PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

After a beautiful summer break, it was a jam packed agenda at September's Parish Council meeting with many members of the public present. The last couple of months have been very busy, behind the scenes, for Councillors with: a new Village Hall car park and white lining, bin store and preparation work for a new Muga in Candy's Field. Lympstone Football Club also met with Councillors to discuss the use of Candy's Field for youth football sessions which was agreed and permission granted.

Minutes – The minutes of the parish council meeting held on 2nd July and the planning meeting held on 30th July were confirmed as a correct record and signed by the Chairman.

Flood Risk management – The LFRG met to discuss and look at the drainage of an alternative route from the Strawberry Hill development. District Cllr Longhurst explained that EDDC have not agreed any drainage strategy until their questions have been thoroughly answered from SWW.

Casual Vacancy - The chairman explained there were two parties interested in the vacancies and invited them to come along to the October meeting to express their interest in joining the Parish Council. Footpaths - The new footpaths and bridleway proposal was discussed with mixed opinions from the public. The views of the public included the following:

- Excited about the proposed and defined bridleway.
- Always been used by horse riders.
- Concerned if cyclists would use it.
- This is private land not public land.
- Many horse riders will use and can use the Brook instead of the footpath.

Cllr Atkins read his report on the local history of the fields and reviewed footpath. Cllr Acca expressed his concerns regarding the horses churning up the field in wet weather.

The Chairman reminded the public that the Council have a meeting planned with the landowners in early October to discuss footpaths.

Chairman's report - The Chairman congratulated everyone who organised and took part in the Furry Dance this year. The sun shone and it was a very joyful event for the whole community both young and old! The Chairman also congratulated the Garden Club on another successful Flower Show which displayed the variety of wondrous talented, green fingered and creative parishioners we have.

Finally, the Chairman also reminded everyone to please come along and support Lympstone Pre-school fund raising event. They are hosting an open air cinema in Candy's Field viewing 'The Greatest Showman' on 29th September 8pm - 10pm. (Tickets are on sale from the village stores and Lympstone Preschool £8.50 per adult and £7.50 for children 4 – 15yrs)

District council reports – District Cllr Longhurst reminded the Parish Council that it is imperative to update and review our Neighbourhood Plan before any future strategic planning documents come in to force from the Government and EDDC.

Temporary Car Park – District Cllr Longhurst reassured all that he has informed EDDC that the temporary car park is not necessary or needed in the village. He went on to explain that no further argument is required and it should be returned to its original field state. A member of the public expressed concerns of many people parking vehicles in Underhill Crescent and leaving campervans parked there for up to three weeks!

Review of charges of burials – Cllr Atkins reported on Lympstone Parish Burial charges and compared them with two other local Parish costings. On reflection, he believed that our charges should be increased. All the councillors were unanimous with this decision and therefore our costs will be rising.

Multi Use Games Area (Muga) - Cllr Atkins reported that the ground and stone work will be completed this week and the tarmac is due next week. So, very soon, the local children will get their Muga back and can enjoy playing on the area once again!

Candy's Field: 18/03648/GNDGBY -Dog fouling and dogs off lead complaints - Sadly, irresponsible dog owners have caused EDDC to become involved with the dog fouling in our much loved Candy's Flied. An area where families and children roam and play is spoilt with irresponsible dog owners allowing their dogs to foul without clearing it up! It is a serious health hazard for children and the council are seriously looking in to how we can be more vigilant in policing this mess being left. Ultimately if a solution is not found then there could be the potential to ban dogs in the field altogether which would be a terrible shame.

A PENSIONER'S TRAVELS - AN UPDATE FROM PANAMA

I had a sort of plan, but the overland traveller needs to be flexible! After leaving Alaska I was going to turn South in the Canadian Yukon, and was looking forward to warmer weather. Then I met Nico, another solo motorbike traveller, at a petrol station in Dawson City. He was thinking of heading to the remote and northernmost settlement of Tuktovaktuk in Canada, home to the Inuvialuit, and 400 miles north of the arctic circle on a dirt road. He was looking for a riding partner and I said yes. It was a demanding ride over three days, but we had 24 hours of daylight, and I knew when I stepped on to the vast ice sheet covering the Beaufort sea in the Arctic Ocean that this was my true starting point for my ride to Ushuaia, the southernmost town in Argentina.

I'm in Panama City now, writing this eighty days into my journey, in which time Phileas Fogg had travelled round the world, so I can't compete with only 11,500 miles under my belt! It's been a great adventure thus far, including some amazingly lucky encounters with great people along the way. I panned for gold in the Pelley river, a tributary of the Yukon, with a tough old gold prospector, Kelvin, and his three legged pit bull, Brave; then a few days later had a private, guided tour of one of the biggest pulp mills in Canada by Fido (really) who came and chatted to me in a car park, curious about the Uk number plate on the bike. It turned out he was on his lunch break on his last day at work before retiring after 35 years at the factory; I said how interested I was in factories and industrial production, and a few minutes later donned a hard hat and hi vis jacket for my tour. Everywhere, and in so many ways, almost everyone I have met has been kind, supportive and generous.

The most spectacular places, scenically, have been Alaska, the arctic circle and the Yukon at the start of the journey for the breathtaking, rugged, isolated and mountainous terrain, and especially a close up view of nature's extraordinary Salmon glacier in northern British Columbia. More recently, the arid but awesome desert of the Baha peninsular of Mexico, and its very demanding off road sections, was an unforgettable experience. And the central Americas, with their subtropical greenery, mid afternoon monsoon-like storms, and saturating humidity, provided a different challenge.

I have taken the time to enjoy a few tourist activities along the way; a visit to the Mayan ruins of Chechen Itza in Mexico, watching the divers in Acapulco, climbing two volcanoes in Nicaragua, and getting a close up look at the Panama Canal, was time well spent, and good mini breaks from the bike.

So far, I have never felt unsafe or threatened; I have taken a few off

road routes to make the riding more interesting, and the bike has held up well, with just routine maintenance needed. I'm taking a boat from here to the northern Colombian coast as there is no road through the impassable Darien gap of the Amazon rainforest to South America. It'll be a welcome break of a few days, then it's back in the saddle for part two! I will continue to post updates on my Facebook page.



LYMPSTONE LIVES - DAVID ATKINS



Born in Pontefract, Yorkshire in 1939, moved to Hertfordshire 6 months later. Parents moved from Barnet, near St. Albans, Hertfordshire in 1945. Father was working with the Air Ministry in the South West as a surveyor re airfields with war damage. He had digs in Majorfield Road in Topsham with a Mr and Mrs Barnett. Arrangements were made for my mother and I to join him (he considered the area was a safer place than St. Albans). We moved from Topsham to Lympstone Village and stayed at the home of Mrs Reynolds and Miss Mitchell (Topsy and

M) beside The Swan (then known as 'The Railway Hotel/Pub' - Mr and Mrs Wheeler being the tenants). The property known as 'The Firs', at the bottom of School Hill, was about to be put up for sale and father managed to purchase it. I was put to school at a private school at Topsham called 'The Moorings', the Headmistress being a Miss Jackson who resided at Lympstone House. The Wheelers daughter, Ann and Wendy also attended with me. Once settled in at 'The Firs', I attended Lympstone Primary School before being sent to Mount Radford School in Exeter.

Being next to the open field belonging to Albert Ware I was asked by Charlie Ware if I would like a ride on the carthorse known as General, to which I agreed. I then visited the farm 'Town Dairy' and watched the hand milking of the cows and soon was instructed on how to get the milk out of the cows. (Not by pumping the tail!) I also helped Tom Ware do part of the milk delivery round in the village at weekends and school holidays. Bill Ware was the tractor driver (a Standard Fordson). I was 7 years old when in the field below the Marine Officers houses I was riding on the foot plate and Billy got off to clear the cultivator of trash, which had built up between the tines. Leaving me holding the steering wheel. The hedge that bordered the area where the houses are was fast approaching and I started to get worried as to what to do (I could not have stopped as the clutch and bring the combination around to line up with where it previously travelled commonly known as a land. The best way to learn! I was then allowed to drive on other occasions.

I left school with great relief in 1954 and went to work at Pitt Farm before going to Bicton School of Agriculture 1955/56. I then was granted the tenancy of Potters Farm in September 1956 at the age 17, father having to hold the tenancy. In 1960 I took on the tenancy of Pitt Farm and kept Ayrshire cows at Potters and Guernsey's at Pitt.

Having been in the church choir and a server I joined the Parochial Church Council (P.C.C) before being elected to the Parish Council in 1968. In 1973 I gained a place on East Devon District Council which had taken over from all the small borough and rural councils in East Devon. To this body I became Vice Chairman of the Environmental Committee, then Chair of Property services, followed by Chair of Tourism, then Chair of Planning. I was on many outside bodies including Governor of Exmouth Community College, Bicton School of Agriculture (now Bicton and Lympstone College) Primary School. I was also the first Chair of the PTFA of the school and have been Chairman of the Parish Council on three occasions during my 50 years on the Parish Council. I also represented all the District Councils in Devon on the National Association of District Councils in London in respect of tourism.

I have a daughter, Paula Lee married to Nigel and two granddaughters, Katie and Sophie.

FLOOD RISK MANAGEMENT

The work the Flood Risk on Management Project continues apace. Over the Summer, members of the Flood Resilience Group have met with the Environment Agency (EA) to identify opportunities to strengthen existing flood defences in the village. This includes improvements to the screen by Chapel Road and the flood protection wall in the main car park. We will continue working closely with the EA to ensure the benefits to the village are maximised and the impacts during construction are minimised.

There are also plans to conduct a drainage survey in Lower Lympstone around Chapel Road (a well recognised 'flood hotspot') to investigate practical ways to minimise the risk of flooding in this area. This is funded by Devon County Council and scheduled for the early Autumn.

Another important milestone is a meeting on planning and development issues between the Flood Resilience Group and representatives of the flood risk agencies (EA, DCC, EDDC and SWW) in September. This will be an opportunity to discuss our experience of the planning process regarding drainage and flood risk, and focus on opportunities to improve outcomes for the future.

Work on other elements of the project, including the hydraulic modelling study and upper catchment study, continues.
