

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Public Session - During the open session there was a presentation of landscaping the open space and village green at the Lympstone Nurseries site from Mr Ed Harbottle of Harrisbugg Landscaping Design. Mr Harbottle carefully and precisely discussed with the members of Lympstone Parish Council and the public the proposed design and layout. He discussed the use of different natural materials. shrubs, plants and trees to promote the shared space. There were plenty of pictures and designs to illustrate his ideas. The rural area would include: · Community orchard · Natural play, adventure and exploration • Meadow grasses • Attenuation pond.

Mr Harbottle explained how the natural play would be a beneficial part of the rural park. He had noted that already, in the village there was already a site for formal play. Therefore, here would be an opportunity, for a more rural landscape for natural play features for the use of different age groups.

It was a very interesting session and really good to hear all the views and beliefs from across the Parish.

Minutes - The minutes of last month's meeting were confirmed with only one amendment made by the Chairman, but not a bad effort for the new Clerks second attempt. On that note, may I introduce myself to you, the Parishioners

of Lympstone. My name is Lucy Tyrrell and I have grown up in the village, I have always worked in the village, from the paper shop to the local public houses — many of you would probably remember me first as your paper girl, I had rounds all over the village! I am very excited with the prospect of this new role and hope that I can respond appropriately to any queries quickly and effectively. I look forward to hearing from you!

Flood Risk Management – Councillor Miss Dimond gave an update regarding the Lympstone Flood Resilience Group (LFRG). Full details of the progress of the group can be found on page 12 and 13.

Casual Vacancy – There is still a casual vacancy on the Parish Council. It has been advertised in the Parish notice boards but please contact the Chairman Mrs Jenny Clark or Lucy Tyrrell, Clerk to the Council if you are interested in joining the Parish Council and finding out more about the role of a Parish Councillor.

Chairman's Report – The Chairman discussed the remembrance of commemorating 100 years of the end of WWI. She explained that we had permission granted to light the Beacon on Cliff Field. As November 11th 2018 falls on a Sunday, the Chairman

was keen to see a Parish community celebration take place. The Chairman is brimming with enthusiasm and needs your help, the Parishioners of our Village we need your ideas and thoughts to bring this momentous occasion to the forefront of all, young and old! Therefore the Chairman has proposed a meeting for anyone who wishes to share ideas and help to organise such an event, please come to the Village Hall committee room on the 16th July at 7pm.

County Councillors Reports – Councillor Trail informed the Parish Council that sadly he had to issue two notices to businesses in the village to remove their outside seating from the highway due to a local resident complaint. Councillor Montgomery asked what could be done about speeding cyclists through the village and Councillor Trail explained that it needed to be reported to the police not highways.

District Councillors Reports – Councillor Ingham thanked the people who came to the revised drainage scheme application at EDDC last month. He congratulated them on how articulate they were, how clear their evidence and proof was delivered both in speaking and writing. The decision made was profound to our Parish and allowed an opening to move forward. A special thank you was given by Councillor Ingham to Mr and Mrs Davis from LFRG for their detailed

report and to Councillor Atkins and Mr Tyrrell for their clear presentations. All these magnificent efforts managed to stop the revised drainage strategy from being approved.

Reports of Lead Councillors – Councillor Mrs Rogers reported to the Council that at the top end of Glebelands and Hunton Close there have been no street lights. DCC have been out and inspected the lights, however, it is not the lights that are broken but a failure with the power source. Western Power are coming out to look at the electricity distribution to the lights and rectify.

Finally, the Chairman read out correspondence in regards to a thank you letter received to the Parish Council from the WI for the loan of the Parish Councils overhead projector, which was very kind of them to write. The Chairman also thanked Mrs Day for noticing the water butt at the station was empty and quickly resolved the problems with attentive members of the village.

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
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FURRY DANCE NEWS

Mission To Seafarers supported by Sea Sunday

The Mission to Seafarers has its roots in the work of Anglican priest, John Ashley who in 1835 was on the shore at Clevedon with his son who asked him how the people on ships in the Bristol Channel could go to church. Recognising the needs of the seafarers on the four hundred sailing vessels in the Bristol Channel, he created the Bristol Channel Mission. He raised funds, and in 1839 a specially designed mission cutter named Eirene was built with a main cabin which could be converted into a chapel for 100 people. His work inspired similar ministries in the UK, and it was decided in 1856 that these groups should be formally organised under the name The Mission to Seamen Afloat, at Home and Abroad.

In 1858, this name was changed to The Missions to Seamen, and the organisation adopted its Flying Angel logo, still in use to this day.

FLOOD RISK MANAGEMENT

Amid the sunshine, it seems strange to write about flooding. But the work of the Lympstone Flood Resilience Group and Flood Wardens continues come rain or shine!

Project Update:

The Lympstone Flood Risk Management Project is progressing well, and the benefits of working in partnership with the Flood Risk Agencies (Environment Agency, Devon County Council, East Devon County Council, and South West Water) are beginning to be realised. Important recent developments include:

- Start of the Environment Agency's hydraulic modelling study (to help us better understand the flood risk and identify appropriate measures to reduce the risk) - including a start-up meeting and tour of the catchment on 19th June.
- Start of the upper catchment study – our consultant is working with landowners to identify risks and opportunities, and will also be observing runoff from the land during significant rainfall events (all of which will help ground truth the hydraulic model and identify practical ways to reduce the risk of flooding).
- Ongoing work with the Environment Agency to ensure the existing flood defences are effective – including a survey of Wotton Brook around the flood plain to be conducted on 9th and 10th July by the Agency's surveyors, Lewis Brown.
- Organisation of a meeting on planning and development issues related to drainage and flood risk

(to be held with representatives of all of the flood risk agencies in September).

Flood Wardens' Activities:

As we all know, our flood wardens are vital in monitoring potential flood conditions and responding to actual flood events. A very constructive meeting was held on 22nd May to opportunities for discuss practical improvement. Some good suggestions were made such as obtaining gauge boards and other useful tools, and making practical improvements to our organisation, e.g., some wardens adopting a 'patch' of the Wotton Brook to monitor conditions and support local residents. The Environment Agency has offered further training, and work is planned to formalise procedures.

MEMORIES OF LYMPSTONE By Alan Child

When I were a lad (many years ago) for a couple of weeks during the months of June and July the sweet aroma of new mown hay wafted through the village. It was 'Hay Making time'. The time when the local farmers harvested the lush summer grass in their fields for storage for winter fodder for their cattle.

Firstly the long grass was cut and left in the fields to dry. To ensure it was dry enough for storage it had to be turned over daily with pitchforks. When sufficiently dry it was manually raked into rows for transfer into large heaps by a contraption called a Sweep (A large wooden rake which was towed by a tractor or lorry) These hay piles were then transported to a dutch barn or hay rick where the dried grass was stored for winter fodder.

Each farmer had their own crew but I always worked for George Morrish of Underhill Farm alongside my father, George and Lambert Cann and Sam Eyres and of course George himself. Hard but enjoyable work but at the end of each day we were rewarded with a few jars of scrumpy in the cider shed.

Sadly these days are gone for ever. There are no longer any cattle farms in the Village, any grass that is stored is either baled or turned into silage and many of the hay fields have been developed for housing and are now concrete and tarmac. I feel very lucky and privileged to have enjoyed this wonderful part of Lympstone life.

burgers, the bar and the ice cream may still be the star attractions - but both sides turned up with a competitive team. Lympstone, batting first, got off to a brisk start, Mullen especially, who in characteristic fashion belted most balls to the boundary until the retirement score of 30. School's bowling, including their quest Chief's star Tom Johnson looking good in proper whites – was mostly tidy, but singles were easy enough to find. 


fees for a student at Pathshala Media Institute for a year.

His family wanted to set up a memorial for him which would acknowledge both the deep love he had developed for the Indian sub-continent in the preceding three months and his commitment to film.
