PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Public Session – Mrs Lyons updated all members on the Community Hub group's work. There will be a VE Day celebration in May as well as many other free events for the community. The first of these will be on the 17th January with Jenny Moon for storytelling, songs and supper.

Mrs Carter reported that the Exe Estuary Trail group were looking into funding and future grants with a more detailed report in February.

A member of the public asked about the smashed car on a trailer outside the marine camp to warn of the dangers of drink driving. Although he felt the message was positive it also was a distraction to road users. He also felt the new traffic lights in Courtlands dip were changing too quickly when pressed by pedestrians and did not give enough time for road users to react.*

Happy to Chat Benches – The PC invited a guest speaker, Mr Gary Winter, who gave a presentation with an initiative to get people talking and interacting with each other.

Happy to Chat Benches - Why the Need? There is clear evidence that loneliness is a major factor today in the UK, not only in the elderly, but equally with younger people as well. It has a major impact on people's physical and mental health. Loneliness can be caused by: Change in your personal circumstances; children moving away,

loss of network of friends, difficulty communicating, sight, hearing. In the UK, more than a million older people say they are always or often felt lonely, according to Age UK. Silverline get over 10,500 calls per week with many callers saying that they are the only people that they are likely to talk to this week. Whilst there are many groups and societies, that help. There is for many a big hurdle to get over to start with. It's difficult making the first contact.

How did "Happy to Chat" benches start? A lady called Alison Owen-Jones from Cardiff came up with the simple idea following a walk in a Cardiff park, she noted the following: 'For 40 minutes an elderly man sat on a bench in a busy City Centre park - alone.'

Word has spread through social media and now "Happy to Chat" benches are popping up all over the world.

So, what next? Does Lympstone want to be part of this important activity? If so, we can highlight a number of benches that are in suitable locations around the village.

The PC unanimously supported Mr Winter's idea who will work with the Community Hub Group to implement and roll out this initiative in our Parish. If anyone would also like to find out more and support, please contact the Clerk who can put you in contact with the right people!

Clerk's report - The PC agreed the

Parish Tax Base and Precept from EDDC of £47,000. The grant applied to the PC from Heathfield Allotments was granted for the removal of asbestos sheeting to be cleared from the site. The PC agreed to meet with Highways to discuss the future and frequency of gully cleaning in the Parish.

Reports from the Chairman, East Devon District Councillors and Devon County Councillors –

Unfortunately, the Chairman announced that she had received a resignation from one of our Councillors. Therefore, we now have 5 vacancies on the Council. It has been noted that more members of the public are attending the council meetings with many issues to share. So, it would be great if some of our public would be happy to join the Council and help make the difference or change needed. Please come and be part of the action and join our team! If you would like to know more about being a Parish Councillor then please do get in touch with the Clerk, or any of our Councillors to apply. The Chairman was pleased to announce that the Heritage Lottery Grant had been applied for Gulliford Burial Ground and it was now a case of waiting to hear if the grant would be successful. She also added that the WI had successfully obtained and fitted a new defibrillator at the Saddlers Arms. The Chair also proposed to call a public meeting to discuss the changes at the Village Hall on Thursday 30th January at 7pm in the Main Hall. This was unanimously agreed. If you are interested in learning more about the proposed changes happening to our Village Hall, please attend and join in the discussion.

District Cllr Ingham reported that it had been brought to his attention the difficulty in spotting pedestrians after dusk**. It was politely requested that all pedestrians using the road at night; wear white or reflective clothing to ensure they are seen.

Things to remember!

FLUORESCENT MATERIAL – is effective outside during daytime because it reacts to the ultra-violet rays in sunlight. It could be a stripe on your jacket, patches on your bag or an armband.

REFLECTIVE MATERIAL – works in the dark because the special surface reflects light (streetlights, car headlights etc.)

FINAL REMINDER: Please be aware that the PC will be serving reminder letters to properties with overgrown hedges. DCC will then follow this up if no action is taken.

Mission Focus has meant many things to me over the years. Whilst at university I did a Scripture Union beach mission in Abersoch and mission in that context meant mostly painting my face blue and wearing a thick blue sleeping bag ... in a heatwave, on a beach in Wales as I played the blue caterpillar in a Jesus centred rewrite of Alice in Wonderland. Later that year I was in Greasby on the Wirral with Rob Frost and Easter People, where mission was mostly hanging around with dropouts and lavabouts in the park and talking to them about this person, Jesus, who I knew could bring freedom and transform lives. For three years after University, mission meant 'jumping out of trees for Jesus', as my friend wittily dubbed my time working for Christian outdoor activities company, followed by (after I married George) 6 months with Scripture Union India, mostly in Tamil Nadu, where mission meant a constant faint nausea caused by anti-malarial meds, some wild culture shock and an experience of God's grace and the wideness of the horizons of the kingdom of God that meant I was never the same again. Add to that a placement during theological college in a church in Aukland, New Zealand, three weeks recently with the LIV community in Durban and a number of other missions and 'mission' for me has been an adventure!

And that is how I would sum it up. Mission is an adventure! It doesn't have to be abroad or even in a park in Greasby, it can be in your front room over a cup of tea and a digestive. It's an adventure because God is in it and He will always do thrilling and exciting things if we are just faithful and available and able to

talk a little about what Jesus means to us. Benedict Cambridge



BOATING IN LYMPSTONE 2020

The volunteers of the Lympstone Fisherv & Harbour Association (LFHA), dedicate much time, effort and expertise to the funding, improvement and maintenance of the Association property. This includes the foreshore throughout the Parish and to the south as far as Courtlands Cross, the Harbour, 43 acres of moorings (fundus) and crabtiling activity. It does this not just for users but also because the property is a cherished asset to the Village. Such are the pressures to use our facilities that membership is now restricted to permanent residents of Lympstone and there are waiting lists for certain facilities. As the slipway is being used more and more as a car park, a vehicular barrier to restrict improper access to the property is under examination.

The Sailing Club is а separate organisation from LFHA and owns no part of the harbour, other than that on which the Clubhouse stands, but the Association does what it can to facilitate Club activities. The Harbour Board maintains its property by licensing all who use its facilities (other than for pedestrian access) with an appropriate fee. As our volunteers cannot police the property at all times, we rely on the good faith of those who use the facilities to apply for an appropriate license, abide by the rules and to pay their dues.

We are aware that with the increasing popularity of portable personal watercraft, some new users may neither be LSC or LFHA members and so may not be aware of the established procedures of boating from Lympstone or the requirements of using private property.

So, if you launch and retrieve a watercraft from the Harbour and are not already a LFHA member, you are asked to inform the LFHA of your requirements. A launching-only, year-long license for a personal craft is £10. All craft using LFHA property should display a license label.


