Neighbourhood Plan

Cllr Rob Longhurst reported to the Parish Council meeting that the Public Consultation for the Neighbourhood Plan ran for six weeks, in line with Section 14 of the Neighbourhood Planning Regulations 2012. Response forms were available on the village website, with hard copies available at the Exhibition and on request. Respondents were asked to indicate whether they agreed or disagreed with specific Policies, and to suggest alternative wording. They were also asked their opinion about anything missing from the Plan, and their overall impression of the document. In the event not all feedback was made on the form, and not all respondents were as specific as requested. Nonetheless all the written feedback received during

the consultation period has been carefully studied and considered. A total of 127 responses were received:

□ 110 from private individuals
 □ 17 from agents, organisations, groups and representative bodies.

The members of the Working Party are delighted with the level and overall quality of responses. They indicate an assertive community, in touch with its values, that wishes to embrace controlled development whilst preserving the character and traditions of the Parish.

The Working Party is concerned about the absence of responses from some bodies, in particular Exmouth Town Council, the National Trust, CTCRM, Harefield Estate, The Church, Farming interests.

All responses are summarised in two documents along with the comments of the WP and appropriate action taken. The summaries of each response are brief, in order to produce a manageable document that can be used to identify the key themes. Full copies of all responses are available on the village website.

Summary of the main themes arising from consultation.

1. The Exe Estuary Trail (EET). There were 49 objections to CAP For many this was the only issue of concern in the entire Plan. We were impressed by the weight of argument and the striking personal anecdotes about the dangers of the EET, for both pedestrians and cyclists. number of the objections were from cyclists themselves, and the objectors included the author of the Draft Plan! The overwhelming view was that the EET should be re-routed, away from the village roads, along the railway line. ALRUG object to this since this land could be key for future enhanced rail service. although Network Rail has no current plans for this. A technical solution can be found.

2. Goodmores Farm development.

Thirty seven responses were related to this issue. Most (but not all) from residents on the

Hulham Road side of the A376 who will be most directly affected by the development. Many of these respondents supported the plan in principle but disagreed with a number of the Objectives because of this issue. There was widespread opposition to the proposed development, and anger at the way in which the Parish Council and EDDC have handled the matter. A new section of the Plan has been drafted to reflect these views along with some very positive contributions to new ideas re footpaths, bridle ways and road improvements

3. Concerns that the Plan will not have any teeth

Delivery and Monitoring has been reviewed and improved.

4. Failure to consult with local Landowners/long established residents

The Lympstone Landowners and **Employers** Association responded that they had not been consulted and 6 individual also made responses comment. This is refuted by the WP and we would refer to the Consultation Statement (Appendix I) which has been updated since the Consultation Exercise.

5. Concerns about traffic speed in the centre of the village

Nine respondents suggested a 20mph limit. The DCC response

suggested there was no justification for 20mph.

The Working Party have reviewed CAP 6 and feel that it adequately reflects opinion and does not rule out a 20mph limit in the future if circumstances or DCC attitude changes.

6. Improvements to the train station/train service

Despite the response from ALRUG there is no evidence of widespread community support for a 15 minute train service from the feedback. This is still part of the DCC Transport Policy. No Change.

7. Comments about the layout of the Plan/detailed comments about the text

Many respondents (both individuals and organisations) highly complementary were about the professionalism of the Plan - particularly Planning Aid Six respondents and EDDC. raised concerns about the length difficulty of accessing essential information in the plan, and these included a number of comments about the maps.

I would remind you that this was only a draft plan and the final version will be proof read by two independent reviewers and the Plain English Group at EDDC.

8. EDDC & DCC Input

Input was received from EDDC and DCC. The EDDC input was accepted in almost its entirety.

There were concerns over some of the DCC input as we felt there was a lack of understanding of what DCC understood was the function of a Neighbourhood Plan.

All of these comments will be considered at a Special meeting of the Parish Council at 7.30pm on 9th September, 2013.

The meeting will consider the Neighbourhood Plan again page by page to identify changes to the Plan and to consider the comments that have been made.

The Parish Council will also consider how the Delivery and Monitoring Statement and Consultation Statement within the Plan will be operated in the future to make sure that all the policies are followed up and adopted, in practice, by other public bodies.

Once the Parish Council have adopted the Plan there will be an exhibition of the contents and changes, in the Village Hall on 20th & 21st September 2013, before the Plan is submitted to EDDC for their part of the adoption process.

POSSIBLE DEVELOPMENT AT COURTLANDS LANE/ A376

SLP have informed the Parish Council that they are intending to re-submit a much smaller outline planning application for 33 new homes on the land fronting the A376 Exmouth Road. The new proposal addresses the key

matters previously raised in connection with development at Courtlands.

SLP say that an information leaflet, distributed has been to residents immediately adjoining the site in Courtlands Lane. The link to the dedicated project web site is www.courtlands-cross.co.uk

This will be considered at a meeting of the Parish Council on 16th September 2013 and as usual, the meeting will be open to the Public.

Lympstone FC

George Webster has asked if it would be possible for the Parish Council to purchase land which could be developed for sport & recreation, using lottery/sports grants.

The Parish Council has been aware of the success of the Football Club and the difficulties it has been facing in providing adequate facilities. Those who live in the area will know of the parking problems on Burgmanns Hill when the youth team are playing at home. A new sports facility for Lympstone would remove this problem and could provide excellent facilities for our young

Councillors have been asked to think about where such a facility might be provided and will discuss this again in a month's time. At this stage, no site has been identified. The Parish Council and the Football Club would welcome ideas for this including possible offers of a site.

Flooding

This is a recurring topic at Parish Council meetings. At the last meeting the talk was more about the poor state and size of the sewerage network particularly along Longmeadow Road as this takes most of the sewage for the Village. Most of the older houses in the area will have combined drains which means that rainwater from the roof will drain into the public sewer rather than into a surface water drain. This puts even greater pressure on the capacity on the already 'overcrowded' drains.

Dave Tyrrell has put in a great effort by contacting every public body that might have a role to play in making sure that the sewers are adequate to cope with the needs of an expanding community but so far no answer has been given and no works are proposed.

The Parish Council will now follow this up with a different line to see if any response or progress can be made. To support this it is vital that evidence is gathered to clearly demonstrate that there has been sewage flowing down the public roads and paths and that householders are suffering from toilets that won't flush. Please contact Tony the Clerk or a Parish Councillor to communicate your experiences.

Grants from the Parish Council

Each year, the Parish Council has funds to help Groups in the Village. County Councillor Bernard Hughes also has an allocation of funds to help with local schemes and organisations.



Dates may be subject to change due to factors outside our control such as; delays agreeing cabinet locations with your local council or unforeseen issues encountered during the construction of your street cabinet.

Installing BT Infinity at your property depends on a number of factors including whether or not your telephone exchange currently supports BT Infinity and whether your street cabinet and line have been enabled. To find out more you can look up your telephone exchange on the Openreach website. Your property is connected to EXMOUTH telephone exchange.

CTCRM EXERCISE

The exercise will run from Sat 28 Sep 13 and finish on either Tue 01 Oct or Wed 02 Oct 13.



It will involve the Young Officers patrolling from a base location either on Cliff Field or in the field opposite it. Patrols will look to engage with the locals in the village. The situation is one in which the population are largely suppressed by an insurgent grouping so villagers should give little to the young officers. We will have approx 50 people who will play key members of the population in the village that will give the young officers the necessary information as required. A number of tightly controlled incidents will take place throughout the 3-4 days, some will run through the night but these will be in areas away from the village centre. These will be planned to cause minimal disruption to the residents. There may be some packages discreetly placed around the village, these will be obviously marked but will not be put in locations that will cause inconvenience to residents.

The consent of the village is greatly appreciated and allows for some truly unique training benefits. The opportunity to conduct training in a real village is something only done at Commando Training Centre and adds complexity to their training that greatly increases realism. Having to deal with a genuine population and have their

concerns, interests and property at the core of all their activity will ensure the planning and execution the Young Officers undertake will have to be of a high quality. It also strengthens the already excellent bond between the village and the training centre, the like of which does not exist anywhere else. It will also provide valuable training for the local police and fire service who will be involved in some aspects of the exercise.

The village and its residents will be a priority throughout the exercise and any concerns can be raised to a member of CTCRM staff at any time.


