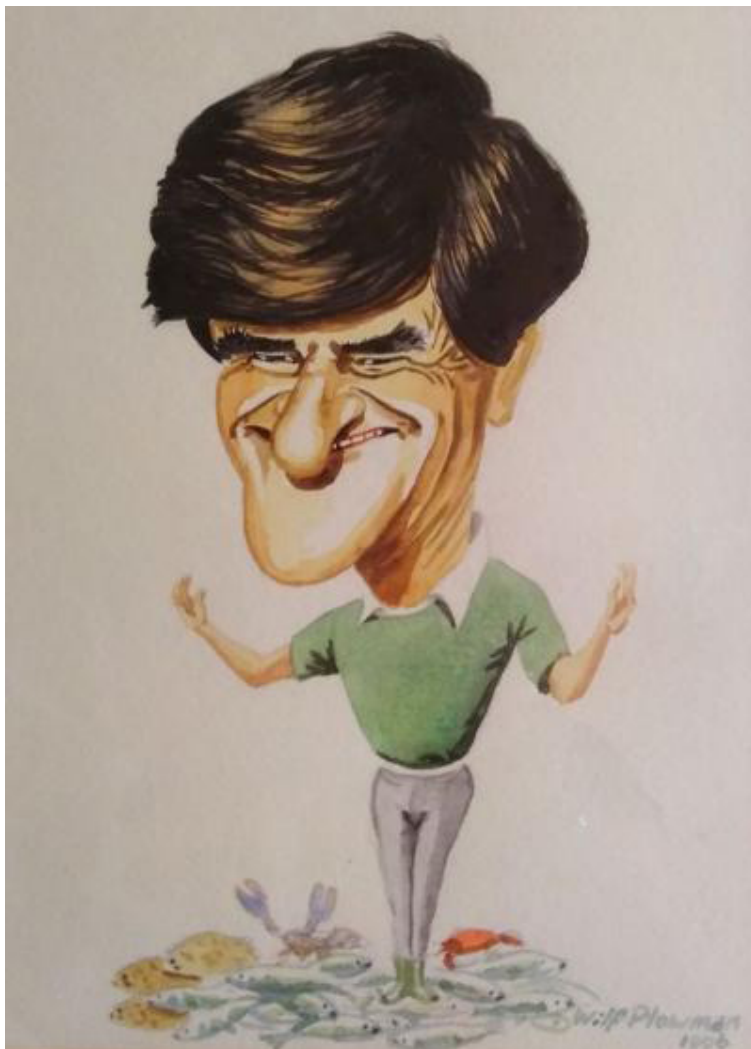

Lympstone Parish Council hope everyone had a lovely safe summer. We all hope to resume a new normal now and look forward to seeing you all in future meetings following ongoing Government guidance. The next PC meeting will be held on Monday 21st September at 7.30pm in the YOUTH CLUB building in Candy's Field. There will be limited numbers so please ensure you have something to say linked to the agenda as there will not be the capacity or time now to discuss all issues or concerns you may have. It would be useful to email the Clerk or any Councillor ahead of the meeting so time is allocated, and everyone is aware what will be discussed. There will be no agendas or attachments provided at the meeting, these will be all available on the Lympstone website to download and print off yourself. All present will be required to wear face masks or coverings and please bring your own hand sanitiser. There will be a steward on the door to escort you in and out the building with a one-way system in place.

The PC want to remind all that ongoing EDDC planning applications submitted in the Parish, are on both Lympstone and EDDC websites. Please submit your responses regarding the planning application directly to EDDC. The PC also continues to add notices and information so please keep visiting

Lympstone website if you have the access.

The public toilets refurbishment has been completed and was open for the summer. The PC have a new cleaner, so we hope you are happy with the service provided by the PC. Please keep a close eye when passing or using the toilets and report any suspicious activity directly to the police on 101. The PC have spent public money on this facility and really need to keep them as pleasant as they are now. The PC appreciate your help with this community facility. Please remember to continue to use the hand sanitisers outside the toilet doors and use your common sense, remain alert and adhere to social distancing when using the facilities.

The PC are pleased to report that one volunteer has come forward to start the fundraising and refurbishment of the play area in Candy's field. If anyone else can support and help with this project, then please contact the Clerk or any Councillor to find out more and get involved. Unfortunately, over the summer, parts of the activity trail fell into disrepair so this will also have to be looked into being replaced.

The repair work to the walls and tomb stones at Gulliford burial ground have been completed. A massive thank you to the Gulliford Joint Committee, Mr Ken Perry and McNeilage Conservation who

have worked tirelessly in getting this accomplished. Another thank you to the Heritage Lottery Fund who provided the grant to get this work paid for and done.

Finally, please remember that from October to February you will be able to cut back any overgrown hedgerows surrounding your property, so they do not pose a danger to passing pedestrians or vehicles using the highway. CYCLISTS AND ROAD SAFETY IN THE STRAND & SOWDEN LANE

What is the main concern?

In recent months, there has been a marked increase in the number of cyclists, joggers and walkers using the Exe Estuary Trail that runs through Lypstone. Whilst we support the government's "active travel" initiative and welcome visitors to our village, many residents are concerned about the safety of everyone using this route.

As a consequence, a survey of residents living in or near The Strand and Sowden Lane was conducted in July. Over 60 residents responded and expressed the following concerns:

- Speed of some cyclists
- Failure to give way to pedestrians by some cyclists
- Abusive language from cyclists to other road users
- Strain on shared usage of street due to increased numbers.
- Illegal parking on The Strand and bottom of Cox's Hill.

Whilst many residents would welcome the re-routing of the Trail, the majority who responded to the recent survey support the implementation of:

- appropriate signage
- speed bumps
- reduced speed limit

What are the solutions?

Since 2011, the Trail Action Group, a Parish Council working party, has campaigned vigorously to persuade Devon County Council to reroute the Trail alongside three railway bridges in the village. However, a £60,000 feasibility study would first have to be paid for by the village before DCC would even begin to consider a re-route and the view was that due to the expense and the complexity of the project this should be the responsibility of Devon County Council. The Trail Action Group had a meeting with DCC at the end of July about these matters and the increasing concerns of residents about safety. As a result DCC agreed to do a video survey over 2 days of the August bank holiday weekend and a further video survey on a weekday during September. They will analyse this footage to identify safety issues and road use with a view to recommending actions to improve safety.

What can you do?

- Report any incidents you experience or witness by completing the appropriate form which should be forwarded to "Shears", The Strand or emailed to safelylypstone@gmail.com. Copies can also be obtained from the Post Office counter in Central Stores.

- Display pre-printed signs on your wheelie bins as soon as they are available for distribution.

We value the support of all those who share our concerns for the continued safety of our residents and visitors.

Please don't forget to also report incidents involving motor vehicles that are involved in 99% of pedestrian collision deaths:

'... a 1,000kg car moving at 22mph will have 50kJ of energy; a 15kg bike with a 70kg rider at the same speed has less than one-tenth of that. Commuter cyclists tend to ride a lot slower, though, while most drivers travel faster. 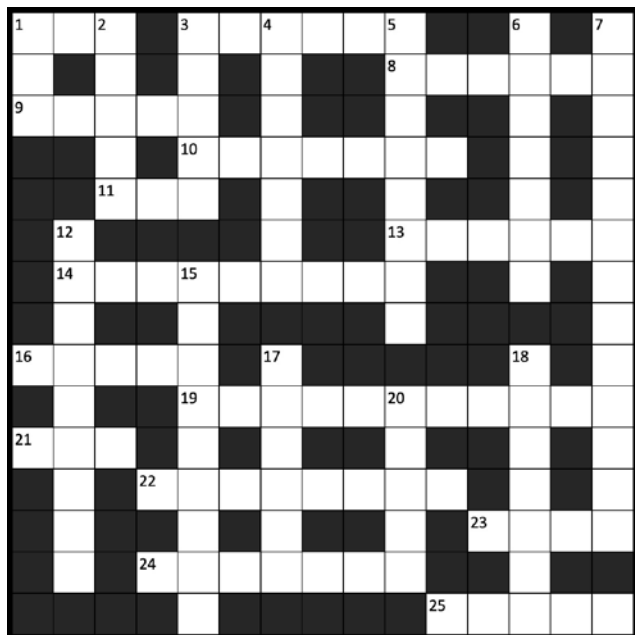

We made the decision not to hold an AGM this year since the regulations do not require it and we wish to ensure the safety of all our members. At our meeting on 27th July we ratified the treasurer's annual report and confirmed the re-election of the Treasurer Graham Banks, and the Vice Chair Jenny Moon a further 2 years. Secretary Mary Turner was confirmed in role for her final 2 years. Angela Coles has stood down, after many years on the committee, but continues as our local Family Historian.

We are not planning to hold any talks for the time being, but hope to be able to provide a new programme starting next summer. Meanwhile we continue to focus on our project work and on gathering and collating historical information about the village.

LYMPSTONE CRICKET CLUB

Lympstone's cricketers have enjoyed an unexpected but successful short season. With the planned fixture list destroyed by covid, when play was finally permitted (with appropriate precautions) in early July, a series of evening games, was scratched together on the hoof. Several involved brand new opponents, plus one against a team Village haven't played for many years. Altogether ten matches were arranged, often twice a week and, with one rained off, Lympstone managed seven wins from nine.

A number of new players, resident in the village, were welcomed to the side, again captained by Gary Abrahams of Pitt Farm. James McGregor has shone with the ball, having 14 wickets to date, whilst Dan Maytum has most runs to his name with 144. Village is blessed with no less than four able wicket keepers, but most haven't had a look in this year as first choice Maytum has amassed 12 scalps in six games – seven of them stumped (a Village record, despite the brief summer).

Other than a first trip to Tale Millers' delightful ground, somewhere north of Feniton, all games were played at home – but at two different grounds. As well as the usual home venue of recent years, up on the common next to the Archery Club, Lympstone now have occasional

Now the evenings have drawn in too far, just one weekend fixture remains, away to Dunsford, but hopefully a full season will be possible next year. JIM SQUIRE, FISHERMAN

A BOOK LAUNCH ON THE SLIPWAY

Queue for your copy from 3pm on Saturday, 19th September

When stories are told of fishing in Lymptstone, Jim Squire looms large.

Tony Day listened to these bygone tales of village life, and wondered, "Why doesn't anyone write them down?" Now Tony himself has done just that, and the result is a new book, called:

A LYMPSTONE LAD

The life and times of Jim Squire, fisherman

Jim started to write his own account of growing up and fishing in Lymptstone, but fell ill before he got very far. And so Tony has finished the story for him, and the History Society have published it as a 92 page book with 43 photographs. It tells the tale of our estuary village in the second half of the 20th century, and one of its great characters.

Here is the village school with its old-fashioned discipline, home life in the Buildings, erected for 'toilers of the deep', and here are the village lads at play - the darts and the dances, the Skiffle Group and the Tug of War, the boats and the cockling, the night life and the sing-songs.

And here, of course, are the fish: the herrings and the salmon, the cockles and the winkles, the mackerel and the flounder... They come and they go, and the fishermen follow them, coping with the seasons, the tides, the water bailiff, increasing regulations and decreasing numbers of fish.

Told with humour and affection, this is a tale of a way of life that has now almost vanished

The book will be launched on the slipway, on the afternoon of Saturday, 19th September. It will be on sale from 3pm, at a village discount price of only £5. You are invited to queue, at Covid-safe distance, and make sure of your copy. Tony will be there to sign it.

The cover of the book (on the cover of this month's Herald) is a portrait of Jim painted in 1996 by the artist Wilf Plowman, who lived in the village. He became internationally famous for his paintings of polo, hunting, carriage driving and other equestrian themes, many of which featured members of the Royal Family, who were keen collectors of his work. Prints of a painting belonging to Princess Anne raised £80,000 for charity.

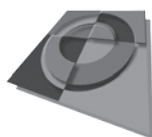

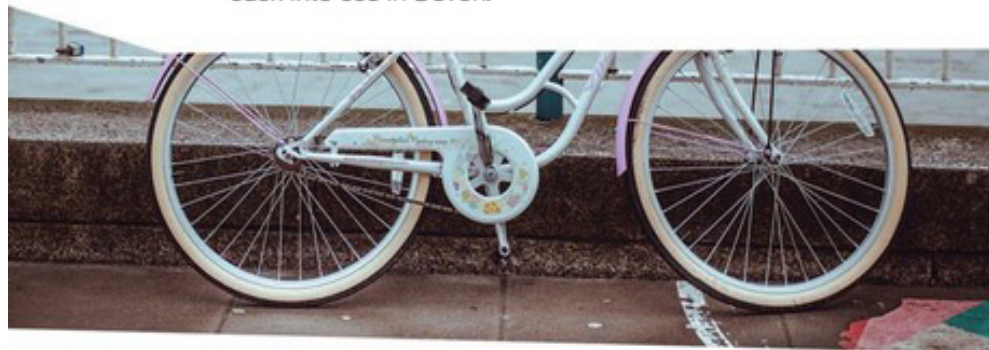
