This is a Village Meeting and not a Parish Council meeting, although it falls to the Parish Council to organise it. It is a chance for any Elector to raise any matter of concern in the Village. Your County Councillor, District Councillors. Parish Councillors and Representatives of various local groups will be there to listen to your point of view, answer any questions, or to make sure that they are sent to the right person to get an answer. If you belong to a group in the village please let Tony Le Riche, the Clerk, have a short note about your activities.

In the past the meeting has included a number of reports by groups about what they have done or what they are hoping to do. This time, rather than each leader giving a verbal report, any reports will be printed and set out around the room so that anyone can read them or take them away with them if they wish.

As there are Elections on 5th May 2011 for District Councillors and Parish Councillors, the evening will focus on what it means to be a Councillor and how you get to put your name forward. County and District Councillors will be on hand to help explain what they do and how the Councils work. They can also explain the politics involved. There will be information about the timetable for submitting nomination and nomination packs will be available for anyone who wants

David Atkins is a District Councillor and a Parish Councillor. He has served as a Parish Councillor for 42 years. It is hoped that the Chairman of the Devon Association of Local Councils will present a Long Service Award to David at this meeting. Refreshments will be available

Working with other Parish Councils.

The Big Society and the Localism Bill will both give opportunities for Parish Councils to do more in their area. Exmouth Town Council has taken the initiative and started getting together with the Parish Councils who lie between the River Otter and the River Exe. Rob Longhurst and Peter Acca have been to one of these meetings to hear what might be happening. There are some interesting ideas coming up, particularly about Self-help Communities in the future I think that we all know that the District and County Councils have to cut their spending and so their local services will fall. Snow clearance was the first major sign of this last year, but there will be other things in the near future that will have to be handled locally rather than relying on someone else to do it. The only way forward seems to be to see what we can do for ourselves. The Parish Council is keen to be involved either on its own or by joining with others where this will give greater scope for achievements.

OTHER PARISH COUNCIL BUSINESS

Parish Council elections

On 5th May 2011, there will be elections to elect 11 Parish Councillors to serve on Lympstone Parish Council for the next four years. The Polling Station is normally in the Village Hall. Various posters and notices will be displayed on the Parish Council notice boards from the middle of March onwards, with all the details.

The main purpose of a Councillor is to represent the views of all residents within the Parish. As with any public body, there is plenty of administration but Tony, the Clerk, and Tor, his Assistant, are here to take care of that side of things. It is much more important that you know the village or are willing to learn and you are willing to talk to people about what happens here.

What does a Parish Councillor do?

As part of Lympstone Parish Council you will have responsibility for running local services including open spaces such as Candy's Field, Avenue Field, Cliff Field and The Rag, play areas in Candy's Field, the village toilets, the Youth Club building and, potentially, much more.

Deciding on how much money to raise through the council tax in order to pay for these things.

Influencing and shaping the long term development of the Parish, and commenting on planning applications in the Parish.

Improve the quality of life and the environment in their local area.

Work to identify issues which are important to the lives of the residents. Work to bring about improvements through local projects by the Parish Council and others.

Training and advice for Parish Councillors is provided by the Devon Association of Local Councils, East Devon District Council and Devon County Council.

The National Association of Local Councils has a comprehensive website: www.nalc.gov.uk.

At the moment, the Parish Council meets on the first Monday of each month, except in August. The Planning Committee also meets on the middle Monday of each month to make recommendations about planning applications. All meetings are open to the public and the Parish Council is keen to allow public comment during discussions.

There are a number of committees, but these have not worked well and so it has been recommended that the Parish Council consider working in a different way. The present Council is suggesting that there are two meetings each month with business being split between the two. However, it will be for the newly elected Council to decide how it wishes to operate. The results of the election are expected by the afternoon of Saturday 7th May 2011.

THE LYMPSTONE PLAYERS - JESTER CHALLENGE

TALK SATURDAY 26TH MARCH



Rory McDougall, experienced an round- the-world sailor and participator in last year's Trans-Atlantic Jester Challenge, is giving a talk about his adventures sailing The Challenge is Corinthian-style, а nautical adventure for sailboats 20-30ft long, sailing over 3,000 miles against the prevailing conditions of the testing North Atlantic

In 1991 Rory built his own catamaran. 21ft Tiki designed by Wharram, and set off to sail around the world. He completed the trip over six years to become the smallest catamaran to sail around the world. Last year he renovated his catamaran here Lympstone and participated in the Jester Challenge. sailing from Plymouth, UK to Newport, USA, arriving in 2nd place - only hours behind the first-placed Russian entry. After a short break Rory then turned around and sailed back across the Atlantic arriving into Lympstone at 11.30pm on 2nd August.

His talk will cover the preparations and story of the Jester Challenge and the return voyage to a fantastic homecoming here in Lympstone. The talk will commence at 7.30pm in the Village Hall. All welcome.

Earthquakes and their tragic outcomes have all too often dominated the news in recent times. But they were no less a feature of life in earlier ages: Lisbon in 1775


and San Francisco in 1906 to name but two of the most notorious. The world

LYMPSTONE C OF E PRIMARY SCHOOL - GOVERNORS' NEWSLETTER - March 2011

Our school continues to perform well, and the Governors continue to be encouraged by growing numbers and exciting developments.

School performance:

At our most recent meeting of the full Governing Body in February, we heard that pupils are performing well, and they are making good progress. addition to their academic experience, pupils at our school have opportunities to be involved in a wide range of extra Since September, pupils activities. have had the chance to sail on the River Exe, visit Buckfast Abbey and the Norman Lockyear Observatory, been to the theatre, welcomed children from other schools to share our facilities. been to the cinema, celebrated harvest and Christmas in real style, and been to @Bristol, among others. Pupils have also taken part in sporting events, and we are proud to report that our swimmers won the cup in a recent gala between local primary schools. There are certainly many things for our pupils and staff to be proud of!

Since September, our school roll has grown from 153 pupils to 175 in January. It is predicted to grow further, to around 185 by September. It is very encouraging that so many pupils and their families are choosing our school, and we would hope to accommodate as many children from the village as possible, but we are conscious that

pupil numbers are a concern to some parents. We shall be able to accommodate all pupils in more evenly sized classes, by making full use of all spaces available to us, and Governors are working hard to explore all possibilities for more room.

Governors have heard from the Parochial Church Council that consideration is being given to the Church Room site, abutting school downhill. No decision has been made as yet, but we are hopeful that the PCC and Governing Body can work together to provide an exciting new facility for pupils in the near future.

School Development Planning:

Our 12 month School Development Plan aims to give attention to strong planning and monitoring of learning throughout the school, incorporating a wider range of learning styles, and encouraging staff to broaden their skills, whilst identifying and supporting pupils who may be struggling with the curriculum. Governors pleased that teachers are planning collaboratively. making and increasingly effective use of pupil assessment and tracking. A huge amount of work goes into making learning accessible and stimulating, whilst also monitoring and supporting our children, so our thanks to the staff for all their hard work.

Parents and visitors to the school will have noticed several physical changes to the site which have taken place recently. Since September, the Nature Garden has been enhanced with a

permanent wooden shelter (now thatched), and a woven willow fence around the pond. Our sincere thanks go to Class 1's teacher, Emma Thurlbeck and her partner, Jonathan, for all their hard work and devotion to the outside area, and to Emma and Chris Winter

and their friendly thatcher, who have worked so hard to provide such a beautiful

shelter for the children. Thank you all. School House is also having a face lift, with new fascia boards, gutters and drainpipes, insulation, re-pointing and gleaming paintwork. The school rents this building from the Church of England, and we are grateful to John Lupton for putting these improvements in motion. The toilets are also to be improved, and we hope that the pupils will appreciate our attention to this important aspect of school life!

Budgets and Academy status:

The Government is keen for schools to be offered the opportunity to opt for academy status. This would mean an independence from the Local Authority, freedom for Governors to manage the school budget and curriculum, and to make important decisions regarding the direction taken by our school. Governors have opportunity considered this verv thoroughly, looking into every aspect of converting our school to academy, but have decided that, at the moment, we should remain as we are. It would be prudent to wait to see how this year's budget is affected by cuts, how other schools manage the transition to academy status, and to find out more about the benefits, or otherwise, of such a decision in the long term.

We are yet to be informed of this year's budget, and financial planning is not easy with such short notice before the start of the financial year, but we are sure that there will be a reduction in funds available to us this year. Finance Committee are monitoring the situation closely. and we shall endeavour to manage our expenditure prudently, trying whilst also maintain current levels of performance.

LYMPSTONE TENNIS CLUB




