PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

October's meeting was another busy one with a full agenda! There were lots of items to get through with a variety of topics to discuss.

Public Session – A member of the public read his report on street parking along The Strand. In summary, he is advocating removing the three parking spaces on the left before the railway bridge as they pose a hazard to the disabled, and those with buggies or walking aids. He was concerned with the vehicles parked along the narrow part of the road as road users often park on the pavement edge which causes pedestrians, (especially the vulnerable) to have to walk down the centre of the road and put themselves in unnecessary danger.

Another member of the public expressed a strong concern regarding the back up of traffic that stems from the traffic lights at the Saddlers Arms and down Longmeadow Road. He was concerned that the congestion had become more frequent and the implications this had along the main Exeter/Exmouth Road and Longmeadow Road. He believes it is only a matter of time before an accident will happen. Road users queuing on Longmeadow Road are seemingly not reading the road and overtaking cars which are stationary to wait for the oncoming traffic to pass! County Councillor Scott was present and will report the matter to Highways.

Flood Risk management – The LFRG had complied a full report which Cllr Dimond presented to the meeting. The group has been exceptional busy throughout September when a second meeting was held with all relevant parties (SWW, EDDC, DCC, Environment Agency). Actions are ongoing.

Casual Vacancy – I am pleased to announce that we have a new face on our Parish Council! Mr Stephen Turner was successfully co-opted as a Parish Councillor at the meeting. Mr Turner gave a presentation explaining his background, family life and passion for Lympstone. It was a unanimous decision from all Councillors to welcome him on board.

We still have one more vacancy for any budding Councillors out there – please do get in touch with me or any of our Councillors if you are interested in joining us!

Chairman's report – The Chairman has had a busy month of meetings. She has been involved with the Youth Club and formalising their accounts with the Youth Group Leader. She has met with Cllr Rogers and Mrs Carter to discuss the Exe Estuary Trail. She has had copious meeting with Mrs Lyon regarding the Armistice Day celebrations (inside this month's Herald article is a flyer of events planned from Friday 9th through to Sunday11th). This is a full weekend of events for all ages and interests culminating in a beacon being lit at 1900 on Cliff Field – this will be part of a national network of over 1,000 beacons. All the events on Saturday and Sunday are free. The timetable of events can be found on the flyer enclosed and displayed on the village website. The fine details of events will be posted on telegraph poles and on the web site as the date approaches. We do hope as many people as possible can join us and celebrate this momentous occasion. Additionally, if anyone is able to volunteer to help with the events planned please contact our Chairman, Mrs Jenny Clark or me to get involved and ensure the weekend can run as smoothly as possible for us all to enjoy. Thank you.

District council reports – Cllr Ingham responded to the member of the public regarding parking along The Strand. He asked the Parish Council to consider the report written as it had raised valid and thought provoking reasons.

Cllr Longhurst reported that he has challenged EDDC over money spent on consultancy fees involved with the Greater Exeter Strategic Plan and is currently awaiting answers. He is also hoping to get Lympstone involved in a renewable energy scheme regarding electricity supplied to our homes.

Neighbourhood Plan Review – A long discussion took placed around the review and update of the Neighbourhood Plan. The Chair proposed that a working group should be established

from people across the Parish. District Cllr Longhurst has taken the first step in leading this group and welcomes support from anyone who wishes to get involved. Please contact Cllr Rob Longhurst if you are interested in joining the working group.

Multi Use Games Area (MUGA) -Cllr Atkins reported that the MUGA in Candy's Field is complete! All Councillors have seen the children use and enjoy it again.

Candy's Field: 18/03648/GNDGBY - Dog fouling and dogs off lead complaints – This is still ongoing and EDDC are currently looking into cameras being used in Candy's Field to monitor irresponsible dog owners. You will be informed if and when these are installed.

Clerk's Action List - It has been a very busy month for me and I am hoping I have managed to keep on top of responding to your phone calls and emails to resolve any issues raised. Thank you to everyone who knows me or has met me through this role for your continued support and thanks. It is all gratefully received. I am thoroughly enjoying my new role and being an active part of the Parish life.

Lympstone's cricketers ended a reasonably successful season (won 9, lost 6) with an enjoyable September weekend tour on the fringes of Dartmoor. On the Saturday a depleted team of 9 including three press ganged men almost beat their old friends Erratics in a low scoring 35 over match at Ashburton, only to lose oh so narrowly on the last ball of the game.

Batting first only Ben Abrahams and Burton got much into double figures and a total of 121 wasn't a lot to show from 27 overs. Man of the match McGregor (who bowled unchanged for 11 overs) and Creighton were soon taking wickets aplenty though and with good support from Burton and 6 catches being taken, they reduced Erratics to 70 for 8. The ninth wicket pair then put on almost enough to win before Burton separated them and gave Lympstone sight of victory. Sadly it was not to be, the last ball clinching it for the home team.

Saturday night saw the lads tucked up in hotel beds with their cocoa not much after 10 o'clock, whilst porkers flew overhead.

On Sunday Lympstone visited the delightful slopes of Marldon, which even their ancient road roller, driven lovingly by the wicket keeper, could not flatten entirely. A pre-match coffee was sought in the adjacent and equally delightful Church House Inn, where a jovial landlord exclaimed "You're the Lympstone team? We were expecting a bunch of marines – my bar staff will be very disappointed".

A younger and nimbler Marldon team, who had clearly not overdosed on cocoa, executed a proper drubbing – amassing over 230 for the loss of not many, though new Villager Archer got his first wicket thanks to a fine one handed catch by Ben Abrahams. Burton (who had bowled well) was man of the match for his 66 in Lympstone's reply, but Creighton and Carr also delayed the inevitable by a few overs with their best knocks of the season. *Scorer Day*

FROM AMIENS TO THE ARMISTICE

The 'Great War' of 1914 - 18 now seems to us a conflict on an unimaginable scale and tragedy -- four years of unremitting trench combat in which millions of lives were lost for a few yards of mud. Then seemingly miraculously the hundred days from the Battle of Amiens in August 1918 to the Armistice in November saw the British army advance further in three months than it had done in four years and the Allies achieve total victory. Why?


This is the central question in the illustrated talk Colonel Graeme Wheeler is giving at 7.30pm on Friday 2 November in the Village Hall. Graeme says "How and why it came to an end is not widely understood and often misreported in an age in which the reasons for the war seem obscure and the losses unjustifiable."

Graeme is a highly informative and entertaining speaker - as some of us can recall from the talks he gave to mark the bicentenaries of the battles of Trafalgar and Waterloo - so a memorable evening is in prospect!

Tickets are £3 - pay on the door, opening from 7.00pm - as will the bar!

The proceeds from the evening, after expenses, will go the Royal British Legion Poppy Appeal and the Friends of the Church, who fundraise to help maintain the church building.

BANNERS, POM POMS AND RUFFLES

A banner proclaiming 'VOTES FOR WOMEN – Welcome Sylvia Pankhurst' has been created by Sally Harradine in the purple, white and green colours of the Suffragettes. It can be seen in the Players' production of Oh What a Lovely War in the last week of November.

This is just one of the many props being made. John Merritt is building a mobile Sarajevan beer stall and some circus tubs, amongst other wooden constructions, and Hen Wilkinson is gathering together a large and varied collection of hats, military and civilian, which the cast will use to change character instantaneously. The costume team led by Pat Boaden and Anna Streather, are busy making bespoke white Pierrot costumes with pom poms and ruffles which will be worn by all members of the 16 strong cast.

For this is a show by a troupe of seaside Pierrots, acting out the First World War, and singing songs written by the soldiers who fought in it. They use popular tunes of the time, taken from musical hall, cabaret and hymns ancient and modern. The fun on stage is counteracted by the slides of photographs from the war, projected onto a screen that is flown in and out of the action, and by a running newspanel which keeps us up to date on the battles and their outcome, and the casualty figures that each yard of progress costs. This extraordinary musical entertainment was created bv Joan Littlewood 55 years ago, and remains as fresh as ever. It is being performed by The Lympstone Players as a vibrant tribute to the satirical humour, comradeship and resilience of the soldiers who fought and died. The programme will carry the list of names on Lympstone War Memorial, commemorating those who died in a war that ended just 100 years ago.

The director of the show, Harland Walshaw, has assembled a team which includes a professional Musical Director, Sandra Jepps, a band of six professional instrumentalists, a professional Movement Director, Caterina Lau, a Voice Coach, Opera Singer Mary Burman, as well as a large backstage team of Lympstone Players working on lighting, projection, calling, make up, and of course Deb Mitchell in charge of set design.

Two stages are being used, and the back two rows of the audience will be raised. Tickets at £12.50 for adults and £8 for under 16s are available from Demelza, 2 Brookfield Cottages, Lympstone EX8 5ES, email: lympstone-entertainments. net, tel. 01395 272 243, or by posting money through her door. My family has been a big influence on my life. My Mum has taught me that you should never give up and always stand up for what you believe.

Losing my dad was one of the hardest things I've ever had to go through. We had a really close relationship when I was younger and unfortunately he passed away when I was twelve. I have taken forward with me his values of hard work, determination and the ability to have fun: even when times are hard.

My husband has been around for longer than I care to remember. We met each other fourteen years ago, have been married for eleven, and I like to think that we make a pretty good team. DRONES

There have been a couple of occasions recently where a drone has been flying over some of the houses and gardens in Lympstone.

There are both safety and privacy issues here.

Certainly I don't want to stop people's fun or enjoyment of these amazing machines, but it's important for anyone flying them to understand the legalities and where you can legally fly them.

All flying machines, model aircraft or otherwise are subject to the CAA Air Navigation Order. This is UK law.

The ANO refers to model aircraft drones as 'small unmanned surveillance aircraft'.

Article 167 of the ANO states: The person in charge of a small unmanned surveillance aircraft must not fly the aircraft within 50 metres of any person, vessel, vehicle or structure.

To be clear about this, if you fly a drone over other peoples land or property, you are breaking the law.

I'm sure many people who fly these are unaware of this, as it is not something that most drone suppliers make people aware of.

However the CAA have already

prosecuted, and will actively pursue complaints against, those who operate drones in contravention of the law. *A Concerned Besident*
