## **PARISH COUNCIL NEWS**

LPC held their monthly public meeting on Monday 6th December in the Meeting Room of the Village Hall. Midway through the meeting, the Chairman invited all members of the Parish Council and the public to join him for festive Christmas drinks and nibbles.

Clerks Report – The Clerk highlighted the fact that the quote for the play area refurbishments would cease at the end of Dec and had concerns of the current material and labour costs increasing. It was unanimously agreed by the PC to proceed with the order and works. The Clerk presented the CIL report to the PC which showed £55,126.87 received from new developments in the Parish. The Clerk was currently trying to find out from EDDC what this money was ringfenced and allocated for. The Clerk reported that the PC had received one interest from a member of the public regarding the PC vacancy. The candidate was present and co-opted on with immediate effect. I am really pleased to welcome Cllr Sue Francis to the team, and I will update the website with more information.

Report from the Chairman - The Chairman reported that he had been to watch the Pantomime 'Aladdin' produced by the Lympstone Players. He highly commended the Lympstone Players for such a professional performance.

He added there were some real stars and upcoming talent on the stage. Well done to all the cast and crew for all their hard work and dedication to produce such an uplifting and amazing panto! (Oh yes they did...!)

Report and update from LFRG - Mr Corcos and Mr Brewer were present to lead a presentation and report on the work of LFRG. The group began in 2017 and their main objective was to work with a collaborative and strategical approach to flooding in the Parish. The group was proactive with members of the public and a variety of agencies. The maps presented showed the flooding hotspots and the work undertaken to tackle these. There was computer generated predictions viewed to support the group make informed decisions to prevent future flooding. The Chairman thanked the group for their tireless and continued efforts to protect and keep the community safe.

Lympstone Football Club — Cllr Hill believed the PC and FC was finally able to approve the two new agreements for the use of Candys and Cliff Fields. Both the PC and FC have improved communications and respect to maintain and implement the agreements to allow the youth to continue play on Candy's Field.

Community Asset: Methodist Hall – Cllr Atkins explained that the Methodist Hall as a community asset had been publicly highlighted in the Lympstone Herald for the last two months. He reiterated that the PC wanted to try and acquire the building as a community asset. He added there was an open public meeting to be held on the 15th Dec to discuss this in full with interested Parishioners. The PC unanimously supported locally listing the building with EDDC to protect its future.

Communications: The Clerk reported that both herself and the Chairman met up with David Young to view how documents were added to the website. Mr Young explained that once a month he met with Mary Turner to discuss issues to resolve and improve the site. He was currently producing a user manual. Cllr Francis kindly volunteered to be the link Cllr with Mr Young.

Community: FLOS: Cllr Payne was happy to report that the grant application from the Marines Charity had been successful in securing £15,000 towards the play area refurbishment. She also thanked the three ladies who had successfully raised £1409 and the tennis club who had raised and donated £500 towards the project. Cllr Payne updated all members that the Marines had begun updating their

own equipment of the playpark on the Marine estate.

Youth Club: Cllr Payne reported that the Youth Club was in a dilapidated state and felt it needed a refurbishment. She had begun receiving quotes to upgrade the building. She would report at the next meeting the costs involved for this. Cllr Beatty felt the building should offer much more to the community and was concerned that the youth club had not begun again for the youth.

Neighbourhood Plan: Cllr C Eastley reported that the NP working group had met and had drafted a letter to the community. The letter would be requesting comments from members of the public regarding the current Neighbourhood Plan and the closing date for comments would be 17th Jan.

**Environment:** Exe Estuary: it was agreed to donate £250 towards fuel costs of the boat patrol along the Exe Estuary from Exeter Port Authority.

Wotton Brook: Cllr Staddon reported on the recent water testing if the Brook. The PC have now obtained a baseline assessment of the water quality to measure future water testing. Please note that the PC as a whole are concerned with the water quality throughout the Parish and it is paramount that members of the public continue to report any pollution concerns using the Environment

Agency's (EA) 24/7 pollution incident number: 0800 870060 and any health concerns should be reported to EDDC Environmental Health department (as displayed and informed on the public notices along the Brook from LPC).

Heritage and Structure: Gulliford Joint Committee and Friends of Gulliford Burial Ground: Cllr Beatty reported that the Gulliford meeting on 29th Nov went well and the evaluation of the project was discussed. Cllr Staddon reported that the GJC meeting on the 1st Dec discussed the Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF) online final report had to be completed by 31st Dec. All the volunteers have worked so hard on completing this project and a massive thank you to the HLF for the necessary grant funding of £66,500 to complete the work.

The next PC meeting will be held in the Youth Club on Monday 10th January 2022 at 7.30pm.

Finally, all Lympstone Councillors would like to take this opportunity to thank you for your continued support. May you all have a very Merry Christmas and Happy, Healthy New Year!




Tickets will not be available until late January because of the evolving COVID situation and the event will be subject to any COVID restrictions in place at the time.

## THE HERALD HISTORY SPOT

This portrait is based on a talk given by Ralph Rochester to the Devon History Society in Lympstone Village Hall on 23 April 2016. They are reproduced here with kind permission of the author.

MR. WAKELYN WELCH1763? - 1818 Mr Wakelyn Welch was a worthy man of business who came to this village towards the end of the eighteenth century and who died here exactly 198 years ago, on St George' Day, 1818. Him, and his wife, Elizabeth, let us associate with public-spiritedness, a virtue that has never been lacking here. Not only did Wakelyn have a wonderful name, worth remembering, but he was a wonderful man worth remembering. He lived with his wife in the house now called Merrylands on Parsonage Hill, now called Burgmann's Hill, and he came here in middle life and soon befriended the Regency Rector here, John Prestwood Gidoin, and attended all the Vestry meetings and undertook every kind of parish office and duty as can be seen from the Lympstone Vestry records, including that, in 1813, of parish champion and legal adviser in our famous Battle of the Pews when the newly arrived resident at Nutwell tried to claim rights to seats in the church for himself and his family, his tenants and his servants. Wakelyn was busy in the parish's behalf and prevailed and the parish on that occasion formally thanked him for 'the unwearied exertions and the steady perseverance by which he

had asserted the rights of the parish.' When Wakelyn died in 1818 he gave the parish, as can be read in the church porch, £200 pounds for the purchase of blankets each Christmas as loans to poor cottagers, plus £100 for the instruction of poor children, in Sunday School or otherwise, a very generous but conventional enough bequest, but when his widow, Elizabeth died in 1823 she left funds to the parish to build the National School, now the Lympstone Primary School near the church in his memory: a momentous gift which should never be forgotten.

What's fun about Wakelyn Welch is that he would seem to be the same man who was the London agent of George Washington and Thomas Jefferson. His father, another Wakelyn Welch, had been dealing with these two Founding Fathers before the American Revolution, and young Wakelyn joined his father's firm after the war in 1783 to find himself dealing with the one man soon to be the first President of the United States and the other in course of time to be the third. Because of this connection one only need to google the name Wakelyn Welch to be able to read fascinating letters to and from these Founding Fathers.

## POLLUTION OF WOTTON BROOK

I feel that I must reply to all readers from an article in last month's Lympstone Herald to omit any misunderstanding. My response is from the article 'Pollution of Wotton Brook' sent by a member of the public.

The article quotes a report by the Environment Agency which is nearly two years old (the EA has confirmed this) and was sent out by the EA as some sort of reassurance that the sewage from the Workshop, at that time, was satisfactory.

I can only state that I have witnessed the Brook deplete of wildlife since the 1950s. Currently our authority's and developers take advantage and although a machine can dig a sewer pipe in faster than by hand it is considered still acceptable to dump huge amount of foul water into our water courses. Of course, the chemical additive to the foul water kills 99% of all germs, but also kills 99% of all fauna and flora of the water course.

The Parish Council have been so concerned over the pollution in the Brook that they have produced public notices to raise awareness. proactive, the Parish Council have invested in water testing kits to monitor the situation. I am very concerned for future generations both locally and nationally.

If any member of the parish wishes to take up any points with me then I would be only too happy to have a chat.

When I look back nearly 50 years some of our happiest times cost very little. It was a struggle on 40p an hour but we had just enough to pay the bills and pleasures were simple, free, up-cycled, DIY or 'make do and mend'. The budget was tight but any little windfall, like a £10 prize we received just before one Christmas, felt like a fortune...as did any small prize won at a Whist Drive.

Lympstone Village Hall was the venue for \*\*Whist each week, usually 20 tables of four players and at Christmas, for the

meat and poultry prizes, it was so full we had to spill over onto the stage and into the Committee Room behind.

I remember the sounds...silence when each game was played then chatter about scores followed by the scraping of chairs and shuffling of feet as we moved to the next table. More shuffling...of cards, cut the pack and deal...silence again. Such a simple, pleasant and even exciting, evening. Poor man's Bridge, perhaps?

Because it was 'progressive whist' and after each game the winners would move to the next table. Ladies forward and gents backwards. There were always less men than women so ladies had to play gent.

This way you got to meet many village people. We dreaded being on BH's table because he was SO serious... woe betide you if you trumped his ace! Less frequent but even more exciting, and noisy, we're Beetle Drives...these attracted the younger set.

Happy memories of sociable events that I don't think happen now. I wonder how many Lympstone folk still remember those evenings?

(for youngsters who may not know \*\*Whist, it is a real card game played in 'hands' and each hand is won by the highest card. Player or pair with most 'hands' wins the game...and the Christmas Turkey! Ask your Grandma how to play it.)


