Happy New Year from Cllr Jenny Clark, Chairman of Lympstone Parish Council.

Phew! What a year it has been. Last year the Parish Council was heavily involved in the development of the new Pre-school building. We all knew that this was essential to ensure that our community continued to be sustainable. Now Lympstone children can be looked after and educated from the age of 2 to 11, when they will go on to a senior school. This also helps to secure our Primary school for the future. The Parish Council decided, about two and a half years ago that if there was to be a new building, then it should be sited next to the Youth Club in Candy's Field. A series of lively public meetings were held and this view was fully endorsed. Ideally we would have had a new Youth Club building too and these could have swapped places so that the Pre-school could still have access to its excellent outdoor facilities. Unfortunately this did not happen but the result that we can now see is excellent and we all wish the staff and children of Lympstone Pre-school every success in their new 'home'.

During the year, Eddie Mingo and his daughter Lauren told us that they felt that it was time they handed over the reins of the Lympstone Youth Club to new people. Eddie and Lauren have run the Youth Club for seven years and it has been a great credit to them and a great facility for the children of the village. During that time some works had been carried out but the building was due for some refreshing. The Parish Council own the building and will readily admit that things had slipped a bit.

A task force was set up, ably led from the front by Cllr Phil Corcos with the help of other volunteers. The building now looks much smarter inside and out and has some exciting new equipment and activities for children to enjoy.

The Parish Council continues to look for volunteers to support the Youth Club to keep it a happy place for our children. A paid Youth Leader, Sue Briggs, has been appointed and she is supported by a team of volunteers and put many voluntary hours in herself. If you think that you would like to play a part in the Youth Club, whether you are a parent or not please contact Sue at the Youth Club hut on a Friday evening or contact any Parish Councillor. (Names and details are on the website and the Parish Notice Boards.)

During last year we said goodbye to Cllrs Rory Estcourt and Malcolm Lyon. Rory has moved away but Malcolm continues to play a leading role in the Village in other ways. We have been very fortunate to find two new Councillors. Rob Hilton joined the Parish Council on 9th January 2017 and John Montgomery has joined us on 5th January. Rob has already made a great contribution by taking over the editorship of the Lympstone Herald from Cllr Chris Carter.

The Parish Council is starting 2018 at full strength and our finances are in good order with some reserves to meet new challenges.


Lympstone FC needs help. Youth Football is the victim of its own success. It now desperately needs a new pitch in the Parish so that the 140+ youngsters involved in Youth Football (Girls and Boys) can continue to play successfully. The Parish Council has agreed to work with the Club to try to find a suitable pitch. If you are a landowner in the area and feel that you might be able to rent, lease or sell some land for a pitch to provide a space for the young footballers to play competitively, please contact the Club or a Parish Councillor with your ideas.

Flooding continues to be a risk in parts of the Parish. With funding from Devon Community Foundation and under the leadership of Cllr Phil Corcos, the Parish now has 20+ Flood Warden volunteers and two sets of First Response flood protection equipment. Further information on recent developments on page 11.

Finally, the Parish Council has set its budget for next year. This sets out how the money that you, the Council tax payers, contribute to Parish Council funds. The Parish Council heard requests that its share of your Council Tax should not increase this year and so the budget has been drawn up to respect this and so the amount that you pay for local things will not change this year.

The second booklet 'Cooking and Eating in a Devon Village: A Historical Scrapbook' (£3) provides a tasty mixture of historical snippets and modern recipes which use locally found ingredients that were commonly used in the past - like the three-cornered leek, cottagers kale, and sea-beet that grow prolifically in and around Lympstone. We have further booklets in development - thanks to those people who have contributed their artwork for our 'Sketches of Lympstone' booklet, which we hope to have ready by Easter.

FLOOD MANAGEMENT ISSUES

RECENT WEATHER EVENTS

Our dedicated team of flood wardens were out in force during the period of strong wind, heavy rain and high tide at the beginning of January. I am pleased to report that there was no serious flooding but there was localised flood water on several roads in the village.

NEW PROJECT

Good progress has been made on setting up a major project to review the flood risk in Lympstone and to identify and implement measures to reduce the risk (where appropriate). Led by Lympstone Parish Council, through its Flood Resilience Group, the project has the full support of the Environment Agency (EA). In addition to the EA, the Project Steering Group will include representatives of DCC, EDDC, South West Water, and other interested parties. This will help to ensure the project's success. The first phase of work (the flood risk assessment) is due to commence in early 2018 and will involve hydraulic modelling by consultants appointed by the EA. Overall, the project is likely to continue for up to 3 years, and we will keep you informed of progress.

YOUR INVOLVEMENT

The above project is a great opportunity for the village. To make the most of it, we need your help and support. Right now, we would really appreciate:

- any photos or videos of past floods (preferably identifying the date and location)
- information on any particular problems or issues that we might not be aware of.

LYMPSTONE LIVES

RICHARD CRISP has always enjoyed a volunteering dimension to his life, be it as a rally organiser & competitor with a motor club, Scouts as his son grew up, then WEA thereafter both in York and Exeter. Past chairman of Lympstone Twinning Association and Company secretary of the Norman Lockyer Observatory at Sidmouth, he is currently a trustee of the Village Hall and membership secretary of the Lympstone Fishery & Harbour Association.

How did you come to live in Lympstone?

I was born in Bristol, but after 25 years as a physicist at Rowntrees/Nestlé 'up north' in York, I wanted to move to an estuary in the West Country. Wife Anne, a "Lincolnshire Yellowbelly", stipulated that the SW was fine, but Cornwall was too far for our two children living in London to visit easily, so in spite of my Cornish roots (my mother's maiden name was Trethowan), Devon was the focus.

Rodney Dingle, who had been my tutor and rowing coach at Bryanston School, had been living in Church Road for some time. I had visited him in the intervening years, so Lympstone became the clear choice. I retired on a Friday and moved from a hamlet near York to a proper village, Lympstone, the following Monday!

What is the best thing about living in the village compared with a Yorkshire hamlet?

We knew everyone in our hamlet and quite a few in the surroundings, but we went to town for activities. Here, our friends are those with whom we share local activities. Lympstone's choice is renown. For me, retirement activity initially focused on the Sailing Club (Newsletter editor for 10 years), sailing and motorboating whilst for Anne, art, gardening, allotments, and dancing.

15 years on, I no longer sail a dinghy, but messing about in (and with) my motorboat is still a favourite occupation whilst serving on the Harbour Board.

Changes in Lympstone

Some dislike change without realising that their being here is part of that continuing change. At the harbour, I've witnessed the change from the simplicity of room for all, to the bureaucratic reality of an oversubscribed resource. Is this a sign of a healthy community? Or rather an indicator of **o**vercrowding spoiling the special values of our community?

What is one thing that would improve Lympstone life? Better weather for boating!




