COURTLANDS

As you are aware the application to develop the land to the North West of Courtlands Cross by Strategic Land Partnerships (SLP) has been sent to be heard at a Public Enquiry. This will begin on Tuesday 24th January in the Council Chamber of Exmouth Town This is a very formal, legal Hall. process and over the last three months East Devon District Council (EDDC) and SLP have been putting their papers together and making their written submissions to the Inspector. These make up two large boxes of documents. During this time I have been gathering our own group of experts together to represent the Lympstone Community. We had our first meeting with the Case Officer for EDDC on Tuesday 3^{rd} January and our own internal meeting the following evening.

The Appeal will start at 10.00am sharp on the 24th, when the Inspector will speak to both parties to see who will be representing them and speaking for them. He will then ask if any third wishes to present party evidence. David Atkins will step straight in and introduce himself and then pass over to I will introduce myself and our me. additional four witnesses: Cllr Richard Eastley, Mark Robertson (on behalf of Courtlands Lane), Don Mildenhall and Helen Dimond.

The issues are few and it is important that we do not repeat ourselves. To this end we have been advised to restrict our witnesses to five and be very clear

on their topics. They will be carefully scripted so it is important that we keep to these numbers.

The Appeal will then get started with presenting their case first. EDDC After each witness (4) has spoken SLP's (The Appellant) Lawyer may cross-examine. The roles are then reversed and the Appellant's witnesses (3) will give their statements and face cross-examination from the EDDC lawver. We would then expect David Atkins and our five witnesses to present This order cannot be their cases. guaranteed as the Inspector may have his own ideas!

The witness statements are currently being prepared – these will be available on the Lympstone web site www.lympstone.org the evening of the day they have been delivered at the enquiry.

At the end of the appeal the Inspector will sum up and may inspect the site. He then writes up his decision which is posted on the Inspectorate's web site http://www.planning-

inspectorate.gov.uk ref:-APP/U1105/A/2161479/NWF – a notice will be put up on the Lympstone web site and in the Post Office so it may be easier to look there.

This is a public enquiry and anyone is welcome to attend, but be warned there is seating for only about 120 people. I would like to see the gallery full but not overfull.

Notes to spectators:-

There is only one person who counts in the enquiry room **THE INSPECTOR** - he is king of his domain. How the inspector views "The Lympstone Community" is very important, I will be making a point of saying in my introduction that we are treating the proceedings with utmost gravity and respect so please ...

- No barracking or shouting out from the public gallery and no protest banners inside the room.
- A quiet hand clap is acceptable if you agree with a statement or presentation or a soft "here, here" even a soft "well said or well done" after each of our team's statements to show public support.
- No response (deathly silence) or a sharp gasp of breath is far more effective to an appellant's statement than calling out.

I can assure you that your team will put up a spirited performance and has put in hours of work to get our defence together. In due course I will reveal all but for now let's keep it tight. See you on the 24th January.

I am sure Father Christmas visited Lympstone over the Christmas period and there are lots of lovely new bikes around. The neighbourhood team will be holding a bike marking session in the near future where we will property mark your bike with your postcode. This is good crime prevention and we encourage residents to take up the opportunity and best of all its free! Dates will be released in the future.

I am aware that scooters are very popular at the moment with the young. Can I ask parents just to be mindful that if they are using them on the road the highway code still applies. I have received a few complaints from concerned drivers who have had near misses.

Dog walkers – please can I ask you to ensure that you have proper control over your animal whilst out walking. In the area of Frog Meadow there have been several attacks on chickens. It is

up to the dog owner to maintain proper control at all times and I would advise that the animal be put on a lead. Allowing dogs to worry livestock or cause injury is an offence and can lead prosecution and to in some circumstances animal the being destroyed. Please work with local farmers and landowners to prevent these incidents.

I have had complaints regarding the parking of vehicles on the slip way onto the estuary and the double yellow lines at Sowden end. Vehicles have even been parking on the estuary. I will be making enquiries and speaking to the local Enforcement officers to ask them to attend and ticket offending vehicles. This is a very narrow piece of road and causes congestion as well as blocking the slipway and preventing access to other users.

I have been told of several misses between near cvclists pedestrians and





West Gallery music was eventually abolished because it was not considered solemn enough. For the first time in 150 years it can be heard again in Lympstone Church. 

More than 80 people assembled in Sowden House orchard on



Twelfth Night, many of them family groups, to wassail the apple trees. The ancient custom of wassailing would have been common in the village 100 years ago, when orchards were everywhere, and apples were made into cider that helped pay the wages of the farm workers. But it was new to most of those who had come to quench their curiosity.

It was an atmospheric event. The children of the house performed a charming little play, the wassail choir sang wassailing songs, one from Whimple, children were sent up the trees which were beaten with sticks and blessed with much noise: "Hatfuls. capfuls. bushel bushel bagfuls! Huzzah!" And then all walked with lanterns and torches to another orchard. appropriately at Orchard Cottage, where more families joined in, mulled cider was served, hot soup, apple cake and wassail biscuits. More singing, more wassailing, and this time the play, which Lympstone Mummers' enthralled all the children. who presumably hadn't seen it when it toured the pubs before Christmas.

Sheila Stone and Suki Commin have revived a wonderful tradition, which marks the end of the Christmas holiday, and is a true family event. The atmosphere was relaxed, convivial, and just a little magical. And the apple trees are now guaranteed to provide a rich harvest.

And money was raised for the Apple Day which is being planned for the 20th October. Huzzah!
