- 2. FOOD BANK DONATIONS the box is now located in Central Stores.
- **3. CHURCHYARD** Sadly the churchyard has also had to be closed by order so tending graves is not allowed.
- 4. THE FLAG Some will have seen the Union flag flying. Whilst contrary to convention this decision was taken locally to provide a live visual symbol that whilst the church and all activity has been closed down, the Christian faith is very much alive.
- **5. WORSHIP** I am pleased to report that there are a number of ways in which the church body of people may continue to worship.

8. ORGANIST AND MUSIC DIRECTOR LEAVES


A message from Philip White who has been organist at Lympstone for the last 24 years and 11 months.

9. INTRODUCING THE NEW RECTOR REV'D STEVE JONES



Steve was born and raised in Chippenham in Wiltshire. Leaving school at sixteen, Steve joined the Royal Marines at Lympstone. While at CTCRM he met Denise, who was later to become his wife (now of 36 years). Following completion of his marine

training in 1982, Steve was posted to Plymouth, just as the Falklands War was about to commence. Still only seventeen, Steve sailed south with the Task Force. While at the Ajax Bay settlement on East Falkland, he was right under a 500lb bomb dropped by an Argentine jet, however was miraculously protected from harm. In an air-raid bunker later that day, Steve prayed and trusted Jesus Christ with his life and his eternity. At the end of the conflict Steve proposed marriage to Denise by telex message from Port Stanley. They were married in All Saints Church, Kenton in 1983. After six years in the Royal Marines, he joined the Wiltshire Constabulary, and served as a police officer in Swindon and Devizes. He then left the police in 1990, and went to Exeter University, where he read Law. After qualifying as a barrister, Steve practiced from chambers in Taunton and Exeter, specialising in Family Law. In 2001, Steve, Denise and their two children, Katie and Charlie, moved to Green Bay, Wisconsin, USA, where Steve took up his first full-time ministry. In 2003 the family moved back to Devon, where Steve planted a community church. In 2007 the whole family moved again to the USA, this time for Steve to take up an associate minister position in a large Baptist Church, just west of Detroit, Michigan. In 2012, Steve was appointed as senior minister of that congregation. After several years of discernment discussions with the

Diocese of Exeter, in 2015 Steve and Denise moved back to the UK, for Steve to attend Trinity Theological College, Bristol. He graduated with a Durham University Master's degree in Theology and Mission in 2016. Steve also has a Master's degree in Ministry Leadership from Summit University, Pennsylvania.

Following his time at Trinity College, Steve has served his curacy in the Totnes Mission Community. Steve is an accredited mediator and mediation trainer, and has provided training on conflict resolution internationally, as well as here in the UK. Later this year, Steve is going to be teaching a comprehensive training programme for new mediators across the Diocese of Exeter.

Steve likes running, fishing, reading, bodyboarding, flying remote-controlled aircraft, and spending time with his family. Denise is currently undertaking a degree in Fine Art at Exeter College, and hopes one day to become an art teacher. They have a little white American Cockapoo dog, named Winston. Katie now lives in Exeter, and is a Welfare Advisor for the University of Exeter. Charlie is currently reading Law at the University of Exeter, and last year married his American wife Julie, who has now joined him in the city.

Because of Covid-19 the hall has been closed since 21st March, to meet government instructions on public buildings and group gatherings. We await news and guidance on reopening, both for public hiring and for school use.

The hall website has a prominent message, currently as follows:

CORONAVIRUS: 26th March: The hall is completely closed to public and private events until further notice. We have been in touch with organisers of events in March – June. We hope to see you again soon! To help this, we are waiving our normal cancellation policy for events booked at any dates in the remainder of 2020.

This message will be updated to take account of changing circumstances.

The Annual General Meeting (AGM) of the Village Hall Management Committee for the year 2019 was to be held as a public meeting in the hall on 22nd April. That cannot now happen, but it is important that the meeting is not delayed; it needs to complete

formal business to satisfy the Charity Commission. The trustees are planning to hold a short 'virtual' meeting on line. We have placed on the hall website (www.lympstonevillagehall.co.uk) the charity's annual report and examined accounts for 2019 and will be happy to answer any questions about them.

Governance of the hall: the trustees establish a Charitable plans to Incorporated Organisation (CIO) to take over responsibility for the management of the hall from the present unincorporated charity are progressing well. We envisage that will be accomplished by around the end of this month. More details about this change can be found on the website. This is an important development but it will make no difference to what the hall offers, access to its facilities or its charges.

- Virus testing kits these are only offered by NHS.
- Vaccines or miracle cures there is currently no vaccine or cure.
- Overpriced or fake goods to protect yourself from coronavirus such as anti-bacterial products.
- Shopping or medication collection services
- Home cleaning services.

Protect vourself and others:

- Don't be rushed into making a decision. If it sounds too good to be true it probably is.
- Only purchase goods from legitimate retailers and take a moment to think before parting with money or personal information.
- Don't assume everyone is genuine. It's okay to reject, refuse or ignore any requests. Only criminals will try to rush or panic you.
- If someone claims to represent a charity, ask them for ID. Be suspicious of requests for money up front. If someone attempts to pressurise you into accepting a service they are unlikely to be genuine. Check with family and friends before accepting offers of help if you are unsure.

Be a good friend, help to protect your family, friends and neighbours from scams.

Firstly, we hope that you and your family are keeping safe and well. Hospiscare is very much part of this local community and we hope you will find our website helpful: www.hospiscare.co.uk. You will also find useful information and advice on our Facebook and Instagram pages. Our staff and volunteers have all been working incredibly hard to ensure our expert end of life services continue. We are keeping up to date with all the government advice and moving as quickly as we can to adjust and ensure we provide our care as safely as possible.

What effect is Covid-19 having on our services?

Our specialist in-patient ward and community nursing services are continuing as priority. Providing safe and effective care to vulnerable patients and keeping our staff well so they can continue to care for our patients are our main concerns. We have decided to suspend our Day Hospice services at all sites as a precautionary measure for the foreseeable future – these patients will continue to be cared for by the Hospiscare Community Nursing Team.

Other services affected include:

- Outpatient and nurse-led clinics will be managed over the phone or by Skype
- · Care navigators will be making

- phone calls rather than face-to-face visits
- Film Club, Bereavement Teas, our cafes at Kings House and Searle House and other gatherings are currently postponed
- Complementary Therapy outpatient treatments are being postponed

If you wanted to visit the hospice at Searle House?

We are asking only close loved ones visit to reduce the risk to our patients and staff. All visitors are asked to call ahead on 01392 688000. We have asked all non-clinical volunteers, visitors, contractors and suppliers not to visit Searle House. We are working to enable staff to work remotely to reduce footfall to our specialist ward.



- 1. Ring Central Stores on 01395 263655 and place your order. 7 days per week but between 9am and 6pm only, please. Essential supplies only and limited to £20 maximum (no minimum order).
- 2. Central Stores fills in an Order Form including your name, address, contact number and any necessary comments.
- Central Stores makes up your order and rings you for your card details to pay for the order. (If you do not have a credit or debit card, we can purchase the items for you and settle up at a later date).
- 4. Simon will deliver your order on his daily paper round first thing in the morning. He will leave deliveries on your doorstop. He is also delivering prescriptions from the Lympstone Claremont Surgery (contact Underhill Surgery on 01395 265797 for this service)

Please be patient if the phone at Central Stores is not answered immediately

If Central Stores does not have what you URGENTLY need, Simon may go to Tesco or Lidl to try to get the item(s) for you. Please be aware that this may not be possible.

Please also be aware we may not be able to fulfil all your order or deliver the brand you are used to.

If you do not have a debit or credit card (or you have supplies delivered from Tesco or Lidl purchased by Simon) we have an adequate Community Fund which will buy the items for you and we can settle up at a later date.

LYMPSTONE HARBOUR MATTERS



PRODUCTS.

GULLIFORD BURIAL GROUND

Gulliford Burial Ground is all that remains from the Presbyterian/ Unitarian site. Once there stood two chapels the first 1689-1774 and the larger replacement chapel 1774-1907. With the chapels demolished all that remains are the headstones & tombs and it's easy to forget the happier times this location held. Between 1792 and 1808 there were 83 baptisms. These included family names such as Titcher of Church Road. Smith from Queen Anne House and Abbott who emigrated in 1849 ending up in Norwood, Australia. The early records for marriages have not survived and from 1753 marriages in Non-conformist & Catholic chapels & churches was banned. This was due to Bonnie Prince Charlie trying to take the throne from George II, George in turn once having seen off Charlie, took measures against the Non-conformists & Catholics and this was one of those. The ban was not lifted until 1837 by which time only a small number of marriages took place at Gulliford. The Friends of Gulliford Burial Ground have a brilliant website produced by Mr Moffatt for more information go to www. fogbg.org.uk I'm hoping there will be a fine display of Foxgloves & Daisies at Gulliford Burial Ground this year and until the repair work begins the site is open to the public, so please pop in on your daily walk & stay safe.

LYMPSTONE WALK NO 1 - A LITTLE BIT OF LOST LYMPSTONE

4/5 kms approx - OS Explorer map 115

Starting in the centre of the village by the Swan, walk east towards the church making sure you bear right at the junction with Burghmans Hill. After passing the Church, turn left up Strawberry Hill and on reaching the top, if you haven't before, take time to visit Gulliford burial ground. Here the dissenters against the established church worshipped and were buried as early as the end of the 17th century.

On leaving the burial ground, turn left to (carefully) cross the main Exmouth road and continue on towards St Peter's School. Just past the entrance to the school on your right, you will find a marked public foot path which you should take following, in winter, the stud marks of hundreds of children returning to school from the games fields behind you. This path soon bends sharp left along the edge of a field. Part way along, the path does a dog leg to continue in the same direction but in the next-door field on the other side of the same hedge line.

Soon you will pop out onto a tarmac road where you will see the school far over to your right. Turn right down the road a short distance before turning first left down another tarmac, but very narrow lane. Follow the lane down the

hill past the historic thatched house and over the ford – an idyllic spot which you might imagine has remained unchanged for hundreds of years. I could see the heavy horse and cart with the children playing in the ford.

Having crossed the ford, continue up the rough track running between the fields until you again emerge on a tarmac lane, Exe View Road, opposite Exe View House. Make sure you turn around and take in the view.

Turn right and continue along, passing the wood on your left to arrive at Wotton Cross where you should turn sharp right down Wotton Lane, that's before you would otherwise reach the busy Hulham Road. Apart from crossing the busy Exmouth Road earlier, this is the first time you might encounter a little more traffic so keep in, particularly as you cross the bridge at the bottom of the hill, having passed the riding stables, and climb out of the dip.

When you reach the Saddlers Rest on the main road, you have several choices.

You can cross at the controlled crossing continuing along Long Meadow Road past the church to arrive back at the beginning of your walk. Or, having crossed into Long Meadow Road, you can take the first left on to Longbrook Lane, continuing on to Sowden Lane

passing the beach to arrive at your starting point from the other direction. Alternatively, when you arrive at the Saddlers Rest, you can make the walk even longer by staying on the near side of the road turning left to use the pavement by the side of the main road towards Exmouth, continuing as far as Haldon Motors. Here you (carefully) cross the main road to turn right, away from A la Ronde, along Courtlands Road to pass Lympstone Manor. Just before you join Sowden Lane (you can see the junction ahead of you), there is a little back lane on your left, which you should seek and take, which will bring you out on the same lane but nearer to the estuary. This is another little part of Lympstone with its very old Sowden Farm and cottages which you could imagine has not changed for hundreds of years. Again, enjoy the estuary views before you drop down the hill.

Having reached Sowden Lane, turn left, again passing the beach to arrive in the centre of the village from the opposite direction to which you left.
