

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

LPC held their monthly public meeting on Monday 9th May in the Meeting Room.

Chairman and Vice Chairman – Cllr Linfoot was voted as the new Chairman and Cllr Staddon was voted as the new Vice Chairman for LPC for the municipal year. Cllr Linfoot thanked Cllr Hill and Cllr Beatty for all their hard work last year. All Cllrs signed their Declarations of Office for 2022/23.

Clerks Report – The Clerk and the Chairman signed off the PCs accounts for 2021/22 as presented below.

The Clerk reported on the meeting with Internal Auditor and presented her annual auditor's certificate for 21/22. The internal auditor was especially pleased with the accounting system, updated policies, and risk

assessments. She also felt the website was clear and easy to navigate with all the necessary documents readily available to the public. A special thank you to our webmasters who keep this constantly updated. The AGAR Annual Audit 2021/22 Governance Statement and Annual Audit 2021/22 Accounting statements were signed by the Chairman and Clerk. The Notice of public rights was read out and would be published 13 June to 22 July 2022. The PC meeting dates were confirmed for May 22 - April 23: Monday: 9 May 2022, 6 June 22, 4 July 22, August 22 no meeting, 5 September 22, 3 October 22, 7 November 22, 5 December 22, 9 January 2023, 6 February 23, 6 March 23, 3 April 23 including the Annual Parish Meeting. had been confirmed for the 25th July. The Clerk had notified EDDC of a Cllr vacancy on the PC, the notice has been publicly advertised and this would expire on the 23rd May. After this date, EDDC would notify the Clerk if an election had been called or if the PC could co-opt new members. Cllr Linfoot wanted to thank Cllr Chris Carter for all his time, effort, and countless voluntary hours over many years of tirelessly working for the community, a well-known and respected member of the Council and past Chairman. Thank you, Chris. We all send our very best wishes.

Report from East Devon District Councillor - District Cllr Jung thanked the PC for hosting the public drop-in sessions regarding the proposed development sites in the East Devon Plan review to gain an insight on the member of the public's views. He felt that the public overall wanted to retain the character of the Parish, access to open countryside, protect the green wedge, safeguard from commercial development and better transport links. Cllr Jung also then explained that new housing numbers for East Devon had been released from the government and had increased from providing 918 to 946 new houses a year.

Community Asset – The Methodist Hall. The PC would like it known that over many months they have tirelessly attempted to work with the Methodist Trustees and agents securing the Methodist Hall for the community. The PC have made the following statement: Lympstone Parish Council after careful consideration submitted an offer to purchase the Methodist school as a community asset. This was not accepted by the Methodist Church, who now intend to place the property on the open market. The future of the building now lies with the Methodist Church. The PC will continue to actively monitor the situation and the market.

The PC would like to thank the 'Friends of the Methodist Hall group' for their hard work in supporting the Parish Council.

Community committee – Cllr Linfoot reported that on Sunday 5th June, access to Candys Field would be closed for a few hours in the afternoon due to the world record cream tea attempt. This is due to very strict rules which must be adhered to set by Guinness world record officials. Admittance will be by ticket only for this event. Cllr Francis updated all members on the new PC Facebook page. Currently there was 82 followers on the PCs page, up 178% on post engagement and 139 page visits. She had tried to

There is a small but enthusiastic audience for these afternoon showings. who were dismayed to be told at the AGM that they might come to an end for the lack of a projectionist. There were fears that last month's matinée, 'The Last Film Show', might live up to its name. Please contact the Chair, Sheila Stone, on 274 356 if you would like to help.

Sheila told the AGM that membership and attendance at the monthly evening screenings was recovering well after the hiatus caused by the pandemic. Since it was founded in 2007, the Film Society has enjoyed an annual membership of over 100, a remarkable achievement for a village. In the season just finished it fell below that for the first time, but recovered to a figure of 84. The rate of members signing up for next season suggests that the magic figure of 100 will certainly be broken again. The membership fee remains at only £20, remarkably low for 8 films, a bonus film, and (we hope) some matinées.

Of course people can watch films alone at home on the small screen or

even on their phones, but as members discovered once again last season, there is nothing like watching a film in company with an audience of others, and sharing in the comedy or the emotion of the story you are enjoying. You could feel the tension of the moment as you watched 'The Constant Gardener', the powerful John le Carré thriller we saw after the AGM, or the quirky heartwarming humour of 'The Man in the Hat' which left everybody with such a good feeling the month before.

The Film Society offers a friendly and sociable communal experience, with its welcoming bar beforehand, its traditional cinema ice creams in the interval, and the opportunity to chat to other people about the entertainment you have just seen together.


We currently meet every other Friday from 10.00 to 12.00 and would look to continue meeting at this time if a suitable location can be found.

CELEBRATING THE FLOWER SHOW'S 75 YEARS

To celebrate 75 years of Lympstone Flower Show, the Garden Club is publishing a book and holding an exhibition in the Village Hall.

The Lympstone Show has been written by Tony Day, whose first book about the village, A Lympstone Lad, was such a success a couple of years ago. The new book is being launched at the exhibition on Friday, 1st July at 6pm.

In this book you will find stories of Show characters down the years, of the perils of judging, the Great Bread Controversy, and gardeners passionate about growing long beans, heavy marrows, and, above all, dahlias.

The secrets of Lympstone's national and international triumphs in Britain in Bloom are revealed, including an inside account of the famous coach trip to Orleans, where a party of villagers collected the Prix d'Honneur, survived a car crashing into their restaurant, and taught the French a traditional English dance.

Lavishly and wittily illustrated by Lympstone artists, this book captures the spirit of a great English tradition.

Villagers are invited to the book launch on the Friday evening 7 to 9.30 pm, and to the exhibition which is open on Saturday 2nd July from 10 am to 6 pm.

All the archive material will be on show - historic minutes and accounts, and the Show schedules from 1947 onwards. Also on display will be the Cups engraved with the names of the winners - a rare chance to be able to examine these at close range - and many photographs of the characters associated with the event. We shall also be showing the original drawings that Lympstone artists have made to illustrate the book.

At 2pm there will be a talk by Todd Gray, whose many books include The Art of the Devon Garden.

THE HERALD HISTORY SPOT

This portrait is based on a talk given by Ralph Rochester to the Devon History Society in Lympstone Village Hall on 23 April 2016. They are reproduced here with kind permission of the author.

DOCTOR JOHN HADDY JAMES 1788-1869

Exeter rightly claims Dr John Haddy James as her own for he was born in Exeter and died in Exeter and his working life was at the Devon and Exeter Hospital where he was on the staff for 42 years from 1816 until 1858. He was famous as an innovative doctor and incidentally as a curer of consumptives by making them camp out on the Maer at Exmouth. But his links with Lympstone are interesting and very strong and it would seem his heart and soul was in Lympstone, first of all in that part of this parish called Sowden where his

grandmother lived. Sowden has always been a magic corner of the parish and more so before the railway came, in the days when the tides pushed up the inlet. It was also an exposed place acutely aware of the dangers of invasion by the French enemy and given to breeding fierce patriots. It is as a patriot, rather than as a doctor that we can claim him for Lympstone.

His mother was Hannah Williams of Sowden House and her children made many visits to their grandparents in Lympstone. Hannah had married a Bristol merchant who had retired to Exeter and bore him children and from



the age of 15 young John trained as a surgeon, first in Exeter and then in London. In the year of Waterloo, when he was 27, he enlisted as Assistant Surgeon to the First Life Guards and went with them to France. The fact that he went to France with Wellington's army was a measure of his patriotism. a virtue that is much associated with this village. He was no doubt inspired by the example of his relative Captain John Williams RN of this parish who had been one of Nelson's officers and had almost been at the battle of Trafalgar. When John Haddy James returned to England in 1815 he wrote an account of his experiences which was much later found and edited by the Exmouth writer Jane Vansittart and published by Cassell in 1964 under the title Surgeon James's Journal 1815. The manuscript of this account was found in Lympstone in the cobwebbed apple -loft of the barn of Haddy James's house in the village. The barn has long since been transformed into a dwelling on Longmeadow Road called "Adam's Cottage". The final paragraph of the journal reads: 'Our England stands secure on the dignity of the Church, and the strength of the Crown, and the sturdy excellence of the people, both high and low, and the glory of our might and right is a torch held out to the darkness and unrest of other countries.' And in capitals: 'GOD SAVE THE KING.' John Haddy James retired to this village and had property here and was buried here. His grave lies and his headstone stands in Lympstone churchvard between the church and the road as does the monument to the naval hero. Captain John Williams. Not many villages can have the resting places of a hero of Nelson's navy and one of Wellington's army so close one to the other.
