PARISH COUNCIL NEWS DECEMBER 2023

Lympstone Parish Council held their monthly public meeting on Monday 4th December in the Meeting Room.

Public session - Members of the public raised the following issues with the cemetery: uneven pathways, children climbing over the lower fence and using the cemetery as a cut through, an abandoned pile of soil, dipped graves, felled memorial tree, leaning headstones and the entrance gates did not close properly. The Chairman explained the PC had voted to retain the tree and had not given permission for it to be cut down. The PC was investigating the circumstances with the tree surgeon. The PC would be speaking to the family regarding the tree before releasing any public statement. The footpaths were being replaced in the new year and the pile of soil would be used to assist this work. The stone mason had a map of the ground and was looking at the headstones. The gate would be fixed, and the fence would be repaired once the boundary was established with adjoining landowner. It is important to note that any issues with the old cemetery/church graveyard is the responsibility of the Church and EDDC Streetscene and not the PC.

Casual vacancy - The Chairman explained that there was a vacancy on the PC as no election had been

called. It was now up to the PC to co-opt a new member. Therefore, if you are interested in joining the PC, please contact me, the Clerk, for more information at lympstonepc@gmail.com

Clerks Report: LPC Budget 2024/25

- The Clerk presented the PCs budget for 24/25, this was unanimously agreed and would be sent to EDDC. Cooption, Digital and social media, and Communications Policies - The Clerk explained that she had reviewed the co-option and digital and social media policy. She had created and previously circulated a new communications policy. These were unanimously agreed. NB: All approved PC policies can be found online at www.lympstone.org

Reports of Committees – In addition to the monthly PC meetings, regular committee and working group meetings, corresponding with members of the public and other external bodies, updating and maintaining the Facebook page, Website and Herald, adhering statutory duties, planning applications, burials, awarding local groups grants and ongoing maintenance for the Parish, the PC have also completed the following achievements durina 2023: Front meadow, safety fence erected at The Rag, new notice boards under the railway bridge in the Strand, Coronation Party in Candy's Field, new

pedestrian gate installed at Avenue Field, refurbished kissing gate installed at Cliff Field, refurbished entrance gates to the cemetery, two new picnic tables, six new benches, adoption and refurbishment of the telephone box in the Strand, replaced oak posts at entrance to The Avenue, refurbishment of current PC benches and ongoing attendance at a variety of Cllr training sessions.

Upcoming projects for 2024: Resurfacing paths in cemetery, continued refurbishment of current benches, history box project in the adopted telephone box, parish party in Candy's Field, the Hub building rebuild.

Gulliford Joint Committee – Cllr Staddon reported on the recent joint committee meeting:

This is an amazing burial ground set between the Woodbury and Lympstone Parishes, managed by both Parish Councils to continue the up keep, along with the 'Friends of Gulliford'.

Much remedial work has been carried out over the past years, in 2018/2019 and again in 2020 to rebuild walls and tombstones, the work carried out by experts in masonry and monument conservation, this and the work that the 'friends of Gulliford' have carried out, have helped transform this pocket of calm and wildlife.

Talking about 'the friends of Gulliford', we were sad to hear that Lesley Weekes had passed away. Lesley planted over 1000 daffodil bulbs and dedicated much of her time to create the wildlife haven in Gulliford. We will be forever grateful to Lesley.

An open day in the summer, for all things 'bugs' was held in the summer with a good footfall enjoying talks, a big thank you to Councillor Moffat, who without him, this bug day wouldn't have taken place. Thank you, Mark. Moffat, the chair of the Joint Committee gave a positive report for the future of Gulliford and discussed ways of keeping Gulliford in the public eye, to encourage all to use. Member Angela Coles reported of the fantastic news that Gulliford Burial Ground had won an award for 'Most original burial ground', this has to reflect on the work and time that Jane, Angela and the friends have put in. A day of tidying the ground, took place on Sunday. The friends with one extra volunteer managed to complete the end of season tidy in the dry. Over the coming months, the 'friends of Gulliford' will be looking for extra help, volunteers who can spare a couple of hours here and there. If you feel you could lend a hand, please let them know. A last word, to thank Lucy for her time and commitment with Gulliford, it's really appreciated.

Environment Committee Cllr Culhane reported that the Parish emergency plan is being reviewed and in need for volunteers. Can you help? 

THE HERALD HISTORY SPOT

Last year the Lympstone History Society created an informal group, the Lympstone Family History Interest Group (FHIG), which, as its name suggests, was formed for those in the village – and outside – who have an interest in the history of village families. The group, currently numbering around 25 members, is coordinated by Dick Francis who has lived in the village for 20 years but still regards himself as an "incomer"!

We were lucky enough to obtain a transcribed copy of the baptisms, marriages and burials in the parish from 1654 to 1906 and, despite being basically long lists of names and dates, they already start to paint a picture of village life and the families who have influenced it. The commonest of the surnames from these records are Litton, Denning, Baker, Smith, Searle and Skinner and many house names in the village today clearly have their origins in family names from years gone by, such as: Shepherds, Dingles, Hares, Withalls and many more.

The burial records, in particular, provide an insight into the challenges of life in the past centuries and there are clearly some interesting 'back stories' to some of the entries ... like, twin babies buried together, the very many children who died in infancy, several people who drowned in the same incident, and victims of a smallpox outbreak. There is only one person in these records who lived to be more than 100 years old, that was Priscilla Baker who died in 1874 aged 101.

Thanks to a subscription to Ancestry. com, we also have access to the census returns from 1841 to 1911 (every ten years) and these add further fascinating information about the village families, where they lived and what were the common occupations.

Over the coming months we plan to further investigate families of interest and we hope to meet up again some time in the spring. As we uncover interesting stories, we will try to share them via the Herald History Spot.



RECENT READS

'Lessons in Chemistry' by Bonnie Garmus



If I had solely read the back cover synopsis of this book, I wouldn't have chosen it but it was recommended by two separate friends so I read it and thoroughly enjoyed it.

It's not about cooking and it's not about Chemistry. It's really about how, as both people and animals, we can care for and respect one another. We can learn from one another, embrace difference and build others up to broaden and achieve their dreams and aspirations. As adults, we know that doesn't always happen and the main character of this story bears more than her share of bigotry and abuse towards her.

Chamist Elizabeth Zott is not your average woman. In fact, Elizabeth Zott would be the first to point out that there is no such thing.

But it's the early 1900s and her all-male team at Mastings Research Institute take a very unscientific view of equality. Forced to resign, she reluctantly signs on as the host of a cooking show, Supper at Six. But her revolutionary approach to cooking, fuelled by scientific and rational commentary, grabs the attention of a nation. And soon a legion of overlooked housewives find themselves daring to change the status quo. One molecule at a time.

It has a great story line, with twists and turns that keep you intrigued as to what will happen next and how earlier subplots will be resolved. The main characters are not immediately or traditionally attractive but they are masterfully drawn and win your sympathies.

In various chapters the story is told from the perspective of different characters. As a reader who has had to learn the difference between artistic and scientific writing style, I found the subtle adjustments between these chapters added such depth to the personalities and their relationships. I've heard a criticism of the book that it takes a comic approach which grates with the subject matter - indeed there is one

deeply shocking example of coarse understatement but, I believe, that is absolutely intentional - demonstrating a survival mechanism which repays as the clever tale unfolds.

I enjoyed this book as a good story but also for the elements of inspiration and empowerment.

EXE ESTUARY TRAIL CLOSURE

Reminder:

I am writing to advise that Devon County Council have appointed a contractor to carry out works to Courtlands Boardwalk – the raised timber boardwalk on the Exe Estuary Trail between Lympstone and Exmouth.

After a routine inspection, the timber elements of the boardwalk were found to have deteriorated and rotted. Minor repairs have been ongoing for a couple of years to replace individual deck planks etc, but it is now time to carry out major works to completely replace all the timber elements with fibre-

reinforced polymer (FRP) elements. FRP is a durable material that will not deteriorate in the damp environment that the boardwalk is situated in.

Unfortunately due to the extensive nature of the work, there is no alternative but to close this section of the Exe Estuary Trail for the duration of the work. A diversion route will be in place as shown in the attached plan.

The works are scheduled to start towards the end of September (after the school summer holidays) and is expected to last for about 3 months.

Information boards are going to be put up along the trail soon to advise users of the upcoming closure, closure dates, and more information about the works and why we are doing it. We would like to try and reach as many interested parties as possible (local residents, businesses and other stakeholders) so please do forward this email on as necessary.
