EXTRACTS FROM THE PARISH CLERKS NOTES AT 6/7/15 PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

EXE ESTUARY TRAIL

Judith Carter gave a presentation of proposals to install cobbles on sections of



the roads through Lympstone to encourage cyclists to ride on the correct side of the road. The proposals provide the sticking of strips onto half of the carriageway to deter cyclists from riding over them. There was much scepticism over this proposal and, of course, at long last it is seen as a partial admission by DCC that the EET through Lympstone is not safe.

The Parish Council will accept the offer of DCC to produce mock-ups of these 'cobbles' so that Councillors and anyone else who sees them can give their local assessment of something which has not been tried or tested anywhere else. The Parish Council will make it absolutely clear that it can only accept these as a temporary measure and not an alternative to creating an off road route through the Village.

The Parish Council is also to ask for the support of Exmouth Town Council in contributing to an initial feasibility study into an off-road route along the railway line.

DINAN WAY EXTENSION – DO WE REALLY NEED IT?

There was a lively discussion at the Parish Council meeting about DCC's options for the Dinan Way extension. Residents from Pitt Farm who will be directly affected by either route spoke about the impact that the northern route would have on their homes and the landscape views of the Wotton Valley. There was also concern that the northern route would afford a 'wedge' up to Summer Lane and this could be a magnet for development.

Cllr Jenny Clark said that the knock-on effects



of this road will be felt by the vast majority of residents and there will be no benefit to them even though the road is to be built in Lympstone. Her opinion was that nobody in the Parish really wants this road. She also expressed doubts as to how this road would be funded. Her concern was that DCC might seek to fund or part fund it through housing development which was of huge concern.

Over 20 years ago, EDDC in their local plan said there should be no development in Exmouth until the A376 had been improved. There has been lots of development with much more to come but no road improvements.

Hugo Swire MP has also made it clear that improvements are needed from the M5 southwards to tackle the problem of access to Exeter from the South. Any Dinan Way extension in isolation from a coherent and significant investment in the area's infrastructure could be a waste of money and not provide any effective solution to local traffic problems.

Another issue raised was that of run-off water from any new road as this would end up in the Wotton Brook, contributing to existing issues with flooding in the lower village and along Longmeadow Road.

The National Trust has expressed concerns that the southern route would affect A La Ronde but the meeting felt that either route was well away from A La Ronde and views from the building are to the South and West.

Being pragmatic, Cllrs Helen Dimond and Rob Longhurst suggested that the Council should consider the 'least worst' scenario. Rob proposed that the following demands should be put forward if any new road is finally agreed.

1. DCC (Highways) must agree to produce a "West - East Devon Traffic Plan" looking at the long term traffic requirements, and solutions, for this area.

2. The Broadway/Globe Hill route through Woodbury must be reviewed. A lorry (HGV) ban is imperative along with appropriate traffic calming measures to make this a less preferred route. (Possibly narrow village entrance gateways with priority exiting the village – as per Station Road , Sidmouth).

3. An interim review of measures on the A376 (if there are any!) to improve traffic flow

4. Summer Lane should be closed at both ends and reverts to a Bridle Way/Cycle Path/Footpath with the possible Re-routing of the East Devon Way along this stretch. 5. Re-routing the Exe Estuary Trail around the centre of Lympstone to alleviate the cycle menace within the Village Centre

6. More than adequate screening on N & S sides of the Dinan Way extension to mitigate against intrusion to all local residents

7. An undertaking that this will only be a transport link and that the unused land in the vicinity (currently protected for this extension) will revert to Green Wedge and not be used for housing development.

Overall the Parish Council was firmly of the view that this new road is not needed, will bring no benefits to our parish and will not address the traffic problems of the A376. The Parish Council will urge DCC to look at an alternative route which goes north (the direction that morning motorists want to go) but by-passing Woodbury, with traffic measures to make Woodbury an undesirable alternative. If a Dinan Way extension is to be forced upon us, then the Parish Council would prefer the southern route (close to Summer Lane), with extensive landscaping to mitigate this blot on the landscape and a full assessment of the impact of surface water run-off with measures put in place to control this.

EXE ESTUARY TRAIL

There were 4 incidents reported in the accident book at Central Stores during May and June.

One of these was on the Railway Bridge by Cliff Field where someone was walking on the right hand side of the bridge with her dog close to the wall when a cyclist coming up the ramp from the station on to the bridge cycled between her and the wall making her jump out of the way. The cyclist was abusive both calling the pedestrian a silly cow, accusing them of being on the wrong side of the trail and putting one finger up in an offensive gesture.

In another incident observed by a

walker on the same railway bridge, a cyclist coming down from the bridge towards the station was followed by a second cyclist who collided



with the first, shouted at her for being in the way and rode off leaving the hit cyclist shaken and in tears.

A near miss was reported by a car driver on The Strand approaching Chapel Lane from the The Swan- a group of cyclists 2 abreast came round the corner and another cyclist came at speed round the bend overtaking them and causing the driver to make an emergency stop to avoid a collision.

Finally another near miss was reported by a driver who was approaching Sowden End on the right angle bend by the river when a cyclist came round the corner at speed in the middle of the road. The driver slammed on his brakes and managed to stop just in time. The driver was very shocked but the cyclist did not even stop.

Proposed Cobbles - thank you for all those people who sent me their views on the cobbles proposed by DCC. These were very useful and the main concerns you raised were that where cobbles were to be placed on one side of the road in order to force cyclists to use the other side, this might cause a possible collision hazard as cyclists coming the other way would also seek to avoid them. The general consensus was that if strips of cobbles were used to slow down cyclists these should be across the whole width of the road. There are still number а of outstanding questions about whether putting cobbles into the road will create a further hazard for cyclists and other road users. We are awaiting some further information from DCC about these issues and details of any locations where these have previously been used.

Thank you to those people who objected to the plans for a new cycle way through Halsdon Farm fields from the A376 on the basis that an alternative route through Lympstone was needed before further cyclists

were routed through the village. You may like to know that DCC are holding consultations in Exeter about Exeter's Cycle Network. These are primarily through Exeter but do link up with the Estuary Trail. The consultations are on Tuesday 14th July 2pm to 8pm at County Hall Topsham Road entrance. on Wednesday 15th July 10am to 8pm in Princesshav Shopping Centre. Bedford Square near Barclays Bank and Thursday 16th July 2pm to 8pm at Sainsburys car park in Pinhoe road. You might wish to call at one of these and make your views known about the need for a safe alternative route in Lympstone or comment on line new.devon.gov.uk/haveyoursay

NEW ROAD PROPOSED IN LYMPSTONE

This is an, " Open Letter", to Lympstone Parish Council

Your primary aim MUST be to plan the BEST for the whole PARISH OF LYMPSTONE.

In the above connection we are totally unable to see even one good reason why you should give ANY assistance at all to the recent proposal to build an extension to Dinan Wav almost entirely on land within Lympstone Boundary. The Parish recent "Consultation" initially held in Brixington, despite the whole concept affecting Lympstone far more than any part of Exmouth, failed to put both sides of the question and was extremely poorly researched producing flawed "evidence" for any real necessity to build a road at all. It failed to address the problem of traffic hold-ups which would be far worse than those experienced in rush hour at present. The efforts to get onto either of the suggested roundabouts at ALL times throughout the day, with Dinan Way having traffic from priority from the right would cause disastrous tailbacks in Hulham Road and on the A376, especially the latter with the added lights at The Saddlers Imagine the chaos with Arms. summer holiday traffic! Added to this scenario is the horrendous propositions of 350 house at Goodmores Farm; 150 at Upper

Marley Road, 350 at Plumb Park with a further 46 at Littleham- 900 in all!! This means 1,800 cars all wanting to use the Dinan Way extension, plus 1,500 children going to school etc.

Very slight attention has been given to other problems, such as flooding in the village, the inevitable build up of even more unwanted houses smothering the beautiful Wotton Valley, the destruction of Farm Land and wild life Habitats and the total disappearance of a Green Wedge for which fought and won we at Courtlands Cross preventing Lympstone, the far more ancient settlement, being forced to join up with a town which does its best to destroy every wonderful natural asset it possesses!



Any extension whatsoever will inevitably open the floodgates to unneeded house building, unsupported by an

already weak infrastructure, five times manv cars/vans lorries etc as cramming up the village and the surrounding lanes and killing off our most important form of income, tourism. Already there are 150 people on the dole in Exmouth and the building of Cranbrook is designed to provide housing iobs. and infrastructure so there is absolutely NO NEED for any more housing nor anymore ROADS to be built here.

Clearly the whole concept of this proposed road is nothing but an ill conceived, out of date, waste of money which will destroy the life of our village. I suggest that our Parish Council has nothing more to do with it except to suggest that it is buried for all time and the funds far more usefully directed onwards to improving our present public transport etc etc
