It has provided a massive support to those who may feel forgotten. Also, a thank you to all members of the public who continue to help their neighbours in need at this difficult time.

The PC wish to thank everyone who joined in with the Advent activity trail and all the hard work and efforts made to produce some beautiful and striking Advent window displays - this did not go unnoticed!

The PC would also like to express a massive thanks and gratitude to the owners of the Mill fields who have successfully created a beautiful new picturesque footpath through the fields and along the Brook which is a joy to walk and observe the nature along this new route. It has taken months of effort and hard work all at the owners expense so the public can continue to enjoy walking through their fields. Please respect the new walkway so it can remain for now and in the future.

Sadly, many irresponsible dog owners continue to not clear up after their dogs. Dog mess still spreads through our beautiful village and full dog poo bags hung in hedgerows or left on the ground does not solve the problem either. STAY AT HOME

THE NEW VARIANT OF CORONAVIRUS IS SPREADING FAST.
WE ALL NEED TO PLAY OUR PART TO STOP THE SPREAD.

LEAVING HOME

You must not leave, or be outside of your home or garden, except for a very limited set of exemptions e.g. to shop for basic necessities, exercise, go to work if you cannot do so from home, or to escape risk of harm.

MEETING OTHERS

You cannot leave your home to meet socially with anyone, except with your household or support bubble (if eligible to form one). Stay 2 metres apart from anyone not in your household or support bubble.

► EXERCISE

You may exercise on your own, with your household or support bubble, or with one person from another household (when on your own). Stay 2 metres apart from anyone not in your household or support bubble.

BARS, PUBS AND RESTAURANTS

Hospitality closed aside from sales by takeaway (until 11pm), click-and-collect, drive-through or delivery. Alcohol cannot be purchased through takeaway or dick-and-collect from hospitality venues.

▶ RETAIL

Essential shops can open. Non-essential retail must close and can only run click-and-collect and delivery.

WORK AND BUSINESS

Everyone must work from home unless they are unable to do so.

EDUCATION

Early years settings open. Primary and secondary schools and colleges move to remote provision except for vulnerable children and children of critical workers. Most university students to move to remote learning.

LEISURE AND SPORTING FACILITIES

Closed, with limited exceptions.

► ACCOMMODATION

Closed, with limited exceptions.

PERSONAL CARE

Closed.

► ENTERTAINMENT

Closed.

OVERNIGHT STAYS

You must not stay overnight away from home. Limited exceptions apply e.g. to stay with your support bubble.

WEDDINGS AND FUNERALS

Funerals of up to 30 people permitted. Weddings up to 6 people permitted in exceptional circumstances. Wakes and other linked ceremonial events of up to 6 permitted.

▶ PLACES OF WORSHIP

Places of worship can remain open and communal worship is permitted, but you must not mix with those outside your household or support bubble.

► TRAVELLING

You must stay at home. If you do leave home for a very limited set of exemptions, you should stay local in the village, town, or part of the city where you live where possible. Do not travel abroad unless an exemption applies.

CLINICALLY EXTREMELY VULNERABLE

Shielding reintroduced across England. You should not travel to work, school, college or university and should limit the time you spend outside the home. You should only go out for medical appointments, exercise or if it is essential

CARE HOME VISITS

Visits can take place with arrangements such as substantial screens, visiting pods, or behind windows. Close-contact indoor visits are not allowed. No visits will be permitted in the event of an outbreak but end of life visits are permitted in all circumstances.

LYMPSTONE NURSERIES ARCHAEOLOGY

As part of the current redevelopment of the former Lympstone Nurseries site on Church Road, important evidence for medieval settlement has been recorded by archaeologists. Devon-based AC archaeology commissioned were by RBL Homes to carry out some archaeological investigations prior to the residential development getting underway. Evidence for medieval activity had been initially identified during some previous test pitting and trial trenching, which led to a planning requirement for more formal investigations to be undertaken.

The work comprised an excavation area adjacent to Church Road. This exposed the remains of what would have been a substantial timber structure measuring approximately 15m by 5m. The building remains consisted of large post pits measuring up to 1.5m in diameter and 1.5m deep that formed a rectangular arrangement. In these (long rotted away) large wooden posts would have been set that would have supported the structure. Something of this size would have represented a significant building, perhaps a hall. Elsewhere on the site a series of ditches were exposed that would have formed simple plot boundaries and drains. In these, items of domestic refuse such as pottery, animal bone and marine shells had been deposited.

The site has now been fully excavated and recorded by the archaeologists so that the development can commence. Although initial rapid assessment of the recovered pottery suggests a broad medieval occupation, detailed analysis and reporting on artefacts and soil samples that were taken should be able to provide a close date on the structure as well as an understanding on aspects such as status, economy and diet. It is hoped that the results from this work will then be able to add to the long history of Lympstone.

The report above has been kindly provided by Simon Hughes of AC Archaeology. We hope that further information will be available about the outcomes of the excavations when the materials have been analysed.

GARDEN CLUB

Now is the time that the winter garden comes into its own. If you have a small garden or just a patio, a single pot with a plant that has bright stems or berries is a delight when touched by frost or in bright sunlight. Scent, too, from winter flowering shrubs raises the spirits even on a dull day. Undaunted, Daphne bholua has been out for a couple of weeks with a scent I wish I could bottle.

Tall grasses can look great when frosted along with clumps of the lowish growing blue Iris ungularis (you can get scented varieties) already out making a statement. It is worth having a close look in the garden or on your walks round the village to see what has started flowering, be it cultivated or wild. I noticed periwinkles and valerian flowering in a hedgerow today.

Frost is particularly welcome in the veg patch to help break up the soil, and for the buds on fruit trees and soft fruit to rid them of overwintering pests. Autumn fruiting raspberries need cutting down now. Generally, though, do be careful not to prune trees and shrubs that bleed heavily. It is too late to do that.

It is a good idea to keep house plants hydrated, especially in a warm room where the air is dry. A shallow dish of pebbles and water nearby can do the trick. The birds need extra rations these days and fresh water in the morning is particularly important. Fallen apples are helping them out. A flock of noisy fieldfares has been busy in the orchard as has a large group of herring gulls. No sign of the badgers that usually come feasting!

Time to orders seeds, especially if you like particular varieties. Now we are in lockdown, it is good to look forward to better things to come.



CONCERNS FOR LOCAL NATURE

Yesterday I was privileged with other Nonagenarians and Health workers to receive my second anti-Covid jab. We are most grateful.

It has put new vigour into a battle in which I have been involved for many years. Sadly our efforts have borne little success. The theme has always been the prevention of the ruthless desecration of the Natural world upon whom we depend for our existence. Sadly our success has been so limited as the violation of Nature has persisted we have foreseen coming some vicious awakening to bring us to our senses. Covid was no surprise.

With this in mind I address a local problem: the future of Goodmores Farm, the large area of farmland adjacent to Dinan Way. Lympstone and Exmouth parishes share this space - a vital Green Wedge in all but name. Over 300 houses, neither needed nor wanted, are designated to be built on this site which stands as a gateway to the seaside town. By and by we all hope again to welcome visitors, people seeking reconnection with the Natural world and peace and quietness. A vast great housing estate would be a disaster.

In the last months we have been urged by medics of all sorts, philosophers, naturalists, teachers, business folk, Gardeners, dieticians, spiritual leaders etc., and ordinary people with common sense to stop further violation of our unique Natural world and to give over much greater space to wild places so that the next generations might survive.

There is no time to lose. Let us be practical and start at home with putting a stop to house building at Goodmores Farm. Instead make it an example of a new normal where open spaces are for exercise in woodlands shared with small creatures, birds and insects. Put aside a patch for allotments: create a community orchard: let children explore, climb trees make dens and learn to live beside species other than reckless humans!

Spread such ideas about in every possible way eg on web sites, twitters, EDDC, DCC our MP, Wildlife Trusts. National Trust etc. etc. suggesting the massive alternatives for which this site can be used to help the Nature's survival bringing with it our own survival. Defy Government's ignorant new Planning Rules etc. etc. Hammer the table!

How lucky we old Nineties were as children. How lucky we are again for the chance to fight anew for our children's children!
