PARISH COUNCIL NEWS SEPTEMBER 2023

LPC held their monthly public meeting on Monday 4th September in the Meeting Room.

Public session - Mrs Lyons explained that there had been a great response to an open garden event next June. The Lympstone Garden festival would take place over the weekends 8th/9th June and 15/16th June 2024. There had been eight gardens confirmed (more gardens were welcomed) with a planned front garden and scarecrow trail around the Parish. All funds raised would be for Lympstone and Exmouth Hospiscare.

Casual Vacancy – The PC successfully co-opted a new member, welcome and congratulations to Cllr Robert Gale-Hasleham! The Parish Council now has a full Council.

Clerk's Report - The Parish Council agreed to become full members of the Exe Estuary management Partnership (EEMP). The Clerk presented the Notice of Conclusion of Audit, external auditor report and certificate with no issues identified. This has been published on notice boards and the website. The film society was successfully awarded their grant application to convert some reels of 90-year-old film footage of Lympstone to a modern format to conserve it.

20 is Plenty – Cllr Linfoot reported on this scheme. The PC agreed to support the 20mph speed limit in the Parish and pay for an initial traffic survey to see if Lympstone was eligible.

Reports from the Chairman, East Devon District Councillors and Devon County

Councillors – The Chairman welcome everyone back and thanked Cllrs for their perseverance and continued hard work over the summer break. He updated all present that there had been further anti-social behaviour in the public toilets over the summer and felt the PC needed to write again to the Police to enhance their presence and tackle mindless behaviour.

The Chairman, EDDC and DCC Cllrs all congratulated LFRG on a very successful drop-in session at the village hall. They were in awe of the work undertaken by the team and felt they were a role model and excellent example of the multi-agency approach to the issues of flooding for other groups in the area. Heartfelt thanks were shared for their efforts and expertise. Well done LFRG, you have made us incredibly proud!

Carbon Literacy – Cllr Culhane reported on Carbon literacy and what it meant for Lympstone.

She will be working with the Environment committee to deliver future initiatives and ideas.



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EXE ESTUARY TRAIL CLOSURE

Reminder:

I am writing to advise that Devon County Council have appointed a contractor to carry out works to Courtlands Boardwalk – the raised timber boardwalk on the Exe Estuary Trail between Lympstone and Exmouth.

After a routine inspection, the timber elements of the boardwalk were found to have deteriorated and rotted. Minor repairs have been ongoing for a couple of years to replace individual deck planks etc, but it is now time to carry out major works to completely replace all the timber elements with fibrereinforced polymer (FRP) elements. FRP is a durable material that will not deteriorate in the damp environment that the boardwalk is situated in.

Unfortunately due to the extensive nature of the work, there is no alternative but to close this section of the Exe Estuary Trail for the duration of the work. A diversion route will be in place as shown in the attached plan.

The works are scheduled to start towards the end of September (after the school summer holidays) and is expected to last for about 3 months.

Information boards are going to be put up along the trail soon to advise users

of the upcoming closure, closure dates, and more information about the works and why we are doing it. We would like to try and reach as many interested parties as possible (local residents, businesses and other stakeholders) so please do forward this email on as necessary.



LYMPSTONE VILLAGE HALL

Following on from the interesting article on Lympstone Village Hall (LVH) in the last edition of The Herald, it seemed an appropriate time to offer an insight into how the Village Hall runs. It has a history, a present and a future.

For those who are new to the Village, or perhaps just unaware of how the Hall works, let me explain.

The Hall is run as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) registered with the Charities Commission of England and Wales. A CIO is a modern structure for a charity, by definition "a corporate form of business designed for charitable organisations (in England and Wales)." In our case the members of the organisation are the Trustees. The CIO has a constitution and set of policies and procedures which can be found on our website. The benefits of the organisation being a CIO are that the property is held by the CIO rather than in the name of the Trustees and the Trustees have limited financial liability.

Our Trustees are principally drawn from members of various Lympstone clubs, societies, and organisations, but may also be just volunteers with no affiliation. In our case, Trustees fill the role on a voluntary basis, as well as represent various village clubs and societies.

The CIO Board has four Trustees meetings per year plus an AGM, the

most recent AGM having taken place on 19th September. In addition to the Board meetings, monthly Management meetings take place where the general running of the Village Hall is discussed. Major topics and any significant decisions which need to be made are taken to the CIO Board for discussion and ratification. The Management team is made up of several Trustees and the Maintenance Manager and Bookings Coordinator.

The main purpose of the LVH CIO is to provide a safe, welcoming, and wellequipped venue where local people can come together for community events and activities. The CIO is guided by a set of core values which are the anchor point for every decision and interface it has, managing both internal and external aspects of its business. And ves. to maintain the Hall in its excellent condition requires it to be run in a business-like manner, whilst not losing sight of the needs of the community. Unfortunately, that means that "you can't please all of the people all of the time, but you try to please most of the people most of the time."

Over the years the Hall has benefited from the kind generosity of many villagers and village organisations in terms of volunteering, fundraising, and equipment donations. The Hall would not be where it is today without that support.

With the collective hard work of so many within the community, the Hall continues to provide a first-class facility for the many organisations who hire the Hall on a regular or one-off basis.

Other than the myriad of maintenance tasks and projects required to keep the hall running on a day-to-day basis while maintaining compliance with the necessary modern health and safety standards, there have been a number of major projects and improvements to the Hall:

- · Installation of solar panels;
- installation of air conditioning with UV air sanitization,
- upgrade of the AV systems in all rooms and state of the art cinema quality system installed in the main hall:
- installation of modern theatre standard stage lighting;
- repainting and refreshing the main areas of the Hall;
- soundproofing and carpet installation in the Community Room;
- development, (including replacing the flat roof) of old changing rooms into a club room facility for the Tennis Club;
- refurbishment of the bar area, ...and the list goes on.

To accomplish the above, the very hard work put in by our Maintenance Team (one man!), Trustees and volunteer workforce must be recognised.

The volunteers known as "Friends of LVH" bring a variety of skills and are regularly called upon to assist in maintenance tasks as well as mini and not so mini-improvement projects. The same team also helps prepare the Hall for club, society and many other events. Currently, there are vacant positions for Trustees, (particularly those with business skills). The vacancies have been created by the recently announced resignation for personal commitment reasons of three highly valued Trustees, Doreen Murray (Deputy Chair), Mary Turner (Secretary) and Caron Winter, (Bookings Coordinator). We do have a new Bookings Coordinator, but would encourage anyone who feels they can make a positive contribution toward running of the Hall to contact any of the existing Trustees to express interest and gain insight into the CIO and the role of a Trustee at LVH.

Ongoing Hall improvements are necessary to meet technical standards as well as supporting current and future needs of all Hall users within the Lympstone community. In a future article we will provide updates on activities and planned projects.

THE MEDIEVAL WARHORSE

A Talk by Ollie Creighton

Ollie Creighton is a leading player in the Lympstone cricket team, a flamboyant Prince Valentine in the Lympstone Mumming Play, and Professor of Archaeology at Exeter University. He is a compelling and entertaining speaker, and an authority on castles. You may well have seen him on television. He is now leading a study of the Medieval Warhorse, and Lympstone History Society has invited him to come and reveal the findings in the Village Hall on Monday, 23rd October at 7.30pm.

Warhorses jumped into the headlines a few years ago with Michael Morpurgo's novel about a Devon horse, which became a play, a puppet and a Steven Spielberg film. But that was about the First World War, which saw the last significant use of warhorses in battle. Ollie will be talking about warhorses from 600 years earlier, at the beginning of a military revolution.

The Warhorse Project has carried out the first ever study of archaeological evidence for warhorses in medieval England — from scientific samples extracted from teeth through to analysis of bones, equestrian artefacts and armour, and the sites associated with horse breeding and training. How big do you think a Warhorse was?



HARBOUR MATTERS

The annual craning of boats from the outfall of Wotton Brook to the hardstanding of the Harbour is planned for the morning of Wednesday 3rd October 2023, from before dawn to midday.

A large mobile crane will move through the village to the Harbour during the afternoon of Tuesday 2nd and depart early afternoon on Wednesday.

Owners of vehicles normally parked on the route between the Harbour via The Strand, Bergmann's Hill, Nutwell Road and the A376, particularly on the corner turning into the Harbour outside the Swan Inn, and at the parking bays on The Strand furthest from and in sight of the railway bridge are asked to park such that the crane can pass easily.

For safety reasons, the Harbour will be closed to the public during craning and during crane movements. Thank you for your co-operation.

PETER SCHAESSENS

In July 2023 one of Lympstone's oldest residents Peter Schaessens, died aged nearly 97. He retired to the village with his wife Shirley in 1988 and enjoyed many happy years here, though Shirley died in 2006. At his funeral a brief history of his life was presented which a neighbour in the village said she felt could be of interest to other people who knew him, and so we offer this now.

Peter's father, Valentine, who was a skilled carpenter who'd fought in WW1 for his home county of Belgium emigrated to England to work in hotels with his brother. Peter's parents, Valentine and Emily, gave Peter an old fashioned Edwardian upbringing and instilled values and skills he carried throughout his life.

He grew up in south west London in houses which his father largely rebuilt, working during the day and doing his proper job at night as Night manager at the Savoy Hotel. Peter remembers cycling from Willesden to South Kensington as a young boy to look at the Science museums and the round pond in Kensington Gardens, where large model boats were expertly sailed by what he described as 'old gentlemen, 'saying 'well, they looked old to me at the time'. During the WW2 Peter remembered leaving a house they lived in Harlesdon, possibly temporarily

because of war conditions, to find on his return that it his bedroom had been blown to bits. Even as a young boy he travelled long journeys on trains, sent by his mother to visit relatives away from London totally on his own. On one such trip he managed to get himself into the driver's cabin for the trip!

Peter rode Sunbeam and Douglas motorbikes as a teenager and went to Naval College (including a stint in Portsmouth where he slept in an old 1880's wooden battleship while studying!). He was commissioned as a junior officer at the end of the war and saw limited service in Coastal Forces (MTBs and MGBs in the channel) through 1945/6. Part of his work was to escort surrendered German E boats back from Holland to England and he was always amazed that the British ships couldn't keep up with the German E boats.

Peter painted and sketched from an early age: it was taught as part of the Naval Cadet syllabus but he had a strong natural artistic streak. He carried on drawing, painting and taking striking photos throughout his life, some exhibited locally in Lympstone and in a calendar he created and sold locally.

After the war, Peter continued his studies at Battersea Polytechnic at

evening classes and qualified as a civil engineer, meeting his wife Shirley at Kingston Vale Operatic Society in the late 1940s, where they both performed in Gilbert and Sullivan productions.

Peter's work projects encompassed many of the major infrastructure projects of the post-war period. These included repairs to flood damage in East Anglia after the 1956 floods and a large hydroelectric scheme in the Scottish Highlands where Peter, Shirley and their young children lived in wooden huts for a while. This adventure left a big impression on him and he was invited back in recent years for an anniversary of the scheme which is still working.

He later moved to Somerset was lead engineer on the water intake works of Hinkley Point B nuclear power station, which was one of the largest construction projects in Europe at the time. He went on to build a deep water wharf in Kent and other projects. He then managed one of the first, early, computer systems for a large company in Crawley (Woodham-Duckham).

Peter loved the Exe Estuary and was delighted to be able to live so close to it and become a member of the Lympstone sailing club. He sailed well into his 70s, graduating to ownership of a small cabined, boat 'Piccolo', which

gave him many happy times.

In retirement Peter enjoyed a glass of red wine, and took many photographs of the beautiful sunsets that can be enjoyed from Cliff Field. He was active in the local Probus Club and Glenorchy church in Exmouth, a member of the Flotilla club and also at some point gave talks on navigation and past naval experiences to various groups.

As he grew older home visiting carers were a great boon and he was regularly visited by his children, children and nephews. In his last months he had to move briefly in a local care home. On the last occasion his daughter, Carol, saw him they looked together through a catalogue of the pictures of marine artist Montague Dawson. He always had large framed pictures by Dawson in the living room depicting clipper ships on boisterous oceans. As Carol read the text aloud he made many astute and knowledgeable comments about the boats shown and said 'There is no more magnificent sight than a clipper in full sail'. This was a suitable and touching last memory for the family to hold on to, of someone who truly loved his home in Lympstone and was forever grateful for the opportunity to spend retirement on the stunning Exe Estuary.

WATER QUALITY AT LYMPSTONE

On Friday the 8th of September before high tide at 1 pm people in canoes and other vessels around Lympstone harbour noticed a discharge of sewage from the pipe outlet to the west of the rock breakwater on the southern side of the harbour bay.

The evidence suggested quite a heavy discharge of raw sewage on a rising tide and some of this discharge left a residue inside the harbour underneath and around the pontoons on the western wall.

This was reported to South West Water (SWW) who sent four vehicles to the village on Saturday evening. On Sunday the 10th of September, SWW said that their instruments did not indicate a discharge and that water samples taken from undisclosed locations throughout the estuary were nominal.

The Harbour Board requested that every future discharge was reported to the Lympstone Fishery & Harbour Association (LFHA) which owns the land over which the outfall flows. SWW referred us to their website map which shows all discharges from sewer outfalls – each of which has an "EPM" or Environmental Protection Monitor.

We pointed out to them that the Lympstone outfall is not on this map and their own crews had told us that no EPM is fitted to it. We have asked them to put the Lympstone outfall on their map and fit it with an EPM so that we can put discharge information on our website. This will allow water users to check if there has been a discharge before swimming in the estuary or boating across it.

We added that if they did not, we would crowd fund for a water quality monitoring buoy which would be moored on our land close to the outfall. The information from this buoy would be relayed in real time to our website for the community to consult. We said it would be criminal to leave the community in ignorance when the estuary around Lympstone is so heavily used by adults and children whose health could be seriously affected by sewage.

SWW said they would be in touch "as a matter of importance" sometime the following week. So far (Monday the 18th) they have not responded.

As a matter of interest, further research has uncovered the following:

- Sewage discharge into water courses should only ever happen as a result of storm-water surges (where rain water fills sewage storage tanks). There had been no significant rain for the ten-day period leading up to this discharge.
- All discharges should be reported as a requirement of the 2021 Environment Act.
- The Government has issued instructions to water companies that only outfalls discharging more than ten times a year need to be reported. (The legality of this instruction is now contested).

The LFHA will crowd-fund for the £15,000 the water monitor will cost if SWW do not respond positively but I am not at all convinced that they will do anything at all.

The community needs to be told why the Lympstone Outfall is not on its website map and why no EPM is fitted to it. We have taken two samples from the pontoons in the harbour but need to find a laboratory to test them.

The Harbour Board advises the community not to swim in the harbour – a practise which it does not permit in any event – and to be cautious for the time being about swimming in the harbour bay.

Whilst on this note, we'd like to draw your attention to the Devon Biodiversity Records Centre (DBRC) https://www.dbrc.org.uk/. This is the primary database for wildlife sightings and records in this area. As such it is importance evidence for EDDC when deciding on the type of ecological and environmental surveys required for any planning purposes, as well as any appropriate mitigation measures.

You might be interested to know that Lympstone has both a Cirl Bunting and Great Crested Newt Consultation Zone, meaning that planning applications need to consider the potential impacts of a development on these species over a 5km buffer around any DBRC recorded sighting.

Everyone can help to expand the DBRC database. Single sightings can be uploaded here https://www.dbrc. org.uk/wildlife-sightings/ and multiple sightings can be recorded on the Excel spreadsheet downloadable from the Wildlife Records area of the home page https://www.dbrc.org.uk/. DBRC will verify all uploaded sightings. Please spread the word - we can't protect wildlife if we don't know it's there!

Around 200 villagers attended the Flood Risk Drop-in and considerable interest was shown in the displays. Information on protecting one's own property was popular and a number of free home surveys were arranged.

For those who were unable to attend, the Flood Group are planning to make their event content available online, and details will be provided in a subsequent issue of The Herald.

Lympstone Flood Resilience Group

...one report from the event:

"I today spent some time at the Flood Resilience Event at the Village Hall, a very impressive and informative day it was. A vast amount of information about the work done and the future predictions for the flood risk of our village. This included some very impressive new technology to predict the effect of changes made to the land profile.

More important for the here and now was a display of many of the various measures that can be taken by home owners to protect their homes in the highly likely event of a flood condition. Contrary to popular belief this not only affects properties close to the river but also most properties on the south side of Longmeadow Rd, the A376 and Sowden.

Flooding will happen it is just a question of when, not just from the river or Wotten Brook but also from land drainage, road drains and worst of all sewers.

We, at Pretty Corner we're flooded in 2012 causing £3.5k of damage and put us out of our home for six months. That's not to mention the damage and loss of many irreplaceable personal possessions. So TAKE ACTION NOW if you live in a flood risk area.

You may say "I can't afford it " well help is at hand. Devon County Council have a pot of government money to fund households to do this work up to the value of £5000 per property, called a PFR Funding Scheme. We did in 2020 and can now sleep at night when there is a storm.

I would be happy to give further advice on the procedure to obtain the grant or to contact a suitable specialist contractor. Alternatively contact the LFRG.

Well done the LFRG for staging this brilliant event."
