PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

The Chairman welcomed and wished everyone present a very Happy New Year before an number of different areas were raised by members of the public including:

- A resident raised their concern for a drain cover in the Strand which is disintegrating rapidly and is a danger to the public. Parish Clerk to notify DCC and contact BT as soon as possible.
- Another resident reported that their grandson had been hit by a car driving too fast round Pretty Corner. If any member of the public witnesses or is involved in this kind of incident it is paramount that it is reported to the police.
- A resident has been having positive meetings with DCC and Network rail regarding the Exe Estuary Trail. She will report back to the council with their findings and conclusions of the future of the trail. This is an exciting development for our plan to have an off-road section of track through the village.
- The Neighbourhood Plan was questioned by a resident. They wanted to know why the Nurseries development was being supported by the Parish Council when it broke policy in the NP. The Chair explained with District Cllr Longhurst that only a small part of the development was outside of policy and this

had been highlighted. The public consultation had now closed, the planning application was now being dealt with solely by EDDC.

Flood Risk management – Cllr Corcos reported that around 80 people in total had attended the drop in meeting last month. He highlighted another Strawberry Hill road closure due on the 14th January from the KD Home development for surface water drainage.

He also requested permission for the LFRG to submit a bid for Communities Together Funding for a soil survey in the Wootton Brook catchment. The aim is to support the flood risk management work since the structure and condition of the soil are fundamental to the risk of runoff and to the selection of potential interventions. The Parish Council fully supported this proposal.

Casual Vacancy — Unfortunately, the Chairman announced that she had received a resignation from one of our Councillors. Therefore, we now have 2 vacancies on the Council. It has been noted that more members of the public are attending the council meetings with many issues to share. So, it would be great if some of our public would be happy to join the Council and help make the difference or change needed rather than just voice it. If you would like to know more about being a Parish Councillor then please do get in touch

with me, the Clerk, or any of our Councillors to apply.

County Councillors Report – Cllr Atkins brought up the ownership of the strip of land outside the wall of the Swan Public House and the double yellow lines demarking the highway. DCC are claiming this land as theirs and Cllr Atkins challenged this. County Cllr Trail and Scott explained they would take this back to highways to clarify.

District Councillors Reports – Cllr Longhurst shared the good news regarding an ex-military gentleman, who had taken up residency under the bridge in the Strand. Cllr Longhurst was happy to report that he had been registered and was now warm and comfortable in temporary accommodation. The gentleman wanted his thanks shared to the community of the village who helped and East Devon Council who acted quickly to support him.

Cllr Ingham explained he has challenged EDDC on some areas of codes of conduct and finances and is waiting for a response from them.

Trafalgar Road - Candy's Field Path Three people have responded to express their views on the path. Cllr Rogers will meet with CTCRM to discuss the shared responsibility and the possibility of widening the path, removing of trees and having staggered gates to slow the cyclists and scooters entering the field.

Budget 2019-2020 – Cllr Atkins went through the amended budget proposal.

It was unanimously agreed by all councillors to submit to EDDC.

NP Projects Group — District Cllr Longhurst spoke on the review of our current NP review. He highlighted the village open meeting to be held on the 24th January at 7pm in the Village Hall. A meeting for all Parishioners to come and share their future ideas and projects in the village. It is a valuable meeting to come and have your say on what is important to you in the village. (Please see full advert in Herald).

Matters raised by Councillors – It had been noted by Cllrs that the lamp posts throughout the village are being used as advertising boards. Please remember, that once an event has taken place any notices must be removed not left to litter the village. Also, a gentle reminder that dogs in Candy's Field must be kept on a lead and dog poo, wherever it is, MUST BE CLEANED UP by the responsible dog owner.

Cllr Young explained the mini digger that had appeared in Candy's Field. It is for the installation of the Devon Air Ambulance lighting pole for the helicopter landing site.

The Church moves forward in 2019

In the early part of the year a consultation exercise will be undertaken with leaders of community groups gathering their group's views on how the church building can be a sustainable place of worship, welcoming, useable, a community resource and a Mission Focus.

This year we move from the focus on those charities the church financially supports to what mission means for individuals in the church, starting with James Hutchings

"Mission" is a much mis-used word - for some people conjuring up images of Victorian missionaries going overseas, for others an Oscar winning film about the Spanish in South America, and for many of us more recently the dreaded "mission statement" beloved of so many organisations. However when Christians talk about Mission, it is God's mission of His intrinsically loving nature: God creates everything out of love, He sent Jesus out of love to show us how to live abundantly and to rescue humanity from the barrier of death, and He is with us now, in love, through the form of the Holy Spirit.

So what does that all mean in Lympstone? As the retired Archbishop Rowan Williams said, it is all about seeing what the Holy Spirit is doing, rolling up our sleeves, and joining in! So any act of self-giving love and serving others in the village is, in Christian language, the work of the Holy Spirit, whether or not it has a church label attached.

The church's mission is to contribute to this, sometimes organising things itself, but more often as its individual members get involved in the community. If through this others make the connection between the loving act and our understanding of God, all well and good, but that is not the main purpose of mission. That is, to echo Jesus words for all humanity: "that they may have life, and life in all its abundance" (John 10:10)

The organ has a very long and fascinating history and is a wonderfully versatile, colourful instrument. It has an extensive solo repertoire and is widely associated with the church and sacred music not least due to its superb abilities to accompany both congregations and choirs.

Stephen Tanner and Andrew Downton are both organists who have very wide musical tastes. They have worked together for some thirty years since Andrew was a pupil of Stephen's at Exeter Cathedral School. They have collaborated with the Exeter Choral Society, which Stephen directed and Andrew accompanied for some years, through the musical direction of the Exeter Cathedral Chorister Outreach Project, which aims to raise the standards of singing in Devon primary schools and as an occasional concert duo Organ2.

OH WHAT A LOVELY SHOW!

Lympstone Players and Lympstone Entertainments combined their collective skills to present us with a magical production of Joan Littlewood's Oh What a Lovely War. Long months of preparation and rehearsal were rewarded with a seamless performance. including narrative in three languages, and innumerable costume changes, all slick and skilfully executed. Eighteen actors took on all the roles, and were ably supported by a 7-strong band, three singers and a behind stage team of 33.

The production follows the chronology of the war, with the mood changing between scenes from jingoistic euphoria through the stalemate of trench warfare; the seeming ineptness of the officer classes and the bonhomie and despair of the foot soldiers. This strange entanglement of the dreadful and the funny was a veritable rollercoaster for the spectator's mind – in three hours one senses mirth, comradeship, pathos and horror.

The stage set, although stark, had wonderful simplicity; a blank canvas on which the actors skilfully wove their magic through their costumes, words and actions. Although the scenery never changed, there was no point when we did not know exactly where the scene was set. The stage portrayed

the trenches, a ball room, a grouse moor and the streets of London.

The black and white theme (clearly manifested in the stunning Pierrot costumes based on the troupes who entertained soldiers behind the lines during the conflict) was echoed by the white screen and the black and white narrative text of historical events that was scrolled across the top of the stage. Changes in the speed of this rolling text were used to enhance its significance. Small props (such as hats and adornments) were used effortlessly to depict the varying characters. Μv favourite element of the design was the evocative use of light and shadow on a screen with projected silhouettes. This was stunning, especially when shadows were used to emphasise the hats worn by the actors (each hat shape delineating the character's nationality).

The music was beautifully presented and at the core of the production. Having the band on stage meant that they could be heard, but the actors' voices soared above the accompaniment. I believe that all present were deeply moved by the music – songs sung with clarity, engendering a mix of tempos and mood. The huge score containing 36 songs flowed gently, seeming to convey the spectator down a stream throughout the evening – sometimes quiet, sometimes

loud and fast, and sometimes turning the listener in all directions.

There are too many excellent performers to list in full. However Chris Barnacle and Clive Wilson in the bayonet training scene will remain in my memory for a long while - Chris managing to perfect 'sergeant major' facial expressions whilst barking out his commands, while Clive looked charmingly bewildered. Chris's continued bonhomie encouragement to his small troupe was heart-warming, and at the end heartbreaking. Heather Redding's rendition as a lady of the night added spice and humour, whilst Grace Packman (a tri-lingual and flexible performer) was superb as the much put-upon

translator for the French and British generals; facial expressions depicting her exasperation, whilst her voice never faltered.

The younger generation were beautifully represented by Hannah Billington, who has remarkable presence on stage, and the truly endearing Thomasin Manley Frost who, despite her young age, has a resonate voice that could clearly be heard. The Director, Harland Walshaw, managed to create a production that was hard hitting, through the combination of music, straight acting and comedy. The respect for and admiration of the soldiers was apparent throughout. A triumph!
