PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

A lively discussion was held at another busy Parish Council meeting with many different topics raised.

Public Session:

- Parking outside the Swan a resident asked for clarification regarding ownership of the land between the Swan Wall and the public highway as they had received a parking ticket there. The Clerk is to clarify the ownership of this land.
- Another resident expressed concerns regarding pollution and sewage in the Wotton Brook. Cllr Dimond is already speaking with EDDC and the Environment Agency and will expedite this matter.
- The village store's shop window display was raised by a resident who would like to see it changed. All Councillors were against raising this with the shop, which is a vital asset to your village and needs community support.
- The Exe Estuary Trail a further meeting has been held with DCC and it was requested money be put aside in the budget to support a feasibility report on the proposed changes.
- The Public Toilets a resident raised how dated and shabby the public toilets were. The council agreed that a review was needed and will action this.
 Flood Risk management – We gladly welcomed Cllr Corcos back from his mammoth charity motorcycle ride – it

was great to see him back safely and healthy! He reminded everyone present that there would be a community drop in event on the 18th December 2018 for the public to learn more about LFRG and the Environment Agency (EA). The LFRG had complied a full report for November which Cllr Corcos delivered with enthusiasm and presented to the meeting (as if he had never been He also added that from away!) January to approximately March there would be essential and urgent works to the wall along Wotton Brook in the car park. Unfortunately, this means that a possible 15 car parking spaces will be taken up by the EA whilst this work is carried out.

Casual Vacancy – The Chairman explained that we still have a Councillor vacancy. Remember, the best way to be part of the action, rather than just speaking from the public stand, is to become part of the Parish Council body to share your personal expertise and knowledge to get things resolved. If you think you could make a real difference, then please do get in touch with me, the Clerk, or any of our Councillors to apply. Village Car Park - Andrew Ennis (Service Lead for Environmental Health and Car Parks) from EDDC attended the meeting to discuss the village car park. He explained, in detail, available parking spaces, permits sold to residents, profits, expenses inc

maintenance, charges, wardens and enforcements. He was very informative and gave a clear insight into the pros and cons of the car park.

This then led to a further heated debate about the parking in general available in the village. It was resolved that in the New Year a working group should be set up to review matters.

Chairman's report - The Chairman said a huge thank you to Linda Lyon from the Community Hub Group for overseeing and organising a very successful community Armistice Day Remembrance weekend. All the feedback from Parishioners had been positive and welcomed. The Chairman also thanked the Royal Marines for lending their marquees, the history Society for their research and exhibition, the Scouts for serving the food and the PTFA for the cakes, teas and drinks. Couty Councillor Scott had facilitated a grant, and due to the huge number of volunteer hours, the Chairman estimated the weekend had cost the village some £200-£300 which was a fantastic achievement for an event on this scale. So, thank you, everyone!

Neighbourhood Plan Review – Cllr Longhurst reported that there was now a committee established to lead and oversee the review and they had already met twice. He explained that funding could be secured for the review and any consultancies. He added that this was new ground and a review had not been done before therefore he could

not say, at this stage, whether it would be a rewrite or a simple tweaking of the current neighbourhood plan. There will be a first village open meeting on 24th January 2019 at 7pm in the Village Hall. Please come along, share your ideas and discuss proposals to shape the future of our village.

Gulliford Cemetery – The Chairman explained why Gulliford Cemetery had been closed and gates locked. See page 7.

Budget 2019-2020 — Cllr Atkins went through the budget proposed and with a couple of amendments everyone agreed with the proposals. An amended and final budget will be discussed at the January meeting.

Estates – Last month the Parish Council requested feedback from parishioners regarding a self-closing gate to be installed at the bottom of the path between Trafalgar Road to Candy's Field. Currently no one has reported any opinions. The Parish Council welcome your views before a decision is made or action taken on your behalf. Finally, all Lympstone Councillors would like to take this opportunity to thank you for your continued support. May you all have a very Merry Christmas and Happy, Healthy New Year!

From the Film evening on Friday to the Beacon lighting on Sunday evening, we believe over 400 people attended the events. The whole community was involved, from the children who made and displayed their poppies to Mary Truell who so enthusiastically lit our Beacon.


The Armistice Centenary Event was organised and financed by the Lympstone Community Hub Fund,

which is given funding each year by the government through the Neighbourhood Plan. The main aim of the Community Hub is to facilitate and support events and projects in our village that will benefit the whole of our community and are free to participants. As this was a free community event Devon County Councillors also provided funding, which enabled the Village Hall to be hired for the whole weekend.

Earlier this year a wide cross-section of community members formed a strategy group to formalise how the Community Hub could operate to facilitate and to provide funds for events such as the Armistice Centenary. The intention for next year is to revive the 'Welcome to Lympstone' Booklet and organise a social event in the Village Hall to showcase the opportunities our Village offers. We also intend to facilitate and support a 'free' community event in summer 2019. A number of visitors to the '27 Men' Exhibition expressed an interest in researching more about Lympstone's history, which the Fund and Devon County Councillors could support.



IN PRAISE OF CIDER

A musical entertainment celebrating Devon's most famous drink will be performed by Paul Downes, Heather Redding and Graham Banks in Lympstone Village Hall on Twelfth Night – but at lunchtime! It features cider songs and sketches which tell the story of cider making in the county, and champion real farm cider as opposed to the fizzy commercial version.

Twelfth Night is traditionally the time for wassailing your apple trees, to make sure that they bear lots of fruit, and the show starts with a wassailing song and lots of noise to frighten the devil out of the trees. "Give I a gallon of cider" is the refrain of one of the songs, and under its influence we meet Farmer Tasker, who pays his workers in cider; a true blood Romany gypsy, first class, weaned on cider; and the marketing executive of Crossbow Cider, Mr Norman Pretence: "Crossbow shoots a bolt through your thirst!"

Originally devised and written by actors of the Orchard Theatre Company in 1979, it toured the pubs of North Devon and beyond. Directed then, as now, by Harland Walshaw, it was a popular success for the Beaford Centre's professional touring theatre.

Accompanying the 45 minute show will be a Cider Lunch, served at café tables, and included in the ticket price of £12.00.
