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#### **PARISH COUNCIL NEWS**

September's PC meeting reverted to the first Monday of the month and hopefully now (Covid19 pending) PC meetings will return to the first Monday of every month.

Future PC meeting dates for the remaining municipal year should be held on the following dates:

**2021**: 4 October, 1 November, 6 December

**2022:** 3 January, 7 February, 7 March, 4 April including the Annual Parish Meeting, 9 May

Report from the Chairman – The Chair hoped everyone had an enjoyable summer break, she thanked all for attending and welcomed everyone back. The Chair explained that Gulliford Burial Ground was hosting two Heritage Open Days on the 11th and 12th September, and all were very welcome to attend. She reminded all present that Covid19 was on the increase in the area and asked everyone to continue to remain cautious and safe.

**Public session** – A member of the public explained that a new Government initiative was now up and running called 'Active Travel' - Putting pedestrians, cyclists & horse-riders at the top of the new hierarchy of road users. The car no longer king. A Prime Minister backed initiative, "The most radical

change to our streets since the arrival of mass motoring." More information about this initiative can be found at About Us I Active Travel I Encouraging a 15% Spend on Cycling & Walking He asked for the PCs support in encouraging Parishioners to help set up a new committee to aid Active Travel in Lympstone to make the Parish a more friendly pedestrian place. If you would be interested in this new initiative and becoming a committee member then please contact myself, the Clerk, at lympstonepc@gmail.com to find out more.

**Website** – There is a need for technical support with the Lympstone website. If there is anyone who is IT confident and feels they could volunteer to help, then please contact myself, the Clerk for more information.

Community Hub – The PC wish to send their sincere thanks to Mrs Lyons and her team for providing community lunches for the most vulnerable during Covid19. They hope to keep this going then slowly open up the Village Hall to make it a more of a community event.

**Environment** – Cllr Tyrrell reported on the Brook and believes, using the photographic evidence, that there was pollution. Cllr Staddon reported that she had now received a water testing kit

from the River CSI Project and would be able to regularly test the water and enter findings online to a national database to monitor. In the meantime, it was agreed to contact the EA again to test the water to establish a defined detection of what chemicals and/ or other pollutive elements could be identified in the water.

Gentle reminders from the Parish Council: All PC meetings are open to the public to raise questions from items on the agenda. All agendas are posted on the PC notice boards and, on the website, at least 3 working days before the next meeting. Additional public information can also be found posted here. All Lympstone Parish Cllrs including the Clerk, District and County Cllrs can be contacted via phone or email to discuss any queries from members of the public to take back to the full Council. All contact details can be found in the notice boards or online via the Lympstone website. Your local Cllrs work tirelessly to do the best for your community - please come along and listen to find out more about what vour local Parish Council does for you and your Parish!

The FLOS group continue to work hard with the PC, EDDC and other external funding sources to raise the necessary funds to refurbish the play areas in

Candy's Field. NB that the PC have allocated £20,000 towards the project. All other funding in the PCs bank account is budgeted for annually for the entire Parish and cannot be used solely for one project. An annual internal and external audit verifies this. By written request to the Clerk, the accounts can be viewed by any member of the public. Candy's Field is owned by the PC and open to the public as a shared, community open space. Please respect this area and if you are wanting to hold a regular or one-off community event then permission must be sought and granted by the PC. It is imperative that permission is sought for the area to remain safe for all users and timetabling contractors.

From the end of September, it will be time to check any overgrown hedges and cut them back please.

Another gentle reminder to dog owners. Please pick up after your dog when walking through and around the Parish and please keep dogs on leads where signage requests.

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
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#### THE HERALD HISTORY SPOT 1960s Floods produced by Lympstone History Society

Lympstone has always suffered flooding. With the tidal Exe estuary on one side and the Wotton Brook coming from the other, carrying spring and rainwater from the Common and all the land between, the danger was always there.

The worst flooding came early in October 1960 and affected the whole village. Mrs Bastin of 12 Bakers Cottages, near the top of Longmeadow Road, said 'the water was blood red with mud.' Inside the cottage it rose to a depth of over one metre.

At the lower end of the village things were even worse: Mrs Coombes, manageress of the hairdresser and drapery in the Strand, reported, 'At 1 p.m. the water was round our ankles; half an hour later we were soaked up to our waists.' Miss Stevens at Webbers lost important documents because the water rose above the top of her desk; and Mrs Jarenicz at Brookside found sewage floating in the waist-high water. 'I've even had to was it out of the curtains,' she said.

More floods came over the next two weeks, worsened by blockages in the Brook and culverts. Rose Cottage and Ventnor Cottage were among those flooded this time. Underhill became impassable except by boat and residents of Church Path had to take long diversions to get to the shops.

There was an appeal to help those affected and each household received half a hundredweight of coal from the Parish Council as well as some financial assistance. P.C. Edwards 'excelled himself' according to Councillor Mrs Ware and was 'on the scene from start to finish.'

After the floods, the Wotton Brook was channelled between two high walls in the heart of the village and work was undertaken to clear blockages higher up. In 2006 the Environment Agency spent £900,000 raising sea defences and installing floodgates along the estuary.

The new Village Hall management have invested in replacement sound equipment (to which the Film Society have contributed), and payment for drinks and ice creams will be through the card machines, which we have purchased.

#### **COMMUNITY LUNCHES**

The Hub is continuing to support the delivery of monthly Sunday lunches to between 30-35 people who are isolated or vulnerable in the village. Again our thanks go to Lloyd Maunder butchers in Exmouth who continue to supply us with meat at a discounted price.

Over the past year the Hub has been given £1200 in grants from Devon County Council, Lympstone W.I. and Harlow Consultancy to support this initiative. There are sufficient funds left to continue delivering meals at home for at least the next 4 months. September, October and November meals will continue to be delivered to homes but the December Christmas Lunch will be held in the Village Hall where we will also provide some form of entertainment. This will enable those people who have isolated for nearly 2 years to be able to socialise again. Those December recipients who are unable or unwilling to attend will still get their meal delivered to their home. More information on the December meal will appear in future Herald issues.

#### **ELECTRIFICATION**

I was just thinking about my birth town, Wolverhampton, and about the 2030 plan for electric vehicles.

When I was a child in the Midland town we had electric buses. Known as TROLLEY BUSES, they were guiet and as smooth as the road surface allowed. Above the road, two parallel wires were suspended from posts and supports, all along the various routes, about three feet (1 metre) higher than the buses. Two poles we attached to each bus roof and each pole linked to the overhead wires which carried the electricity. The link ran freely along the wires as the bus moved. I presume one wire was negative and the other positive? Thus the bus obtained its power. Not by battery but by sliding connection to the overhead power cables.

When a junction of two double wires coincided, the bus had to stop. The conductor/ticket collector, yes there were two operators on each bus, or was

it the driver?, got out with a long pole and changed the connector poles from one part of overhead wires to the ones above the new route.

This happened often and was annoying when a passenger was in hurry but life was at a slower, quieter pace then 1950's 1960's.

No pollution by fumes or noise. Just the ding of the bell to signal the driver to move on, when all passengers were aboard and seated. The clinking whirl of the little ticket machine on a strap over the conductor's shoulder.

At the first LOCKDOWN we relished the silence, the fresh air and the birdsong. Let us dream of the day when electric vehicles pass along the A376 quietly and without pollution. Maybe our children's, children will breathe clean air when waiting for a bus?

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#### LYMPSTONE GARDENING CLUB

It has been a strange year with unseasonable weather in April and May, and so I decided to ask some Lympstone gardeners how they have fared. There were problems in common, new varieties tried, different methods used, extraordinary growth, and star plants which did well. The following is a resumee of their responses.

Here are some of the problems and solutions: worst year ever for slugs and snails (and I would add moles), masses of ant hills appreciated by green woodpeckers, ferocious weeds, blight on potatoes controlled by cutting off all the foliage and blight on tomatoes both in the earth and in the greenhouse, poor crops of tomatoes in the greenhouse possibly due to variations in temperature [I found a dose of epsom salts (for the tomatoes!) brought mine back to better foliage and fruiting]. Some people had barely any plums/damsons which may have been due to late frosts on early blossom, and the early wet in May affected flowering plants such as zinnias.

Gardeners are not daunted and there were many pluses. Some flowering plants were more productive in secondary growth after being cut back, and some plants such as nicotiana appeared after a couple of years absence. Leafy plants did well after

surviving strong winds and all that May rain invigorated many shrubs (lots of pruning to come). There were fulsome hydrangeas, beautiful ornamental grasses swaving in the breeze and lots of sweet peas climbing and scrambling about. Dahlias have had an excellent time, and I was very pleased with my seed-grown ones. Someone sowed their sweet peas in the autumn for the first time, overwintered under cover and had lots of strong early flowers. She also sowed different coloured cornflowers with great success, and her giant scabious reached eight foot high! All great news from a new gardener in Lympstone.

Other star plants were Diascia personata, blooming from early spring and still keeping going (takes easily from cuttings), the Mexican sunflower (Tithonia rotundifolia) providing a tall cheerful display of orange flowers at this time of year and easily grown from seed, and an even taller display of large white flowers on Eucryphia nymansensis.

Regarding fruit and vegetables - good crops of autumn raspberries and blackberries, brassicas and legumes have done well, courgettes and cucumbers have been prolific and someone's three mini cucumbers produced six kilos of fruit in the greenhouse! Another garden produced 'sweetcorn strong and stately

surrounded by wild fennel and oregano'.

An interesting point to end on in this report is the appearance of the North American Mocking bird, clearly off course and singing his beautiful, shrill song high up in the tree tops next door to Averil. This must account for the twitchers I saw on the road into Exmouth a while ago.

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#### HAVE YOU HEARD OF THE EXETER COSY ROUTES?

Exeter Dementia Action Alliance (EDAA) has collaborated with Dementia Carer & marathon runner Jo Earlam & Cartoonist Tony Husband on their innovative, wellbeing project across Greater Exeter including Topsham.

The circular route created is made up of eight shorter loops taking the participant around Exeter and the surrounding area. The trails are called COSY routes ("circle of somewhere yours") and have been cleverly created to encourage people to get outside in the fresh air following familiar paths.

Walk or run it, the routes take the participant from Countess Wear Swing Bridge, and proceeding in a clockwise direction takes in Exminster, just in neighbouring Teignbridge, Marsh Barton trading estate, Alphington, the edge of St Thomas and Exwick, Stoke Hill, the highest point at 550 feet, Pinhoe, and the city's eastern border fringes with East Devon, Sowton, Clyst St Mary, Clyst St George, back into the city boundary at Topsham and returning alongside the River Exe to the swing bridge.

Gina Awad, EDAA lead explains "we feel this is a project that could become a real asset for the city. However at the heart of this project is our mission to raise dementia awareness and encourage people living with a dementia and their families as well as the community to get out, enjoy nature and create a general sense of wellbeing as well as providing funds to continue our work".

The good news is that anyone can join in. Karan Bennett, Alliance board member said "As keen walkers we're very excited about the COSY Routes and have already tried a couple! We thought we knew the Exeter locality well but discovered footpaths we didn't know existed, fantastic views and many points of interest".


