

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Lympstone Parish Council are hosting the Annual Parish Meeting (APM) at 7pm and LPC meeting at 7.30pm on 12th April 2021.

The APM has received reports from: Lympstone Flood Resilience Group, Gulliford Burial Ground, Heathfield Allotments, Lympstone History Society and the Telephone box book swap – thank you for submitting the annual reports from your group with the challenges and successes over the past year to the Parish.

Please note, that anyone can attend a virtual meeting emailing the Clerk with an email address and an invite to the next meeting will be sent directly to you.

Play Area Volunteers – A massive thank you to the volunteers in the Parish who have stepped forward to offer their support with the ongoing refurbishment of the play areas in Candy's Field. A successful Zoom meeting was held in March between LPC, EDDC and volunteers from the Parish to discuss the funding available from EDDC and allocated to Lympstone for these specific areas.

EDDC Engagement and Funding Officer, Jamie Buckley presented the most up to date information and funding available to Lympstone:

- a) Section 106 play £3,609.10. Specifically, for play area equipment e.g. swing, slide, roundabout.
- b) Section 106 sport £3,798.18. Specifically, for sports. There is a specific process to follow whereby you gather in ideas for sports projects from the local community, LPC can also put forward any ideas. Depending on what comes back and what is affordable, eligible and possible it can be added to the play area project e.g. climbing wall, ground level trampoline trim trail.
- c) Section 106 Open Space £7,263.84. This can be spent on allotments, amenity open space, sport, parks, children's play or youth play. LPC need to discuss the categories and allocate the money. It needs to be recorded in the minutes during a formal PC meeting. Eg 'children's play' and put towards the play area.
- d) Youth play at Candy's Field £27,376.09. Equipment for the 'youth' of the parish (aged 11/12 16/17year olds), in conjunction with what the youth want.

Jamie explained that to access S106 money it was paramount that the community was initially asked what facilities or equipment they would like the money prioritised for. Therefore, over the next few weeks the specific youth ages will be asked for their input in a public consultation and suggest

what they would like to see in Candy's field. Please get involved - keep a look out for more information publicised on the PC notice boards, website and community groups spreading the word.

Although EDDC have this money available it was agreed during the meeting that many more funds would be necessary to complete the play areas in their entirety. Therefore, if anyone in the Parish has knowledge of, or has contacts with businesses, companies and charities who are willing to support community fundraising projects then please let myself, the Clerk know so this can help get the project moving forward. Physical fundraising events will be discussed and decided upon once restrictions allow.

Future PC Meetings - From the 7thMay, in line with Government advice, PC meetings will revert to physical meetings depending on the roadmap and how restrictions ease – subject to change. However, Councils, National Association of Local Councils (NALC) and other bodies are currently lobbying the Government to seek a high court declaration to extend this date for remote meetings to continue (a decision from the court order will be announced w/b 19/4/21).

Lympstone PC continue to ask you all

to remain vigilant, stay safe and follow Government advice so we can all be back together again soon.




THE HERALD HISTORY SPOT - 263 RAF SQUADRON BASED AT EXETER produced by Lympstone History Society

The historical record of the aerial defense of South West England during World War 2 has mostly been researched, documented and published. However, memories of those daunting times do fade as does the role played by one RAF Fighter Squadron based at Exeter from December 1940 to February 1941 in defense of the city and the wider South West. This piece is an extract from a longer record of the exploits of 263 Squadron and a memory of the pilots who were lost. The full record resides in the Lympstone History Society archive.

The 263 Squadron was first based in Grangemouth during the Battle of Britain, there defending the naval bases

at Rosyth, Glasgow and Edinburgh. While in Scotland, it operated one flight of Hurricane fighters and another of Westland Whirlwinds which were manufactured in Yeovil. Somerset. When it came to Exeter the Squadron relinguished the Hurricanes (1940) and flew down its then secret flight of Whirlwinds which became operational late in that year and remained until the end of February 1941 when its aircraft were based at St Eval. During its time in Exeter, the Squadron destroyed two enemy aircraft and lost five of its pilots. two over Dartmoor and one over Ebford. The squadron operated its Whirlwinds on offensive operations against the German Luftwaffe from a number

of bases in the South West during the next three years, until in December 1943 it relinquished its last remaining Whirlwinds to reequip with the Typhoon Fighter. It was to relocate to bases in Northern Europe in order to support the Allied armies as they fought to achieve peace in Europe in 1945."

NEW ART COLLABORATIONS AND OPEN STUDIO EVENT

On the Early May Bank Holiday Weekend, Claire Belcher, John Welton, Louise Banks and Mai Welton will be hosting an Open Studio event at 1 Clays Cottages.

This comes about via a joint connection to land, sea and a love of Lympstone. With a focus on nature and the environment John and Claire work with wood, whilst Louise's recent work has much focused on the water and our connections with it, and Mai with the many estuary birds seen on our mudflats.

John is well known in the village for his woodturning work, creating an array of bowls, plates, lamps in a range of styles from traditional through to modernist abstract pieces. He works with all wood-based materials including burled and mottled woods, capturing the beauty and nature of wood at its best. Since Louise moved to the village, she has built a deep connection with the Lympstone landscape and water and uses watercolour to capture the feel and energy of the shoreline and boats. Many will be familiar with seeing her work, not least because her work entitled "Ways to Leave Land" was featured in the Sunday Times Watercolour Competition in late 2020. She has recently had some of her work elected for the Royal Society of British Artists show at the Mall Galleries

in London. Mai is particularly known for her intricate wire bird sculptures, for which she receives a considerable number of commissions. She not only creates uncanny representations of our shore birds, but weaves in colour and texture to create captivating pieces. Claire is a newcomer to the Lympstone art and craft scene (despite being resident here for over a decade). Over the past year she has been working with pyrography, hand burning images on wood as frameable pictures and more recently working together with John to create unique decorative wood turned pieces. Like Mai her work often features birds.

If you are interested to come and see what this collaborative have been up to then please come along to the Open Studio that runs 1st-3rd of May of 1 Clays Cottages, The Strand, Lympstone, EX8 5JR.

HEADING 'INTO THE DRY'....

As the need for decisions to be confirmed and deadlines to be met rain down hard and fast on us, those heady, carefree days of cleaning 7000 bricks seem just a distant memory!

You may have read in the December '20 Herald of the necessity to rebuild our home, at the top of Wotton Lane, and a little about the way we are approaching it. Since then, so many of you have kindly shown an interest or passed a comment on the process we thought we'd share an update.

With foundations in place, the walls raced up at a pace using a type of hollow block made from recycled pallets. These are partially filled with insulation then connected with concrete to provide high levels of strength and thermal mass. Much of the old house had been built nearly 3' below ground level which made it very damp so we've raised it all to the level of the 1990's section. As the hedges and planting regrow, it will sit back down into its smaller footprint. In the coldest week of the year, the oak frame for the upper floor next went into place and the sun shone brightly between the majestic beams. But it was chilly without a roof so the carpenters set to work with rafters and woodfibre insulation into position, the windows followed, the stone chimney climbs higher and now the slates are going on. Meanwhile the bricks which we carefully salvaged, sorted, cleaned and stacked started going back into the build both forming a plinth and as walls - back onto familiar ground for them all. We're using the 1910 - 1960 bricks externally and made an exposed wall inside from the 18th Century ones.

Recent weeks have seen us add to our practical repertoire by scorching larch in readiness for cladding some of the walls. When my brother, Daniel, died in 2019 we inherited a little pocket of woodland near Sidmouth and the larch for our home is from that wood. It has been felled and milled locally and we then scorch, brush and oil the planks. We hope this process will: help it blend gradually with the colour of the soil around us, preserve the timber a bit and demonstrate its beautiful grain, but it makes brick-cleaning look easy!

We continue to be grateful to the team of builders doing the huge bulk of the work; the experts advising us; our understanding neighbours and lots of local people for their encouragement and interest. Mum (Mary Truell) visits regularly, avidly absorbs the details and takes great pleasure seeing our home take shape again. There's a long way yet to go...soon you'll see us sanding old floorboards and cottage doors... so give us a wave when you're walking past!

At a meeting of the Lympstone WI Committee together with a WI National Adviser on Friday 26th March 2021, the results of the member's survey were discussed and the following unanimous conclusions were reached

As there were no nominations for officers, there is no option but to close Lympstone WI. We have arranged to put it into a holding role for 3 years allowing a restart if sufficient volunteers come forward in the future. To keep the bulk of remaining funds within the village, we have made donations to local deserving causes, these are Lympstone and Exmouth Hospice Care. The Lympstone Hub and Lympstone Village Hall. These have been considered very carefully to most benefit the village as a whole within the strict rules of the WI. Remaining funds are held by the Federation of WI for 3 vears in case others are able to re-form the Lympstone Institute.

This is with great reluctance, as along with many others, I have been a member for 54 years, but sadly there is no way of continuing without volunteers to take on committee work. It is particularly sad for the village as Lympstone WI has been serving the community for over 100 years. Unfortunately the modern needs of running a charitable organisation are too demanding for many members on a voluntary basis.





LYMPSTONE SAILING CLUB

a great club for sailors and water lovers alike.

By the time this comes to print, the sailing season should be underway at Lympstone, with craning in of cruisers on 12 April, clearing the harbour hardstanding for the dinghies to arrive.

The sailing club has worked hard to develop this year's on-the-water programme so that it appeals to a broader range of interests - in particular building up the range of activities for juniors and families, and for SUPs and kayakers.

COVID rules permitting, for families there will be four Sunday afternoons through the summer where the club will be organising activities for children such as treasure hunts and SUP racing. There will be picnics on Dawlish Warren, and this year the club is organising an overnight camping trip to the Turf Locks. All members can book the club sailing boats for these events or just for casual sailing.

For paddlers there is an active WhatsApp group where ad hoc trips get organised through the season when wind and tide invite. This year the club has arranged an SUP try-out day with Exe Watersports, and will also be running a number of SUP improver sessions.

The club will be running the usual amount of dinghy racing this year, with some coaching sessions for people looking to improve their skills, plus some match racing for those who have been excited by the America's Cup over the winter. The cruisers and motorboating sections have a full range of cruises in company, including to the Dart, to Torbay and closer-to-home, as well as a number of fishing trips.

Finally, this year the club will be running a "Get on the water" club open day on Saturday 19 June, where anyone in the village will be able to try out sailing or paddling on the river.

LYMPSTONE GARDEN CLUB

This has to be one of the busiest months of the gardening year. Garden centres and nurseries are offering an enormous and tempting choice of plants. It is good to try something new if it suits your soil and aspect, but it is only too easy to choose one of any number of different plants which, when planted, look lonely and somewhat out of place dotted about. I expect many of us have done this at one time or another. Plants usually look more at home in groups of, say three, where they make a bigger impact more quickly. If buying a particularly expensive plant, do look for the AGM (Award of Garden Merit) sign on the label.

When space is at a premium, plants need to earn their keep by having a longish season of interest such as a repeat flowering clematis in a pot. Small gardens can look less confined by having light, airy plants with some height such as Sanguisorba obtusa which forms a clump of low foliage with arching stems carrying rosy pink bottle brush type flowers. Dark foliage and very bright colours tend to draw the eye in, but it really comes down to what you like.

Did you know that plants we see growing freely today, such as carnations, columbines, ox-eye daisies, irises, peonies, have been around for at least 400 years? Several members of the garden club were invited to the studio of Liz and Hester Walshaw here in Lympstone to view the large 17th century 'verdure' tapestry they were conserving for the National Trust property Nunnington Hall in North Yorkshire. Verdure tapestries were a way of bringing the garden and landscape into country houses of the time. Four hundred years ago only the wealthy and privileged could travel to foreign parts or send botanists to collect plants on their behalf, and so extraordinary and new plants depicted in paintings and tapestries were able to be appreciated by others.

On first sight, one is immediately struck by the abundance of flowers and foliage in the tapestry, which inspired Liz and Hester to ask the garden club members if they would like to find out more about its botanical history. So began weeks of research by Pat Boaden, Sheila Parker, Terri Scott and Jill Wilson, the result of which was written up in a leaflet for Nunnington Hall, which Sue Mildenhall designed. The National Trust are delighted, and the gardener at Nunnington is developing a garden trail for visitors to the hall, based on the plants in the tapestry.
