

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PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Lympstone Parish Council had their first virtual Zoom meeting on the 1st March with members of the public invited and present. The next virtual PC meeting will be held on the 12th April (due to Easter Monday) at 7.30pm. Anyone can attend a meeting by writing to or emailing the Clerk with an email address and an invite to the next meeting will be sent directly to you.

Public Session – A member of the public queried the proposed landscaping of the new Green area opposite the Church. RBL Homes explained that they wanted to keep the space 'open' but were happy to work with the PC, the public and EDDC with ideas for the area. Another member of the public asked about the variations to some of the new buildings and Cllr Jung explained that this would be permitted development.

Clerk's report – The Clerk went through the finances and thanked EDDC and DCC Cllrs for the support and additional grants provided to help the community through the Covid19 pandemic. The Clerk also showed her action list during the lockdowns and explained the additional workload due to the pandemic and ongoing projects in the Parish.

Wotton Brook – It was agreed for the Clerk to contact the EA and work with a member of the public to sporadically test the water course and record the

findings of the quality and purification of the water.

Nursery Site car park – Cllr Hill clarified that the car park at the nursery site would be leased to the Church from the PC for the Church use only. Rector Jones was present and thanked the owners and PC for this gift to the Church and the positive impact it would have on the Church community.

East Devon 'The Local Plan' – Cllr Atkins felt it was necessary for the PC to respond to the new plan proposed regarding potential over development in the area and this was agreed.

Lympstone Neighbourhood Plan – Cllr Hill reported that he would research further a review of the LNP and believed only parts needed to be updated and strengthened.

Bank Account – It was agreed to allow the Clerk a small petty cash bank account for purchases where a cheque could not be used. The Clerk would discuss this with the internal auditor before proceeding.

Reports from the Chairman, East Devon District Councillors and Devon County Councillors - The Chairman thanked Mr Corcos and LFRG for their continued dedication and hard work in keeping the community safe, resolving dangerous issues quickly and effectively. She also thanked Mrs Moffat and Mrs Coles for their continued efforts with Gulliford Burial Ground and

for working closely with the local primary school to share and educate pupils with some of the history of Lympstone. The Chair updated all members present with the work achieved over the year by the PC including the refurbishment of the toilets, the book swap in the telephone box and the registering of the Methodist Hall as a community asset. She also thanked the owners of the Mill Fields for the exceptional work completed through the fields and the replanting of 500 new trees. The Chair also thanked the many volunteers who continued to work hard to support neighbours and the community in these ongoing difficult Both EDDC and DCC Cllrs times updated all with the upcoming finances and proposed budgets for the new financial year.

Matters raised by Councillors -Embankment: The PC Railwav acknowledged that this area was overgrown and untidy. This area used to have an efficient working group look after the bank and the PC agreed that this could be reinstated to oversee this area; and either 'formally' or 'naturally' maintained. Therefore, if you would be interested in volunteering and helping with this ongoing project please contact the Clerk or any Councillor to find out more.

THE HERALD HISTORY SPOT - A TALE OF TWO BRIDGES produced by Lympstone History Society

Bieville-Beuvillen - a village set between the Normandy coast and Caen, and close to the river Orne - since WWII. The connection began in 1943 when plans for D-Day were being drawn up. The Normandy beaches were chosen for the landings, with the river Orne and it's adjacent Caen canal forming the eastern flank. The two bridges at Ranville form the only river crossing, making it essential that the allies secure them so that the airborne troops, landing to the east, could join the seaborne forces. The plan was to use gliders to land a task force adjacent to the bridges at midnight on D-Day in order to prevent the bridges being destroyed by the enemy, and training for this was carried out by the Ox & Bucks Regiment on Salisbury Plain, under the leadership of Major John Howard.

So what has this to do with Lympstone? Firstly, Major Howard needed to practice the invasion, and he chose the twin bridges at Countess Weir where, today, you can see a large commemorative plaque, which was unveiled by Col David Wood, the commander of glider no.2 which landed close to Pegasus Bridge. Secondly, one of the airborne troops that landed night was private Ralph Bennett, a Lympstone lad, son of a local builder who had constructed

several prominent Lympstone houses. After a fierce gunfire battle the bridges were secured, and the raid was a great success with only two fatalities and one injury, but Ralph was one of those killed in action on that mission, and is buried in Ranville war grave cemetery.

A connection was established between Lymsptone and Bieville-Beuvillen, with regular visits to the village and its war museum – close contacts were established and maintained for a number of years.

The History Society hope to illustrate more of this story when and if a VE Day celebration can be held in the Village. (A small booklet is available from the history society)

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ST PETER'S PREPARATORY SCHOOL'S COVID-19 RESPONSE

Head, Mrs Charlotte Johnston, comments: "In June 2020, with children in bubbles of 15 and by making careful use of our extensive site, we were able to give each bubble of pupils their own demarcated play area in our grounds, as well as their own classroom and designated teaching staff. This meant that by the end of the summer term last year, we were able to have all our pupils from Nursery to Year 8 back in school."

In July 2020, Assistant Head, Mrs Kate Hurley, was interviewed by ITN Productions for a series of reports from four prep schools across England highlighting the impact of Covid-19 on them and the rapid measures the schools introduced in order to adapt to lockdown legislation and restrictions. The series explored how four leading prep schools adapted their teaching methods in response to the pandemic crisis whilst maintaining the highest quality of teaching standards. St Peter's Nursery has been fully open since the Spring term. This term has seen a lateral flow testing centre set up in the boarding house and run by the school's Matron. This allows St Peter's



to test staff on a regular basis and means the school is ready to test their Years 7 and 8 pupils.

Whilst it is not possible for St Peter's to run open days at the moment, Ms Rachel Elliott, Director of Admissions & Marketing, says: "We have experienced an upsurge in recruitment since the first lockdown in Spring 2020 (resulting in

waiting lists in a number of year groups) and we are dealing with this by offering an introductory video about St Peter's, a virtual tour with our Head, online taster days and virtual transition meetings for our new starters."

CHARITY SWIM FOR SAM

At the end of February Louise Banks completed a sponsored swim in the estuary and to date has raised £4,849 for it. She would like to thank everyone for their amazing support! This includes fellow village swim buddies who partnered her from a safe distance and spurred her on. She swam every day in February at high tides, in water temperatures ranging from 4 - 9 degrees, through snow, the Beast from the East, rain, moonlight and finally sun. The purpose was to raise money in memory of her son Sam who died while on his gap year travels in 2010. His own last swim was to be in the Bay of Bengal off the Andaman Islands. He died of peritonitis two weeks later.

Louise covered a daily distance of up to 1.1k in a swimsuit (no wetsuit). Her initial goal was seven miles but by the end of month she managed nearly eight and a half miles.

Sponsor money will go to help Bangladeshi students receive a world class training in photo journalism at Pathshala South Asian Media Institute in Dhaka. Just over a week before Sam died in India, he was delighted to learn that he had been accepted to study film production and photography at LCC. The covid pandemic has hit low income families in Dhaka particularly hard and the students are more than ever in need of support right now. Since 2010 the Banks family have supported over 35 low income students through fund raising events.

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LYMPSTONE GARDEN CLUB

Well, February was true to form - high rainfall, frosts, bitter winds and finally warm sunshine. March is a very busy month for gardeners although there is still time for cold weather and frosts. Remember 3 years ago, we had a heavy snowfall! So keep an eye on temperatures when sowing seed in the cold greenhouse or direct into the soil. It is worth putting down cloches horticultural fleece beforehand. especially on clay soil, so that you can look forward to early germination. If you have a spare patch of soil in the garden or allotment, you might like to think of the bees and sow a packet of wildflower seeds.

If you didn't divide flowering perennials in the autumn, now is the time to do it. It gives you new plants for the garden and to share with friends. You can also divide snowdrops before they die off as they are best planted 'in the green'. Thinking of small plants, I was delighted to find a big patch of tiny violets under a weeping cherry tree (hide and seek tree to my grandchildren), but you do need to be prostrate to catch their strong scent! It's important to keep deadheading daffodils, leaving their stems and leaves to die back naturally.

I am pleased to report large clumps of frog spawn in the pond. As they are near the edge, we have made an attempt to net them to prevent the annual visit of ducks gobbling it up. Also, I have heard that a heron and some egrets are visiting the brook up our end of the village so frogs beware.

It is a good time to repot house plants. Children might enjoy a spot of indoor gardening by dividing supermarket pots of herbs such as basil and growing them on in small pots on the windowsill. They may also like to cultivate a pineapple plant by cutting off the top and putting it in a jar of water. Change the water regularly and watch the roots grow.

A last pruning thought, it is the right time to prune evergreen shrubs but please check for bird nests first. It would be a shame to expose them and it is against the law to disturb nesting birds!

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POLICE AND CRIME COMMISSIONER ELECTION

On the 6th of May this year people will have the opportunity to vote for their choice of Police and Crime Commissioner for Devon and Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly. This is an important post as it is the role for the provision of our policing.

The Police and Social Responsibility Act 2012 (all 116 pages of it) abolished the then Police Authorities and replaced them with a single Commissioner. Unlike Police Commissioners in the USA the holder of the post does not have any Policing powers and there are safeguards in the Act to ensure the operational independence of the Chief Constable in all matter's in relation to the deployment of his or her resources and officers.

The Commissioner together with the Chief Constable has to draw up a Police and Crime Plan which reflects the Policing concerns of the public and on which the Chief Constable can be held to account. The Commissioner has to set the budget and determine the council tax precept. He or she has to appoint the Chief Constable and when necessary dismiss that person and also publish an annual report.

The Office of the Commissioner and those specific tasks are overseen by a Police and Crime Panel made up of local councillors. They have to approve the budget, the Police and Crime Plan and the appointment of a Chief Constable.

The Commissioner has to administer a separate fund designed for supporting victim support in all its forms together with safeguarding and some rehab programmes. This requirement is laid out in the Police and Crime Commissioner's Code of Conduct.

The successful candidate will have to swear an oath of impartiality in the discharge of his or her stewardship of the role.

The vote itself on the day is based on the AV model (alternative vote) where a 2nd choice can be made. If a candidate doesn't get more than 50% in the first count the second choices of the lowest scoring candidate are also counted and so on until a candidate gets more than 50%.

To summarise the Police and Crime Commissioner is your directly elected representative regarding policing in your area and has a duty to ensure effective policing.

It may be prudent to apply to your local authority for a postal vote if you have concerns about polling in person.



A PROPOSAL FOR INTERPRETATION BOARDS IN LYMPSTONE

(LYMPSTONE HISTORY SOCIETY)

Lympstone History Society has been considering the possibility of erecting some interpretation boards around the village with the aim of portraying in words and pictures, elements of the history of the village. We aim to apply for funds for this from several sources, including South West Water, EDDC and RBL, the company involved in developing the Nurseries site in the village. The proposed boards and a general indication of their intended locations are as follows:

- The railway and station history, impact on the village when the line came through: sited near station?
- Waterfront Lime processing, fishing and maritime activities, Ship, boat building and repairs, boat shelter and harbour: sited at waterfront?
- Parsonage Stile whale blubber processing, the pub, smuggling, sited on Cliff field (a concern...do we want too many more people going to Parsonage Stile?)
- Orchards, farms and farming: sited somewhere at the top end of the village?
- Overview of the history of the village
 : sited on the new green area?
- Board detailing the outcomes of the recent excavation at the Nurseries site (to be provided by

- AC Archaeology) : sited on the new green area?
- Buildings overview of church, houses, shops and mill: sited on the new green area?
- Trials and tribulations floods, fires and wartime: sited in the middle of the village?

We are in touch with the Parish Council. We have secured an offer of some of the funding and some of the writing for the boards has been done. We will draw on the LHS archives for illustrative material. As well as funding, there are issues of the siting of these boards and of course the associated planning issues. At present we are thinking of A2 size boards but there may be variation from this.

SADDLERS ARMS REFURBISHMENT


Work is starting on a £250,000 refurbishment of the historic 17th - century Lympstone pub. The investment at The Saddlers on Exmouth Road is being undertaken by Heinekenowned Star Pubs & Bars and the pub's operators, local residents Keith and Lindsay Webb. It will create four new jobs.

If lockdown easing proceeds as scheduled, The Saddlers – which dates back to 1624 – will reopen and unveil its new look at the end of May.

The revamp will upgrade the much-loved local throughout, making it more comfortable whilst retaining its traditional character and features such as a log-burning fire place. To keep up with demand for The Saddlers' popular carvery, a vaulted dining area with room for 40 diners will be built to expand the existing restaurant seating, complete with a new carvery unit. The room will open onto its own south-facing patio and have screens dividing tables to give diners privacy.

IMPROVING THE PUBLIC FOOTPATH ACROSS LAND OWNED BY THE MILL

Some readers will be aware of the changes that have taken place on the public footpath which crosses the mill leat overspill (the waterfall) to the gate where walkers join the path known by some as Underhill.

With thanks to you, the public, and Devon County Council you have allowed part of the route taken by this footpath to be altered to its present course. This was done for three reasons: to stop some walkers getting lost and ending up in the grounds of The Mill; to prevent the fouling by dogs of the fields, which can now be returned for use by farm animals; and to manage better the enormous increase in use.

What many of you may not be aware of is the generosity of Mrs Susan Goddard, who lives in The Mill and over whose property this path crosses. She has given up much more land than is required by govt regulation and has done so to make the experience more appealing for us all. She has paid for the laying of the hardcore and for all the fencing, which will keep farm animals and walkers, with or without dogs, apart.

We should also thank Dave Tyrrell and Jeff Morrish for their work in making this possible. They have done a great job and we owe it to them to look after their handiwork.

With the increase in walkers has come a proportionately even greater number of dogs. If you have a dog you want it to be healthy and happy. However, ownership has many responsibilities, one of which is to control them in public spaces. Not many of us and particularly children, like dogs jumping up: it can be a frightening, messy experience and this is one of the reasons why Mrs Goddard has fixed signs on all the gates, asking that for the sake of others, you keep your dog on a lead. Keeping your dog under control also gives the plants and wildlife a better life - and who wouldn't want that?

Another increasingly important responsibility for those who own a dog, is to clear up after them. We all know there is nothing worse than stepping in a dog's doo-doo but it is far more serious than that: there is a real risk of spreading disease if dog messes are not cleared up. The farmer, who used to cut these fields for hay refused to do so owing to fouling by dogs. Clearing up is not a pleasant experience for anyone, but with so many dogs now using the footpath, it must be done!

Although the changes do not look, currently, particularly attractive to anyone who knew the fields before, Mrs Goddard has paid for and planted 500 whips of a mixture of Hawthorn,

Quickthorn, Blackthorn and Field Maple. In time, the grass will grow back and the whips will become hedges.

We hope you will enjoy the changes we have made and that you will look after it! Stephen Goddard

LYMPSTONE HARBOUR

The Harbour Board of the Lympstone Fishery & Harbour Association once again plans the annual craning of boats from the Harbour hardstanding to the brook to take place on Monday 12th April 2021 from 6.00am until about noon. As this is a potentially hazardous operation, public access to the Harbour will be denied during this operation. For more information browse www. lympstoneharbour.org.uk

The crane will be arriving Sunday afternoon/evening and departing midday, so those who park on its route along Nutwell Road, Burgmann's Hill, The Strand and the route to the Harbour by the Swan Inn are asked for their cooperation in allowing it clear passage.

This operation will be conducted in accordance with government coronavirus regulations, so any spectators are asked to watch from south of Wotton Brook.

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LYMPSTONE FLOOD RESILIENCE GROUP (LFRG)

Over the last 3 years the group has been building up a map of 'Flood Hotspots' in the village, places that sometimes/ often flood in prolonged wet weather. These are shown on the map. If there are any other spots that you think should be included please let us know - e-mail: philcorcos@gmail.com

Many of these hotspots are where road gullies regularly get blocked from debris. Devon County Council (DCC) are responsible for highway drainage but simply do not have the resources to clear gullies as frequently as is desirable. DCC concentrate resources on keeping routes used by public transport and gritting lorries clear - in the case of Lympstone the roads covered are Nutwell Road, Burgmanns Hill ,The Strand and Meeting Lane. Even along

these routes gullies are only cleared infrequently. LFRG has a team of flood wardens who monitor conditions and, thanks to these people, has been able to help with clearing those gullies where problems have occurred. With support from Lympstone Parish Council, special equipment has been acquired to help with this task. An example of such work is with the flooding in the dip in Meeting Lane where LFRG has been instrumental in trying to get a resolution to the problem.

Working with DCC it was found that the problem is a broken pipe in the adjacent field. This is now in the process of being repaired so that hopefully flooding here in future will be much reduced. A good working relationship has been established with DCC Highways and the team is continuing to clear gullies in conjunction with them. The Parish Council has also included money in their budget for the employment of private contractors to supplement the work of DCC.
