<u>Definitions of accidents, as set by the Department for Transport:</u>

<u>Accident</u> = Involves personal injury occurring on the public highway (including footways) in which at least one road vehicle, or a vehicle in collision with a pedestrian, is involved. *Note*: 'Vehicles' includes bicycles and horses.

<u>Fatal accident</u> = An accident in which at least one person is killed.

<u>Serious accident</u> = One in which at least one person is *seriously injured* but no person is killed ('*serious injury*' includes fractures, concussion, internal injuries, curshing, burns, severe cuts, severe general shock requiring medical treatment, and any injury for which a person is detained in hospital as an in-patient).

<u>Slight accident</u> = One in which at least one person is *slightly injured* but no person is killed or seriously injured ('slight injury' includes an injury of minor character such as a sprain, bruise or cut which are not judged to be severe, or slight shock requiring roadside attention).

Definition of 'near miss':

<u>Near miss</u> = An incident that did not result in injury but had the potential to do so. For the purposes of these records, this will include incidents that result in damage to property but no injury.

<u>Note</u>: The Department for Transport does not report on near misses; however, near misses clearly highlight the potential for accidents and, therefore, help to assess the risk. All health and safety legislation stresses the importance of recording near misses.
