ITEMS OF NOTE from the Parish Council Sept 5th Meeting

Funding assistance from the Parish Council

It is the time of the year when the Parish Council considers applications for funding to assist local groups.

Each vear, the Parish Council contributes towards The Ring and Ride Community Bus, and the Gulliford Cemetery Joint Committee. In the past, the Parish Council has also paid for an emergency telephone at the Village Hall and for emptying the skips that are on the Village Hall Car Park. From this summer, these will now be paid for by Village Management the Hall Committee as part of its wish to have

full control over its activities.

This year the Parish Council has also been able to assist Lympstone Football Club

Junior players to join a League,

Pre-School Lympstone Group purchasing a picnic table for their outdoor space, Lympstone Church PCC by paying for clock maintenance, The History Society Lympstone contributing towards an Information Board about the Lympstone Timbers, The Lympstone Third Age Project by paying for room hire in the centre of the Village, and the Village Hall Management Committee by paying for extra lighting at the side of the hall opposite the Tennis Courts. Where the Parish Council is buying or paying for services or equipment, the VAT can be reclaimed, thus making this an efficient way of helping Local Groups.

Lympstone Composting

The Parish Council was sad to hear of the decision by Lympstone Composting to cease their activities. The scheme has been successful over the last 11 years despite interferences and threats of expensive licensing by DEFRA. The scheme has also been financially sound, lacked succession hut has a volunteers to carry out the work. This is not necessarily the end of compost collections in the Village. A number of options are being considered by others to see if a scheme of some sort can continue. One of these is by Otter Rotters, who carry out similar and wider schemes in other parts of East Devon. The Parish Council will invite them to a meeting to discuss their possible scheme. Notice of this will be given on the Notice Boards. All, users and non-users, will be welcome to come along to the meeting.

Education in Lympstone

The Parish Council welcomed Mrs Christine McNeil of the Education Department at DCC to the meeting to hear how education for Lympstone children was likely to be provided in coming years. Mrs McNeil the explained that Lympstone was part of the Exmouth Learning Community and that DCC needed to look at education provision from a strategic perspective, taking into any planned account housing development. Unfortunately, this is not going to help Lympstone School very much as any expansion will probably be based in Exmouth Schools for the foreseeable future. Cllr Richard Eastley commented that when he was a Governor, the School had around 90 pupils, now it has 185 but there has not been any permanent expansion in premises to cope with this increase in numbers. The Head and Staff do a fantastic job with our young children but they deserve more from our Education Authority. Cllr Jim Bailey was strong in his condemnation that DCC had not invested in education in Lympstone for many years. The school has now gained a measure of independence from DCC and is moving forward with plans for its own expansion by using the site of the Church Rooms. The Parish Council is fully supportive of this as this is the only area of land that will allow any expansion of provision at the school.

The Governors and the Head are exploring plans for use of the Church Room site, as well as considering further provision of temporary accommodation within the school site. They would like to thank the Parish Church PCC for their offer to lease the land to them, and for their financial contribution to this very important project.

Is there a need for a defibrillator in the Village?

At its next meeting, the Parish Council will consider the need for a defibrillator in the Village. This will probably be the type that can be operated by anyone, following simple instructions. The Parish Council would like to hear your

views as to whether this would be a useful piece of equipment to have and where it might be kept so that it is available at all times.

Vacancy the **Parish Council**

There is still a vacancy for one more Parish Councillor. There are plenty of things to do for



anyone who is interested in playing a part in their Community. If possible, we like everyone to have a specific responsibility, but this will be the choice of the individual and not decided by the Parish Council as a whole. Whatever role you might feel that you can play you will gets lots of support and if you want to, you will get a chance to meet with people in other Parishes to talk about what they are doing and how they go about it. If you feel that you could give something to your Community, why not come along to our meetings to see what happens? Meetings are held on the first and third Mondays of each month at 7.30pm in the Committee Room of the Village Hall.

CRICKET SEASON ENDS ON A HIGH

Having "done the double" in fine fashion against Nomads in what proved to be the final match, Lympstone's cricketers can look back on a successful first season under new captain With 10 wins from 13 Ben Ingham. played, the improved record is largely down to big hitting from the younger batsmen - Toby Ingham, Jamie Cooke, George Greenaway, Charles Lenygon and brother Miles are all difficult to dislodge or contain. The last three played more than half the matches and each amassed well over 200 runs in the season. As a mark of a great team batting effort, Lympstone's previous best innings total of 149 has been exceeded seven times this year - it now stands at 202 for 2 (in 20 overs). With such batting strength the bowlers have had relatively little to do, but have bowled three sides out and restricted others most of the Ben Ingham, Ollie Creighton and time. David Wright were leading wicket takers, with Gary Abrahams and Dominic Hall turning in impressive strike rates. Anyone passing the church recently may have noticed a yellow notice pinned to the door. The Parochial Church Council has

decided to seek permission to have a door fitted to make the vestry a self contained room. There are a number of reasons for this. Firstly,



the Junior Church children will be able to do more activities as the noise created will be reduced by a good solid door! Secondly, the church toilets will be able to be opened without access to the vestry being open too. Finally, it will make the room easier to heat in the winter. The second part of the notice deals with proposed work to allow the pews to be refurbished to match the wood at the rear of the church which was improved at the time of the reordering. The notice allows anyone to raise objections before work commences, so look for the yellow notices!

The Harvest Festival will be held during

ROYAL MARINE YOUNG OFFICER EXERCISE (EXERCISE FINAL NAIL) 24th-26th OCTOBER 2011

Royal Marine Young Officer Batch 2010 will be conducting a military exercise in Lympstone village. This will be the same exercise that was conducted in 2010. The Young Officers are 2 months away from completing their training and this is part of their final test exercise. The aim of using Lympstone Village is to give the Young Officers a new environment to work in and additional complexities such as interacting with a real civilian population and working with the local authorities (Police and Fire Brigade).

They will be using the Scout Hut on Cliff Field as an operating base and will be conducting patrolling in the village. There will be specific activities in the vicinity of the Swan Inn, Candy's Field and the military married quarters. More details of these activities will be published closer to the exercise.

LYMPSTONE COMPOST

The Environment Agency have recently introduced some legislation covering waste operations and if we continued as in previous years we would be paying £1590 to register and an annual fee of £760. Additionally, our site would probably be considered unsuitable as it is too close to other businesses at Gulliford nursery.

Over the years we have increasingly relied on more paid help to augment the shrinking band of reliable volunteers. Bagged sales of mulch and compost have also stopped as the remaining volunteers felt their age. Each spring for the past few years the committee have had to weigh up whether the volunteer resources were adequate for the coming season. During this summer more volunteers have dropped by the wayside making it difficult to guarantee that the site work is completed on Wednesday mornings.

It is with regret that the committee have therefore decided to make this the last season of operation. It will take about a vear to run down the site operation.

The committee is investigating some possible alternative arrangements, but it is inevitable that the service will cost considerably more and the take-up by households may not be sufficient to operate a viable scheme.

The collections will continue as usual for the remainder of this season, the last collection being on Wednesday 26th October.



There have been four crimes reported during the above period:

A PACT meeting was held on the 8th August and the issues raised were:

Parking along Longmeadow Road and completely blocking the pavement for users, also Underhill Crescent Junction – I have recently patrolled this area and advice notes have been left on offending vehicles advising on parking. Tickets could be issued if problem continues.

Dog mess – Candy's Field and Glebelands – Contact has been made to environmental health and the dog warden and patrol will be taking place. I have obtained new posters to go up on boards, Councillor Eastley to look into bylaws. Check and challenge - to all dog walkers to see if they have suitable bags for picking up and issue them some if they don't (this will be conducted when I am out on normal patrol).

Cycle track/not stopping on the junction of Station Hill - negotiations continue with Highways and the engineering group. I am looking to have a site visit with Nigel Frost (it was due to take place on 26th August, but had to cancel due to awful weather) in the near future. Signs have been placed in the area advising cyclists they are joining the highway as an interim measure. It is clear that evidence is needed to highlight issues and residents should encouraged to write in with details of any incidents or near misses. A NEW BOOK ON LYMPSTONE

"Every village should have a book like this," says Peter Beacham of



English Heritage, in his Foreword to *The Houses of Lympstone*.

Published on 10th September, Rosemary Smith's new book takes us on a tour of our village, describing all the 93 listed houses, and many others of architectural and historic interest. It tells us their history, and introduces us to some of the people who have lived in them. There are the families from the big houses, the shipbuilders and merchants, and the old Lympstone families who lived in the cottages, the fishermen, boatbuilders, undertakers, shopkeepers, farm workers, coal merchants, smugglers and lace makers.

And through the memories of diarists such as Annie Thomas, Fanny Orchard and Minnie Street, we learn of life as it was lived in Lympstone 100 years ago, with stories of the many village shops, of the postman who organized the Saturday Night Penny Concerts, of torchlight processions to celebrate the Relief of Mafeking, and tea in the Big House.

The book is illustrated with 55 black and white photographs by Harland Walshaw, and is published in hardback by Lympstone Historic Houses Group. It is on sale at the Post Office at £8.50.



Devon and Cornwall Police deal with livestock worrying under the Protection of Livestock Act 1953 and The Animals Act 1971. It is an offence for a dog to worry livestock on agricultural land. If the dog owner is known they may be liable for any injuries, veterinary fees or loss of earnings due to the damaged state of the livestock.

Remember to keep your dog on a lead or under sufficient control that it will not wander onto land where livestock is kept.




