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PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Clerks Report

The PC would like to welcome a new member of the team! Mr Brian Murray was successfully co-opted onto the Council, and we all look forward to working with him. Cllr Murray will have a short write up online with his photo so everyone will know a bit more about our new member. The PC still have one more vacancy so if there is anyone else who is interested in joining the PC, please do not hesitate to contact me to find out more: lympstonepc@gmail.com We are all very friendly and dedicated to the Parish and Parishioners of Lympstone. The Clerk presented the PCs draft budget for 2023/24 but it was agreed to postpone approval until after the Chancellors announcement on the 17th Nov. LPCs Child Protection. Complaints, Co-option, Digital and social media and PC job description Policies were reviewed and approved: these would be added to the website. The Clerk explained that the current Herald editor was present and invited him to speak. Mr Hilton explained that there was potentially one expression of interest to temporarily edit the Herald. If this interest was not successful, then the Herald production from January would have a remission for a few months. Cllr Murray thanked Mr Hilton for all his hard work and dedication to the monthly newsletter. Cllr Hill fully shared his heartfelt thanks to Mr Hilton and believed the Herald was a 'vital organ' to build and inform the community.

Reports from the Chairman, East Devon District Councillors and Devon County Councillors

The Chairman read his report: ľm aware that there has been a number of PC committee meetings in the last 2 months, and a number of important issues addressed. Thanks to involved for the hard work. On a similar theme, I would like to thank Councillors Payne and Staddon and Mrs Briggs for the hard work they are putting in to convert the storeroom in the Hub to a usable workspace. I would like to thank Cllr Staddon for representing the PC and attending the opening of Yonder Wood. Finally, I would like to praise, Mr & Mrs Russell, Cllr Hill and RBL builders for the views available over the rebuilt wall to the Village Green. A vast improvement on what went before.

Both District Cllr Jung and District Cllr Ingham spoke about the East Devon Local Plan Review. They encouraged everyone to submit their responses online to the open public consultation at Have Your Say Today - East Devon Local Plan - Commonplace The public consultation will close on the 15th January 2023.

East Devon Local Plan Review - LPC is also hosting their own drop-in

public open session where maps of the proposed local areas for development can be viewed and discussed: 19th November between 10.30am – 3.30pm in the Meeting Room at the Village Hall. It is vital that the PCs report is guided by Parishioners responses and views. It is also imperative that members of the public make their own individual responses to EDDC's open public consultation. Mr Dalley, a representative of the Northeast Exmouth residents' group was present and explained that they had set up a website: www.nomore-goodmores.co.uk All information from the proposed areas and public consultation can also be found here. On the 26th of November in Brixington Church, the Northeast Exmouth residents' group will be hosting their own public meeting to discuss the proposals.

Community Hub meeting 28th November 6-8pm

Cllr Linfoot explained that there was a meeting planned for groups and clubs to attend in the meeting room of the village hall. It is essential that there are volunteers in place for the Kings Coronation event to be held in May 2023. Therefore, if you are a member of a Lympstone club, group or society and interested in finding out more and getting involved then please come along to the meeting and listen. It could

be a great opportunity and fundraising event for your club, group or society!

Environment committee

Cllr Staddon had represented the PC and attended the opening of Yonder Wood. She explained that Cllr Jung was also present, and he had planted the first tree. She added that the Woodlands Trust had great ideas and plans set out for the future, the views were amazing, and the saplings planted were well protected. She added that local schools were getting involved and this week, Lympstone Primary School would be learning about and planting trees. She added that it was well worth a visit once opened to the public.

Planning and transport

Cllr Linfoot reported that he had spoken with Ms Jill Elson from Exmouth Community Transport who provided community transport at a reasonable cost. He explained that unfortunately volunteers now needed additional special insurance to use their own vehicle. He added that there was also 'Exmouth Community Car Service' and 'Driving Miss Daisy' in the area. He would collate and provide information for the website and Facebook page.

Community - Cllr Payne had met with Mr Hilton from Hilton Barnfield Architects to discuss drawings for a new build of

the Youth Club building. She presented the drawing to all present. The vision was a 'community building' rather than just a youth club. The building would encompass an exercise room, youth club, sensory room, meeting room, events room, PC office, hot desk space, community kitchen and café facility. Cllr Payne explained that the next steps would be a public consultation. Mr Lyons added that funding was critical and to test the interest first with current users. The building would ideally be financially self-sufficient. A business plan would be produced, and a commercial strategy would be developed. All very exciting!

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



WILD ABOUT LYMPSTONE

The last letter for 2022. How time flies! First and foremost may I thank all those who throughout the year have enlightened us about the many different ways in which they are enjoying wildlife and helping it to thrive.

I have found it a delight whilst wandering round the village to be stopped by friend or visitor with even the smallest remark; "By the way, Mary, we have foxes in our garden and (name given) have quite a family in theirs!"

One early morning I was standing at the end of the jetty gazing at our magical river when an unexpected voice calls up from the water as a lady poles along on her surfboard; "Have you seen the kingfisher in the car park? I've seen him three times!" Sadly I haven't. Have you? Or sitting on the Green; "sparrows in those bushes are chasing off the Robin. poor little chap!" Dozens more of these sort of out of the blue remarks without introduction are SO encouraging, responding to our aim to discover how many people are engaged in helping the return of our precious wild flowers and creatures.

A pot of delicious honey was pressed into my hands from a keen bee keeper. She was picking herbs in a a pot in her tiny garden in front of her cottage. Several bee keepers now live in the village.

Another kind friend sent me a video of the Beavers on the Otter River he

had taken with ardent patience: a new friend showed me his stunning bird photos. We must see more of them. A prominent boring bank has been brought to new life with loving labour, a hedge, and Wild flowers which are still flowering in November!

Rebecca interviewed а professor amongst us who at one time had sat for days studying the Estuary birds and another naturalist friend was "woken each morning by the call of the curlew" by the river. His job has been helping farmers on Dartmoor to return the old farming methods. Elderly Lympstonians have fond memories of how their grandfathers went about farming when there were so many more farms in the village itself, friendly to the soil. A newer villager acquaintance manages Woodland near his relatives and there's a lady here who assists up at Woodbury Common. I can count at least 5 mixed hedgerows that have been planted since 2020 right in the village.

Our two schools are very busy with wildlife pursuits helping to plant trees and hedges or down on the beach watching the birds, the tidal movements and studying the history of our rounded pebbles.

Our churchyard displayed a miracle carpet of Spring primroses and followed the 'No Mow May' slogan.

Of course Jimmy the hedgehog caused a dramatic stir as did the discovery of tiny mother field mouse cozily suckling her three babies in a compost heap. Toads are making a comeback in a number of places.

Several bigger projects too progress at pace with much love and hard work; Gulliford Burial Ground is one. A great success.

The transformation of an overwhelming unloved patch of bramble- ridden lifeless 'field' with meadow plants bringing pollinators and a freshly planted hedgerow quickly colonised by small shy animals and a copse planted of indigenous trees. In one corner a patch for apples, plums and cherries with a productive veg patch are planted. A pond is in the making completing this little sanctuary the result of hard physical labour as well as the aesthetic attribute for which our wellbeing yearns.

So many others are casting out old practices in their gardens no longer using pesticides or peat or untimely mowing or over conscientious weeding and practicing companion planting in the vegetable patch.

Hundreds more Lympstonians have been as busy as ever feeding the birds, studying the movements of the wild nightlife by camera in an little copse where on a sunny daytime an old pond attracts dragonflies and damsenflies and a stream continues to rush down cutting a deep Goyle in the sandstone cliffs.

The Wotton brook is in roaring spate today after months of drought almost

marooning the family in the Old Mill where birds and beasts flourish.

I am sorry I cannot mention more of those wonderful people in our diverse Parish stretching from our unusual boundary in the River Exe to our proudly guarded patch on the Common reaching as it climbs the steep hill through diverse soil structure and flora rich in sacrosanct habitats where the hamlets of Wotton and Hulham used to be.

And to all of you for providing the positive hope we must keep alive for a beautiful new world. One special thank you to Rebecca for her support and positive action and ideas and to Mary T for Facebook messages (quite beyond me!).

A very Happy Christmas and a 2023 full of more lovely wildlife stories. Nature's power to restore in every way gives us courage and enchantment.

THE HERALD HISTORY SPOT

Living in a Devon Coastal Village in the late 1500's: Part 3 The Market - produced by Lympstone History Society

I adopt the style of talking history in the present tense.

While most villagers are able to fulfil most of their everyday needs from local sources every so often they visit the market in Exeter market is held on two days a week. Most villagers walk there. The roads are made of gravel, slate and stone and can be very muddy. As they walk, the villagers might be passed by the more wealthy people on horseback or on donkeys, carts loaded with goods, people pushing hand carts, the occasional coach and trains of

pack horses loaded with produce from the fields. Mud splatters everywhere. Eventually they reach the city gates of Exeter. You know you are reaching the city from the increasingly rank smell. There are many people standing around, trying to influence those coming in from the villages, to sell their goods or services. There are ballad singers who transmit news through their songs. People are excited about the new canal in Exeter, but are very frightened about news of the spread of plague again. Inside the gates there is a crowd of people watching and betting on fighting



cocks. Cages of cocks waiting their turn to fight are stacked haphazardly against a wall. The cacophony is great.

There are stalls all around, with everything you could want in the late 1500's displayed for sale. Children dart around in and out of the crowds, some chasing hoops and some kick a ball made from a pig's bladder full of peas. There is a stall of metal hardware nails, hooks, pegs and tools. Another stall sells traps for vermin. There are stalls of ruffs and a group of better dressed women cluster round. Large stiff ruffs are currently fashionable for those with money. Girls chatter round a stall of ribbons and another sells fine lace. There is a stall selling serge (a hard-wearing woollen cloth) and aprons made of hemp. There are traders selling pastries and sweetmeats from travs. Jowters sell fish off the fishing boats that have come into the Exe ports. On a

warm day the smell of deteriorating fish adds to the already rank smells of the city. Nearby there are the bright colours of oranges, lemons and dates from Mediterranean countries. People look at them with some curiosity as they are relatively newly available in England. Some well-dressed women hover near to that stall holding tightly on to their purses. A man sells cider from a barrel. People drink from bowls and pots and quite a few stagger, drunk already. There is a noisy group of mariners who seem not to be from England.

And then there is the long walk home for those from the villages.....
