notices are not being taken down promptly after an event. In order to offer some 'protection' to local Groups, the Parish Council has suggested that the following protocol might be adopted. The Parish Council would welcome comments so that there can be informed debate at the next meeting of the Parish Council.

Recommended Good Practice:

- 1 Only notices advertising the activities of Voluntary Groups in the Parish will be accepted.
- 2 Notices should be restricted to A4 size
- 3 Notices should be removed within one week of any event that has been advertised.
- 4 Any other notices may be removed at any time.
- 5 Volunteers should be recruited to help maintain Notices displayed in this way.
- 6 This statement should be brought to the attention of all groups in the Parish 7 This statement should be posted on the Parish Website www.lympstone.org on the Parish Council Notice Boards and in the Lympstone Herald at regular intervals.

AND FINALLY

The Parish Council has set its budget for the next twelve months. As we are not funded by Central Government, we are not affected by their cuts in Public Expenditure. The Parish Council does recognise that many Council Tax payers will be affected by the current financial situation and therefore the Finance Committee instructed Tony, the Clerk, to prepare a budget that meant that there would be no change in the amount that you pay towards Parish Council activities. This has been achieved, there will be some new items of spending and the reserves will be kept to a reasonable level so that the Parish Council can react to challenges or opportunities that might arise. Let us hope that others are able to do the same.

PANTO REVIEW

The telegraph poles informed us that this year's panto, produced by the Lympstone Players and directed by Shirley Wilkes and Terry Dowrick, was Cinderella.

As most people are very familiar with the fairytales used as panto plots, part of the fun of seeing any show is the anticipation of the treatment given to the story. This year's production was a youthful, modern musical with no cross-dressing in sight. The regular members gave excellent performances and the newcomers displayed a wealth of hidden talent.

Julia Billington gave a confident, relaxed performance as the Fairy Godmother and her troupe of little fairies shone with admiration and sincerity. The singing of Sophie Borrie as Cinderella was lovely and Emily Barnacle charmed as Pussycat, while Bruce Ellis, as Buttons, *ad libbed* to the delight of the audience. Grace Packman and Heather Redding were suitably indigestible as the 'Uglies', well beyond the control of their wicked mother played by Mary Blair.

A very regal portrayal of the King and Queen was given by Ron Smith and Sybil Bexter, and I can't imagine who Joel Teague used as his model for Prince Charl...I mean Charming! Ben Redding was a brilliant spiv of a Dandini and Chris Barnacle played Squire Hugo with just the right accent and mannerisms.

Every now and again a group of displaced mice sporting an eclectic mix of accents strayed on and off the stage. Cash and Carry (would-be heavies) played by Clive Wilson and Harland Walshaw brought the house down with their haplessness and high camp. The rest of the cast, playing girlfriends, village girls, shop assistants and Royal Marines gave solid

supporting performances and Brian Mather's 'Mystery Voice' had a palpable smile of enjoyment throughout.

The humour was consistently ful1 oflocal contemporary and references, which is 'de rigueur'. The accompaniment to the large number and range of songs was provided by Carol Tolson and band and Josh Stone and team lit the production using 'moving heads' and 'gobos' giving a modern feeling. Pat Boaden's costume designs, produced with the help of Jill Gray, were stunning, coordinating beautifully with Deb Mitchell's set, giving the whole a sense of lightness and spareness.

The whole performance's smoothness was a tribute to the backstage crew led by Liz Gordon. They all worked exceedingly hard to produce props, shift scenery, call cues, provide make up, organize publicity and manage front of house. A brilliant team effort!






