PARISH COUNCIL NEWS JANUARY 2024

Lympstone Parish Council held their monthly public meeting on Monday 8th January in the Meeting Room.

A very Happy New Year to all our residents! I hope you all had a lovely break over the festive period and refreshed for a new year.

Public session

A resident asked about the proposed development at Meeting Lane and why DCC Highways had no objection to the additional traffic issues this would cause. He explained this traffic would certainly add to the already congested village roads. Cllr Culhane explained that she had access to a pollution monitor and would be gathering data to use as evidence to back up the residents' claim. The Chairman added that the PC was still waiting for this application to go to EDDC strategic planning committee for both the PC and residents to raise concerns.

Clerk's Report - *IMPORTANT*

The Clerk explained that the defibrillator at the Saddlers Arms was out of action due to expired pads. The Clerk added that despite the fact new pads had been ordered well in advance she had recently received an email that the pads were out of stock and did not know when they would be back in stock. She had searched other providers who also

had the same issue with these pads for this type of defibrillator.

Reports from the Chairman, East Devon District Councillors and Devon County Councillors

Lympstone Parish Council Chairman wished all present a happy new year. District Cllr Jung hoped all had a good Christmas and a good break over New Year. He reported that EDDC would be holding a meeting with SWW to discuss the current issue of sewage being pumped into the sea. He added that just before Christmas he had circulated a note to the clerks and chairs regarding the changes to the National Planning Policy Framework that was published late December 2023, and the positive changes to the weight attributed to Neighbourhood Plans. However, he made it clear, the revised NPPF changed absolutely nothing for housing numbers in strategic planning in East Devon. The government figures remained as before. He explained that the Committee members at EDDC Strategic Planning would be requesting that changes to the weight of Neighbourhood Plans be drawn to the attention of Parish Councils and Neighbourhood Plan Steering Groups. So, details would be hopefully coming through from officers shortly. He highlighted the fact that the current EDDC local plan

remained and the emerging one did not presently exist. County Cllr Scott explained that if the development at Meeting Lane went ahead the adjoining roads would be changed to 30mph. He added that DCC were only consultees to EDDC planning department. Preapplication conversations were held with DCC and EDDC officers and the PC received updates. He added that the County and District Cllrs wanted these conversations held earlier with the PC before developers. He and County Cllr Trail had been working on a governance document to assist the consultation impact to be created by LPC and community led to take to developers first.

Community Payback Scheme

Cllr Gale-Hasleham reported on this initiative: The Community Payback is where offenders work on projects to pay back the community for their crimes, for example by: removing graffiti, clearing wasteland, improving and decorating a public space or building like a community centre, repainting communal areas, making pathways accessible, clearing alleys, doing grounds maintenance and gardening, planting trees and picking litter. The work must: benefit the local community, not take paid work away from others and not make a profit for anyone. I am sure that we will qualify for some if not all categories and I look forward to receiving input from my fellow Councillors after which I will make the appropriate application. He would discuss it in more detail at the next community committee meeting and bring recommendations back to full council.

Community committee

Cllr Staddon reported on the committee meeting held on 11th Dec 2023: We discussed the plans to follow on from the success of both the Jubilee and Coronation parties in Candy's Field and repeat the fun this year in June. We are wondering whether to theme it on the D Day anniversary, although the party is set for later in June. We are at the early stages of bringing back the 'Beating of the Bounds'. With this we would like to also reinstate the missing boundary stone. Anyone who would like to help, would be much appreciated. The phone box at The Swan is set to become an interactive history box, we have all the necessary hardware for this, we are now starting the next phase of working out the best ways to use it. It will incorporate local people from Lympstone, with snippets of stories/ historical information on this amazing village. We had the chance to consult with local residents regarding the new Youth Hub building, this proved really helpful, and we are awaiting a meeting

FAIR WINDS FOR MARCH

Lympstone's Clarion Clarinet Quartet was founded 20 years ago by Richard de la Rue, and has performed many times in the village and surrounding area. For their next appearance he and John Welton have invited another wind group, the Roseland Wind Quartet, to join them in a concert in Lympstone Parish Church on Saturday 16th March at 7.30pm, heralding the start of the year's Lympstone Entertainments programme.

Apart from a clarinet, the Roseland musicians play flute, oboe and bassoon – all woodwind instruments – and one brass instrument – a French horn, which blends beautifully with all the woodwind you will hear – including John Welton's favourite bass clarinet and even the tiny E-flat clarinet. Each contributes its own magic to the ensemble.

You can look forward to a programme that includes the Classics, favourite Musicals, the Blues, Jazz and Boogie – anything from Mozart to Benny Goodman. There's a Quintet by Beethoven's lesser-known contemporary Franz Danzi, and even an arrangement of Freddie Mercury's Bohemian Rhapsody!

MONTHLY LOTTERY - FRIENDS OF LYMPSTONE CHURCH (FOLC)

Friends of Lympstone Church is a charity set up almost 40 years ago that raises money to ensure that Lympstone's oldest building, the village church, stays in good repair. Over the past four decades, FoLC has raised nearly £65,000 to pay for the repair and maintenance of the church building, major projects including the re-roofing of the Church, repair of the tower's stonework, repairing windows and the conservation of memorial plaques, amongst other things.

Excluding the costs of repairs and maintenance, the annual running costs of the church are approximately £83,000, which are borne by the regular congregation, so FoLC's contribution to repairs and maintenance is invaluable.

Maintaining the church building in good condition enables it to be used by the whole community. Aside from the obvious services, weddings, baptisms and funerals, the church is also a warm, safe space for community events: Tick Tock children's club, a dedicated warm space for villagers during the most recent winter when fuel prices were so high, and for one-offs such as Wild About Lympstone and the Memory Day, both in 2023. The church also provides

the setting for important national civic occasions such as Remembrance Day, and the celebration of Royal events

FoLC raises money from various events that it organises including its largest fund-raiser, the monthly Lottery, which runs from April to March each year. In 2023, the FoLC lottery raised £2,170.

One ticket, costing £10.00, will enter you into the monthly draw for a whole year. Each month the owner of the winning ticket receives a prize of £50.00.

FoLC's dedicated and friendly village lottery ticket sellers start selling in January ready for the new FoLC lottery year and will be knocking on your door in the first few months of 2024. So buy a ticket (or several!) and give yourself a chance of winning! Your generous participation will also keep the Church wind- and water-proof!

If you are out when we call and you'd like to give yourself a chance of winning the monthly draw, as well as helping preserve our wonderful historic Church building, please email me and I will make sure you have a ticket.

FoLC is a charity independent of any religious affiliation or organisation. FoLC plays no part on the day-to-day running of Lympstone Church.

No money raised by FoLC is used for day-to-day running costs of Lympstone Church. FoLC is deliberately designed to avoid any religious requirement from its members and donors.





RECENT READS



Twenty years ago DARPA who sponsor advanced research in the USA ran a competition to develop a vehicle to save lives of the US military. This was hoped to lead to autonomous vehicles. This excellent book takes us through the exciting developments of the past 20 years of sensors and systems but we still have no autonomous vehicles on public roads. Exciting, and initially tech driven, the competitions in the Mojave desert are particularly well described. The first failed to find a vehicle that could complete the course but two years later several vehicles managed the 150 miles of rugged terrain. The action

then moves to the even more dynamic environment of urban driving and the businesses that were created and failed to deliver a safe system to replace the human skill of driving. There is so much in this book of interest to engineers, drivers, business people and investors still looking for the secret sauce that will bring sensory intelligence to robots. Things that humans do with ease are difficult for robots and vice versa. This is Moravecs paradox explored with billions of dollars of investment money from Google, Uber, Ford, GM et al. and still there are no autonomous vehicles regularly on the road.

For me, with a Defra funded innovation project to develop safe working systems to stop tractors killing humans and animals this is a key text. The book maps out the development process that failed to constrain the operational design domain and demonstrates the hubris of some inventors one of whom ended up in prison for IP theft. The desire for a complete system prevented the development of the aftermarket of conversions of existing vehicles that could evolve autonomy. Whilst deep learning techniques of showing many tagged pictures of cats to a computer can teach it to recognise a cat, this has proved insufficient to learn the complexities of navigating a road without accidents.

For me this is welcome. I am disappointed with the displays of robotic tractor systems and there are many now appearing, they seem to have a narrow focus and few farms are big enough for a single purpose machine.

I want to keep the flexibility of the existing tractor fleet and provide a conversion kit that allows them to be used in many tasks, anything from feeding animals on a frosty morning or carrying tools and posts while fencing. I have defined a few problems where humans work with tractors and spend a lot of time jumping on an off and driving short distances.
