PARISH COUNCIL

First Response Flood Protection.

The Parish Council has received a grant of over £900 to provide first response flood protection equipment. This equipment includes lockable grit bins, 3 of which will contain coarse sand for sand bags and the other will be used to store other equipment including sand bags (provided by EDDC), scoops to fill them with, 'Absorbees' which are used to protect door openings and 'hydra barriers' which can be filled with water and then used to divert the flow of flood water or stop it from going into some areas. The equipment will be managed by a team of volunteer Flood Wardens co-ordinated by Alan Burton. I am sure that all residents will be grateful for the work that this happy team do to protect areas of the village that are under threat from

flooding. This is not intended to be a firm solution to flooding but to give initial protection at short notice. The Parish Council continues to work with the Environment Agency to develop solutions to the bigger question of flooding in the Parish. It is clear that whilst some works will ease the problems and equipment such as this will offer some re-assurance, the only real solution lies in works much higher up the Wotton Brook and its feeder streams to hold back the flow of surface water from The Common and agricultural land in the very north of the Parish.

A New Parish Councillor The Parish Council is pleased to have co-opted local resident Rob Hilton as a new Parish Councillor to fill the vacancy left by Sandra Everett. Rob was 'signed-up' at the start of the meeting and soon showed a willingness to get involved in local matters. This brings the Parish Council back up to full strength and ready for a very busy year.

Budget for 2017/18 and your Council Tax. The Budget for next year is set out in this month's Lympstone Herald. This sets out the aims of the Parish Council for the next 12 months. The Parish Council continues to set aside funds for major projects associated with the Neighbourhood Plan and to meet its responsibility to re-surface part of the Village Hall car park. The overall budget shows a slight increase in the Council Tax that residents



will pay. For the average property, which is in Band D, your payment will go up by 32p (yes only 32p) for the year. If you have any questions about Parish Council finances please contact the Clerk on lympstonepc@gmail.com or if you have ideas for projects that the Parish Council might consider, please contact a Parish Councillor. I am sure you will know at least one of them but

their details are always on the Notice Boards.

EDDC has been reviewing the Infrastructure part of the Local Plan. The Infrastructure Delivery Plan contains a Schedule of infrastructure projects that are required to support and deliver housing and economic growth proposed in the Local Plan, including detail on priority, timescale, cost, funding, and delivery organisations. If a project does currently have a funding gap, this schedule can be used when considering projects that may be funded by the Community Infrastructure Levy (and other funding sources) in the future. The Parish Council noted that most of the projects are needed around Cranbrook rather than supporting existing communities. However there are four projects that directly affect Lympstone:-

1. A new 210 place Primary School with nursery provision. All but one of Exmouth's Primary Schools will be over capacity in the plan period. The cost of £3.4m does not include land purchase. It is expected that this will be at Goodmores Farm, off Dinan Way but this is not stated.
2. Extending platforms along the Avocet Line at a cost of £1m and will take place between 2016-2021 (Dependent on availability of rolling stock)
3. The completion of Dinan Way to the A376 is promoted in the Local

Plan as a key piece of infrastructure for providing suitable access to developments at the east of the town. The cost is said to be £12m but the Local Plan suggests it will be £8.5m with £3m of this coming from Community Infrastructure Levy. The Parish Council has already objected to the building of this road and will object most strongly to the use of any EDDC funds to help meet the cost.

4. Cycling/Walking Links between development sites and schools, employment sites town centre (including bus and train station), Exe Estuary Trail and Valley Parks, providing connections to areas of Exmouth also linked to regeneration objectives at a cost of £700K. The Parish Council will press for the creation of an off-road route for the Exe Estuary trail to make it safer to use and to encourage commuter use, where it is falling well behind its anticipated use.

Assets of Community Value & Right to Bid The Parish Council can nominate places and spaces in our community that are important to local people as Assets of Community Value and if they come up for sale, your community has the opportunity to bid for them. This applies to the Parish Council and any other community group. In order to do this, the Parish Council has to draw up a list of the 'Assets' that it considers to be of Community Value. This can include any land or premises in the parish

including community halls, pubs, shops or green spaces that are of value to your community. If any of these 'assets' ever come up for sale any community group can use the Community Right to bid for their purchase. The community group can have up to six months to raise the funds to bid for it. At the end of the period, the owner may sell it to whoever they wish and at whatever price they choose. Cllr Rob Longhurst has prepared a draft list for the Council to consider. (Sincere apologies for stating that the Village Hall is owned by the Parish Council. It is held by the Village Hall charity.) This will now be discussed in detail by a small group of Councillors before the Parish Council finally decides which 'assets' should be on a list to be submitted to EDDC.

Sewerage and flooding in the Village.



The Parish Council is aware that SWW are looking into schemes to stop the sewage surcharges to various properties in the Parish. No details have yet been revealed but the Parish Council feels that this is vital work and should not be delayed. The Parish Council will be meeting contractors next week to discuss their preliminary ideas.

DCC are currently looking at improvements to the culvert that goes under Longmeadow Road at Pretty Corner. Emergency works were

carried out a few months ago when part of the brick built culvert collapsed. The next stage should include some repairs and installing a structural liner to strengthen and help improve the hydraulic performance of the system and will be getting some quotes for the works in the next few weeks. They will update the Parish Council on how they intend to progress with this once we have some idea of the cost and feasibility of the works.

ACCIDENTS AND NEAR MISSES

An accident was reported in the book at Central Stores. A child of 7 was knocked down by a cyclist who came round the bend by the estuary at Sowden End at speed with no warning bell. A potential near miss was also reported at the Junction of Station Hill in The Strand: 2 cyclists travelling at 20mph sped down the hill onto The Strand without stopping, slowing down or looking at the junction. If a car had been travelling slowly from under the bridge there would have been a collision.

Devon County Council have promised speed reduction control and



strategically placed surface cobbles to encourage better road usage by cyclists both at the bottom of Station Hill and at the bend on Sowden Lane. Unfortunately despite frequent follow ups they have still not installed these. Their latest reply was they would do these before March 2017 - last year they said before March 2016!

Please continue to report incidents as it provides a valuable history which can be used to put pressure on DCC and provide evidence that we have raised concerns with them.

AVIAN INFLUENZA (BIRD FLU) OUTBREAK IN THE UK

As you will be aware there have been a number of Avian Influenza outbreaks in the UK and a Prevention Zone was declared in December that covers the whole of the UK.

The prevention zone means that all poultry keepers – whether on a commercial scale or simply a small backyard flock – are now required by law to house them (keep them under cover) or otherwise keep them separate from wild birds. This requirement (the Prevention Zone) has now been extended until 28 February 2017. They have also banned gatherings of poultry across the UK.

It is also important that poultry keepers must continue to keep a close watch on the health of their birds, and take steps to reduce the risk of infection via the environment, for example in wild bird droppings, by practising good biosecurity. You should do this even if your birds are inside. If they are concerned it is important that they contact their Vet.

This has been necessary because the same Avian Flu strain has also been found in wild birds in England, Scotland and Wales. DEFRA have taken this action to reduce the risks and help protect poultry and captive birds from avian flu.

Although we have been putting the message out on social media, not

everyone uses or looks at a computer. So to help us get this very important message to get out to everyone we would ask if something could be included in the parish magazine and/or put up in the village to raise awareness.

The Food Standards Agency advise that bird flu does not pose a food safety risk for UK consumers. **Properly cooked poultry and poultry products, including eggs, are safe to eat.**

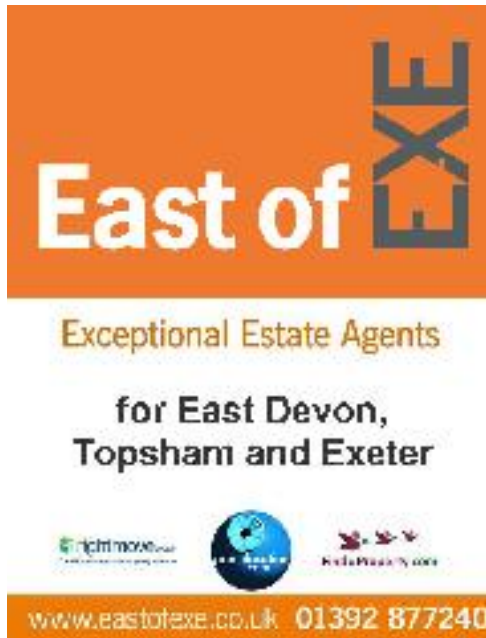

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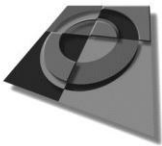
