#### **PARISH COUNCIL NEWS**

Public Session – A resident shared concerns of the excess sand that had drifted up the River Exe. He was especially concerned with the damage to the flora and fauna being choked by the amount of sand. Cllr Jung explained that he was urgently looking into it with the Environment Agency. Another resident added his concerns of where flood water would go if the Exe was filling up with sand.

Another resident expressed his concerns of the stones being washed down Wotton Lane and piling up at the crossroads at the Saddlers Arms. He highlighted the danger of stones spread across this part of the road to all passing pedestrians and road users. Cllr Jung added that he would follow this up with EDDC and the Clerk would report it to Highways to ensure it was cleared.

Clerk's report – The PC unanimously agreed to support FOGBG with the Heritage Lottery Application and congratulated the group on all their hard work and dedication with this project.

The Clerk read correspondence received regarding dumped garden waste, plastic and other debris floating down Wotton Brook which was illegal. The wildlife is diminishing and a heightened awareness of the protection of this watercourse is of paramount importance. It was also noted that all owners of land and property that run

to the Brook are known as riparian owners and they have a duty of care to keep the Brook clear of waste and pollutants. For more information, please visit: https://www.devon.gov.uk/floodriskmanagement/question/riparian-owner-responsibility/

The Clerk also read correspondence received from Lympstone History Society regarding the rules displaying posters around the Parish. It was agreed to display the following rules around the Parish: 'Recommended Good Practice' on posting notices on telegraph and other poles in the village' 1) Only notices advertising specific events in the Parish should be posted. Notices about general activities for business or voluntary groups should be avoided. 2) Notices should be restricted to A4 size. 3) Notices should not be posted more than one month before the start of any event. 4) Notices should be removed within one week of any event that has been advertised.

Correspondence was received regarding dog fouling in the Parish. It was agreed that the Clerk contact EDDC dog warden again. Please be vigilant and pick up after your dog!

The Clerk was also pleased to report that the locality grant applied for £900 had been awarded to the PC for remedial work and a new bench in Candy's field. The Chair thanked District Cllrs Channon, Scott and Trail

for their generosity in awarding this grant to LPC.

#### Reports from the Chairman, East Devon District Councillors and Devon County Councillors –

The Chair thanked all for the fantastic attendance at the Remembrance Day service and parade. She was very proud to represent and lay a wreath on behalf of the PC. The British Legion had also written a note of thanks for the PCs kind donation. The Chair reported of a very enjoyable evening at the PCs annual dinner and thanked the Redwing for their kind hospitality. The Chair confirmed the PC agreeing to EEMP to provide new information boards regarding the Exe Estuary at the Green and the Rag.

Cllr Jung announced and congratulated East Devon for now being the best in the country for recycling and residual waste, there is now zero-landfill waste. Cllr Jung also reminded all that it was not necessary to use a black bin liner in your large black bin as the rubbish could be dumped straight into the bin to save on unnecessary plastic waste.

Facilities and Estates – Cllr Atkins reported that the public car park needed a good tidy up and the brambles were overgrowing from the railway embankment. It was agreed to contact both EDDC and Network Rail to get the

required work done.

Communications – Cllr Young reported that the Herald had transitioned its monthly titles being a month behind to now being a month ahead to avoid dates of future events being missed.

Transport, Parking and Planning – Cllr Hill reported that more people were choosing to park on double yellow lines rather than in the car park throughout the centre of the village. It was agreed to contact DCC and get a regular traffic warden to patrol the Parish – you have been warned!

Matters raised by Councillors - Cllr Hill brought up the access over the Green to the foreshore and the builders accessing properties by driving along the beach. He explained that they were bringing sand and gravel back up onto the road. Please remind any contractor working on your property or land to ensure the highways are always cleaned up after them.

#### LYMPSTONE VILLAGE HALL

Our bookings diary is now open for all of 2020 (and big events in 2021). Please book early at www.lympstonevillagehall. co.uk or 01395 262640.

Hourly room hire charges remain at 2019 levels for bookings in 2020. This continues a long period of stability – extra bookings are offsetting rising costs. It means, for example, that 3 hours in the main hall for a hirer living in the parish now costs £27, exactly the same as in 2006!

Package rates for parties (children as well as grown-ups) have increased a little, but still offer huge discounts on hourly rates, saving up to £100. We will take bookings for 2020 parties at the lower 2019 rates, if booked and paid before the end of the year. The hall has welcomed a number of new hirers, including Men's Yoga and the British Heart Foundation.

We have planted a new copper beech hedge along the edge of slope between the hall car park and churchyard, which will act as a visual and easy-to-maintain barrier.

We are finalising our budgets for the 2020 financial year and will continue with our programme of active maintenance and improvement at the hall.

Readers may have heard about the dispute with the parish council about the actual ownership of the hall. This is now in the hands of solicitors, and we expect a resolution in the New Year.







#### **NEWS FROM A LA RONDE**

A la Ronde is now closed for our winter clean, when the conservation team can carry out conservation cleaning and condition reports for our 4,200 items, and will be renewing our museum accreditation. When the house is closed there is also an opportunity to do further conservation cleaning, and this winter will have a focus on the exotic shell collection in the Butler's Pantry and the display cabinet itself; you can see the shells ready for cleaning on the table.

The roof project will be progressing over winter with the scaffolding due to be down in Spring 2020. The last roof slate has been screwed into place so the roof is watertight again. The scaffolding will stay up whilst further works are carried out including repairs to the dormer windows, replacing the external boarding and fixings and upgrading the shell gallery windows to provide more environmental controls. Thank you to everyone who has supported this vital repair work.
