PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Public Session – Mrs Lyons explained that the 'Living In Lympstone' event had been a huge success, the next village event will be the 75th VE Day Anniversary next May. The PC unanimously granted permission to hold the event and use the village hall. Cllr Hill has now been appointed as the community hub liaison Councillor.

A resident queried the cars parked on the road for the football club on a Saturday morning. She added that there was now solid traffic parked along the road with no space for other road users to pull over. The Chairman said an email will be sent to LFC to explain that this is unacceptable and to speak to their members about parking.

Another resident queried the money spent in certain sections of the PCs budget which the Clerk explained how the amounts of money had been spent. The Clerk reminded all members present that the finance was of the public interest and always readily available for anyone to request to view.

VHMC Proposal of becoming a CIO The Chairman read a statement on behalf of the PC regarding their position and view on this matter (the statement can be found, in full, at www.lympstone. org). The VHMC had sought legal advice on this and the PC now would also. It was agreed to hold a public meeting between the PC and VHMC to continue discussions around the charity change to a CIO and the rightful ownership of the property and land of the Village Hall.

Clerks report - The Clerk welcomed back Mr Carter to the PC who wished to stand again as a Parish Councillor. We still have four vacancies on the PC if anyone is interested you can contact any Parish Councillor or the Clerk for further information The Clerk read the External Audit Report and recommendations. All documents are available to the public to view online and request hard copies for £2 from the Clerk. The Clerk read the correspondence received from Lympstone History Society regarding fly posting adverts from groups outside the Parish. It was agreed that in future these could be taken down and returned to the owner with a note asking them to advertise in the Lympstone Herald instead. The Clerk explained that she would be applying for a locality grant from DCC for remedial works in Candy's Field and a new bench. The Clerk added that 'Able Community Care' door stickers and information regarding support for the elderly had been received. If anyone in the community would like some of this information for a group or individual who may benefit. then please contact me directly.

Reports from the Chairman, East Devon District Councillors and

Devon County Councillors –

The Chairman reported that the missing Exeter road sign on Burgmanns Hill would be reinstated. The Chairman sadly added that the Village had been subjected to much vandalism, the Clerk had reported it to police and had requested a heightened police presence in the Parish. The Chair reminded all present to be extra vigilant, keep yourself safe and report any vandalism immediately to 101. She added that due to vandalism the Gents public toilet had been closed and the Ladies was currently being used as a unisex facility in the interim. Quotes are currently being received to modernise the entire toilet block. The Chairman also announced the PC dinner that was booked at the Redwing on 15th November. She invited all members of the Council and Public to attend. If you are interested in going, then please contact Cllr Atkins on dga.potters@ btinternet.com to book your space by 31st October. The menu choices and cost can be found at www.lympstone. org. Finally, the Chairman thanked all the Councillors for their constant hard work over the last couple of months. There had been a lot of meetings and decisions made for different causes. She also thanked the Clerk, who the Chair felt, not only served the PC but the Parish as a whole.

District Cllr Jung reported that he had

spent a lot of time looking into the planning applications in the Parish and wanted all members to know he would support the PC in their recommendations.

County Cllr Trail explained that the proposed road sign for Gulliford burial ground had been cleared by Highways and now needed to be applied for. Cllr Trail informed all that the Devon Safer Together proposals were now closed, and future meetings had been put back. Nothing would be implemented until April 2020 at the earliest. Cllr Trail was pleased to report that the organised Exe Estuary clean up had seen 120 people turn up and get involved. There will be another clean up organised along the Exe Estuary Trail in due course.

Toddler Play Area and Activity Trail It was agreed to contact Officers at EDDC to arrange a meeting with the children from the Primary School to

share ideas and designs for both areas.

Matters raised by Councillors

Cllr Atkins reported that he would be working with the Clerk to identify overgrown hedges and leaning walls/ fences in the Parish and serving enforcement letters to deal with the potentially dangerous situations.





THE PEACE OF WILD THINGS

There are four boards on which Lympstone Entertainments posts poems in the village, when we are not using them to advertise our next event. At present they are carrying the poems of one poet.

Wendell Berry is an American farmer, and a poet for our time. Or as he describes himself, "A farmer of sorts and an artist of sorts." The author of more than 50 books of poetry, fiction and essays, he has received the major poetry prizes - the T. S. Eliot Award, the Medal for Lifetime Achievement and the National Humanities Medal. For more than 40 years he has lived and farmed in his native Kentucky (where, by coincidence, this month's Film Society film is set!) with his wife Tanya and their children and grandchildren.

The four poems can be found under the railway arch, opposite school hill, opposite the surgery, and at the top of Longmeadow Road. They speak of the consolations of wild things in a troubled world. "I go and lie down where the wood drake sings... and the great heron feeds."

Our October talk at 7.30pm on Thursday 17th October in the Methodist Hall. is entitled "Marking Place: Enduring inscriptions and persuasive maps" is from Prof. Patrick Dillon of Exeter University. Enduring inscriptions and persuasive maps are "curiosities' in or about the landscape, some of which are historically significant. Persuasive maps present geographical information in the form of a map or diagram that denotes presence, ownership, value, belief, satire or humour relating to a particular place, rather than details about how to travel from A to B. They are typically made by individuals not organisations and are one-off documents, not part of a series. Enduring inscriptions are historical, religious, vernacular or other records cut, impressed, painted, or written in the landscape, on buildings or artefacts, on trees, on stone. Then, on Thursday 21st November Derek Gore will tell us about "Recent Discoveries in Roman Exeter and its area". Entry is £4 (£3.50 for members), and our lifetime membership is a mere £10. Finally, a date for your diary: on 12th December Todd Gray will be returning to entertain us with his new talk "NOT ONE OF US! Individuals set apart by choice, circumstances, crowds or the mob in Exeter, 1451".



EAST DEVON PEBBLEBED HEATHS

Have your say on proposals designed to improve visitor access to the East Devon Pebblebed Heaths whilst protecting wildlife and habitats.

This autumn a visitor access consultation will run from 23 September until 4 November 2019 where we will be asking local people and users of the commons to let us know what they think of plans to improve visitor infrastructure across the heaths.

We have been working with the South East Devon Habitat Regulations Partnership (SEDHRP) and an external consultant to produce an advisory report which makes proposals that

balance the need for improved visitor experiences on the heaths while at the same time protecting this important conservation area. Due to the site's European wildlife designations, funding can be drawn down from the SEDHRP to pay for this work because measures can help reduce the negative impact of local development pressure related to the delivery of the Local Plan.

Suggestions from the report include:

- Improving access for emergency vehicles to reduce response times.
- New information boards with maps and route markers for suggested trails.
- Improving car park accessibility and layout while at the same time helping to protect ancient monuments and wildlife.
- Increasing visibility in car parks to reduce theft, criminal incidents and antisocial behaviour.
- Improving car park surfaces and entrances for improved safety and visibility.
- NOT introducing car parking charges.

This work aims to ensure the site is able to cope with the impact of this increase, as well as making the heaths an easier and safer place to enjoy for those that already spend time here. Whilst working on these proposals we have been mindful that this is one of East Devon's most cherished landscapes and a shared spaced used by a range of people for different reasons.
