On Saturday June 24th 2pm at Gulliford Burial Ground (in Meeting Lane, opp. the top of Strawberry Hill), we are delighted to have a return visit from Kim Lever, who will guide visitors around the burial ground identifying



FIND OUT ABOUT LYMPSTONE FLOOD RISK

Come along to the Village Hall on Saturday 2nd September for a Drop-in session to find out about the flood risk to the village and how we can respond to this.

The Lympstone Flood Resilience Group (LFRG) was formed in late 2017 to develop a more coordinated and strategic approach to flood risk management in the village - based on understanding the risk and facilitating action to minimise this and its impact. studies of the upper catchment of the Wotton Brook carrying out soil surveys and mapping land use. We have also been working with the Environment Agency on a catchment model to better understand what measures w ould help to mitigate flood risk. We now want to share the findings with residents.

There will be a series of displays explaining the flood risk and what we have learnt from the various studies. The displays will consider a 'perfect storm' and how that would impact the village.



Since then the group has commissioned

At the event we will explain how we can prepare for a flood. Already in place are two teams of flood wardens, an Estuary team and an Inland & surface water team. You may have seen the work that they do clearing gullies and making sure that the flood gates are closed when there is a threat of flooding from the Estuary. These are just two key tasks among several undertaken by Flood Wardens to manage the flood risk.

There will be a section about what you can do, covering individual property resilience, how to prepare for flooding and the responsibilities of riparian owners.

So do come along between 10 and 5 on the 2nd September.

We know that summer has arrived, because the Friends of the Church have announced the date for the Annual Cricket Match between Lympstone Cricket Club and St Peter's School:


Thursday, 8th June at 6pm at St Peter's School Cricket Ground



THE HERALD HISTORY SPOT The Tale of the Flint Tool (Part 1)

This is another history spot that veers into geology, archaeology and imagined history.

In various places in the village, I have picked up pieces of flint that has been 'worked' worked' to form a tool in the stone or bronze ages, more than two thousand years ago ('lithics'). 'Knapping' is the process in which flakes are removed from a block of stone, usually flint, in order to make a useable product. Flint tools were made for many thousands of years before the discovery of metal working.

The knapping of flint is possible because of the manner in which flint fractures when it is hit. It seems likely that most people in prehistoric times could make a rough tool for immediate use, but there were experts who turned out very beautiful flint as tools or valued objects. Flint can be many different colours from yellow to black. The lithics that I have found in Lympstone are very black, the colour of the good quality flint that is found at Beer Head, just along the coast.

And of course, flint as a rock has a longer history. It started millions of years before it was knapped and that is where this story starts – around 100 million years ago in the Cretaceous part of the Mesozoic period.

Around 250 million years ago, at a time when the continents of the earth were still moving towards the way the world looks now, there was a great rise in sea levels. Many of the continents became covered by sea. On the land at the time there were dinosaurs. In the waters there was a mass of small organisms with skeletons rich in calcium. As they died, they sank to the bottom and over tens of millions of years, their skeletons amassed eventually into white or grey chalk. The chalk sea was the environment in which flint had its origin. Calcium carbonate was the main chemical in the water but also there was silica, and simple organisms, such as sponges and diatoms used the silica to create the structures of their skeletons. As they died, they sank onto and then deep into the chalk mud and a silica-In chemical rich liquid was formed. reactions deep in these sediments that involved hydrogen sulphide, oxygen and carbonate, the silica precipitated to form the early stages of flint. Sometimes sponges or other organic remains formed a base for the formation of flint. so there can be the remains of fossils in flint (look in your gravel!). The nodule of flint from which my tool was made might have been embedded in white chalk in the south of what became the British

Isles, though at that time England was still joined to France.

There were periods of deep cold and then warmer times. Dinosaurs became extinct as mammals were slowly starting to evolve. The chalk that formed at the bottom of the sea was pushed up by the movements of continents and dried as land. Where the land was highest, the chalk, being soft, tended to erode and flint nodules were exposed. The large nodule might have split into many pieces.
